

GROUNDLESS CHARGES

Alleged charges of Paul L. Kickinger, executive secretary of the New Mexico Educational Association, that sinister influences are at work to close the schools of New Mexico for a period of from one to two years, are absurd. We feel sure that this would be the last step the average citizen would want to take regardless of how trying conditions might become. The chief cause of the squak of Mr. Fickinger is probably because he does not welcome and salary cut and because the tax payers of the state are not willing to allow him to dictate the school budget.

There is lots of difference in what position you occupy, whether you are on the receiving end or on the paying end. If a few more of the teaching profession were on the paying end, they might be able to see the light. We've never had any trouble finding those who could tell us how to spend money.

A majority of the members of the New Mexico Newspaper Association favor the employment of New Mexico teachers in New Mexico schools, which will thus limit in a large degree the necessity of our boys and girls going out of the state to find employment, if the public approves of the idea. State papers generally urge also that New Mexico boys and girls patronize the institutions of higher learning within the state, when the local high school is completed, thus giving the educational institutions within our state better support and more encouragement and better fit them to serve the educational needs of the state.

In this respect the newspaper fraternity is perhaps more patriotic and have shown more willingness to co-operate than some of the institutions themselves. Loyalty should have a place in every educational curriculum.

Possibly our readers have heard it before, but Arthur Brisbane, noted writer, who made a brief stop in Las Vegas last week, while en route to his ranch in California and in an interview with a Las Vegas newspaper representative, predicted that the American peo ple had reached the end of the depression. It will be a long hard pull back to normal times, he says. Whether we have or have not seen the worst of the pressing times, people in a good many sections are feeling less depressed and when the mental attitude of the common people takes a turn, it will help, for our mental attitude has a lot to do with the way we react toward any situation.

Closer co-operation among stockmen and feeders of the Pecos valley and southeastern New Mexico is one of the plans of the Roswell chamber of commerce for the year 1932, it was announced by the Roswell Record Saturday.

Estimates compiled show that feeding of both sheep and cattle on farms in the Pecos valley has grown to be one of the major enterprises of the section during the past year.

It is now estimated that more than 27,000 head of sheep and cattle are being fed at various farms in the valley, the total being divided ito approximately 20,000 sheep and 7,000 cattle.

The following brief summary touches the high spots of the activities of County Health Officer,

O. E. Puckett for 1931: In 1931, the Eddy County school children and 140 pre-school children; made 393 inspections of food-handling establishments or other public places; made 261 visits for the control of communicable diseases. Immunized 166 people against typhoid fever, 225 against diphtheria and 970 against small pox.

The health officer traveled about 11,000 miles on official duty an average of more than 900 miles per month.



HEALTH COLUMN

VIOLENT DEATH

It is difficult to compart New Mexico death rates with those of other states because we have so large a proportion of deaths unattended by a physician and thus of "unknown cause." However, in the matter of deaths from violence we are in the same position as other states, for doctors are seldom present when death is sudden and the decision as to whether a violent death is due to homicide, suicide or accident is a legal rather than a medical decision.

We are inclined to think of New Mexico as a community of people of quick passions, still governed by some of the tenets of frontier justice, ready to take the law of life and death into their own hands. Many people would be sure, if asked, that more than the average die here in their boots. But they would be wrong. The death rate from homicide in this state is 8.6 per 100,000 population whereas the corresponding rate for the United States is 8.8.

For all violent deaths, including accidents, the rates are 97.5 for New Mexico and 101.6 for the United States. The figures are for the year 1928, the last year for which national statistics are available.

Agronomy work in New Mexico during 1931 was concentrated largely upon moisture control and soil culture thru contouring and terracing, and making available adequate seed supplies for the principal farm crops in all farming areas of the state, according to G. R. Quesenberry, extension

Moisture control has demanded more time during the past year than previously but its spread has been very rapid in every area where adapted. The number of co-operators and the number of acres involved were doubled over the previous year in this work. Interest in irrigation has in-

creased more rapidly during the past year than in any previous year, due to a large extent to the new irrigation laws.

The New Mexico Crop Improvement Association has increased its membership to 285. Seed for increase is furnished by the state and federal experiment stations of the state. The production of adequate supplies of pure seed in every community where its need exists has been promoted by encouraging the organization of local seed centers or organized groups of farmers who are willing



Water consumed in Artesia during the past year totaled 112,184,-000 gallons, recent tabulations compiled by City Manager George Frisch reveal. Of the amount Bake, serve immediately when consumed 101,353,000 gallons were distributed to pay customers and 10,831,000 to the various organizations of the city such as the City Park, cemetery, fire fighting, sewer flushing and street sprinkling. The free water if figured at a rate of 6 cents per thousand gallons would net the city \$649.86, which is no small amount to give away.
