### Record 97 Vehicles Enter 'Great' Race

A record field of at least 97 ancient motor vehicles will start the 5th annual INTER-STATE BATTERIES GREAT RACE Tuesday, June 30, at Disneyland park, Anaheim, Ca. The previous record of 96 starters was set just last year.

Gospel Singer Joe Atkinson became the final entrant before "Non penalty" entries closed May 1. He entered his rare 1913 American Underslung just under the deadline. The race will continue to accept entries (subject to a \$250 surcharge) until the 120 vehicle limit is attained.

California leads the 25 states with GREAT RACE entrants with 30. Texas is next (9), then Arizona (7), Florida (6), Ohio (7), Florida (6), Ohio and Pennsylvania (4 each), Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, New Mexico and North Carolina (3), Massachusetts, Kansas, Connecticut and Wisconsin (2) and single entrants from Alabama, Colorado, Iowa, Louisiana, Nevada, New Hampshire, New York, Oklahoma, Vermont and West Virginia.

International entrants include machines from the Channel Islands of the United Kingdom and Venezuela, plus planned entries from Japan (2) and India (1). One more foreign entrant will set a new record in this area, too.

After the colorful Disneyland start, GREAT RACERS will cover 3,660 miles and 10 states in 11 days enroute to a gala finish at Walt Disney World's EPCOT Center on July 10. A record \$270,000 purse, split into

### MHS Coach, Teacher Wears 'Different' Cap Each Summer

At Muleshoe High School, students and faculty know him as Coach Jim Stewart - a first year coach for Muleshoe, although he had prior coaching experience in Dickinson.

However, once graduation is over Friday night, Coach Stewart will be putting on a "different" cap -- he will become Jim Stewart, counselor, recreation and athletics director or outings coordinator for the Texas Lion's Camp for Crippled Children at Kerrville.

This will be the 11th year Coach Stewart has gone to the camp, which is the largest Crippled Children's Camp in Texas -- probably also the largest in the United States, and maybe even in the world, according to the coach.

"It's tough, it's physically and emotionally demanding," said Coach Stewart, "and I go back every year, because I like it."

He said these kids are like everybody else and they want to play football, basketball, go fishing, camping and swimming. The children have all types of disabilities, from deafness, to blindness, to amputees, to children with Cerebral Palsy, Spinal Bifida and other numbing disabilities.

Every two weeks, 175 kids arrive at the camp to participate in one of the five sessions conducted each summer near Kerrville. This number is down somewhat from the former 250 youngsters, ages 6-16, each session, but Coach Stewart said economics has gotten to the camp.

Class colors for the 1987 seniors are silver and purple, and their flower is the iris. Class sponsors are John Gulley, Hellen Adrian and Pat Watson.

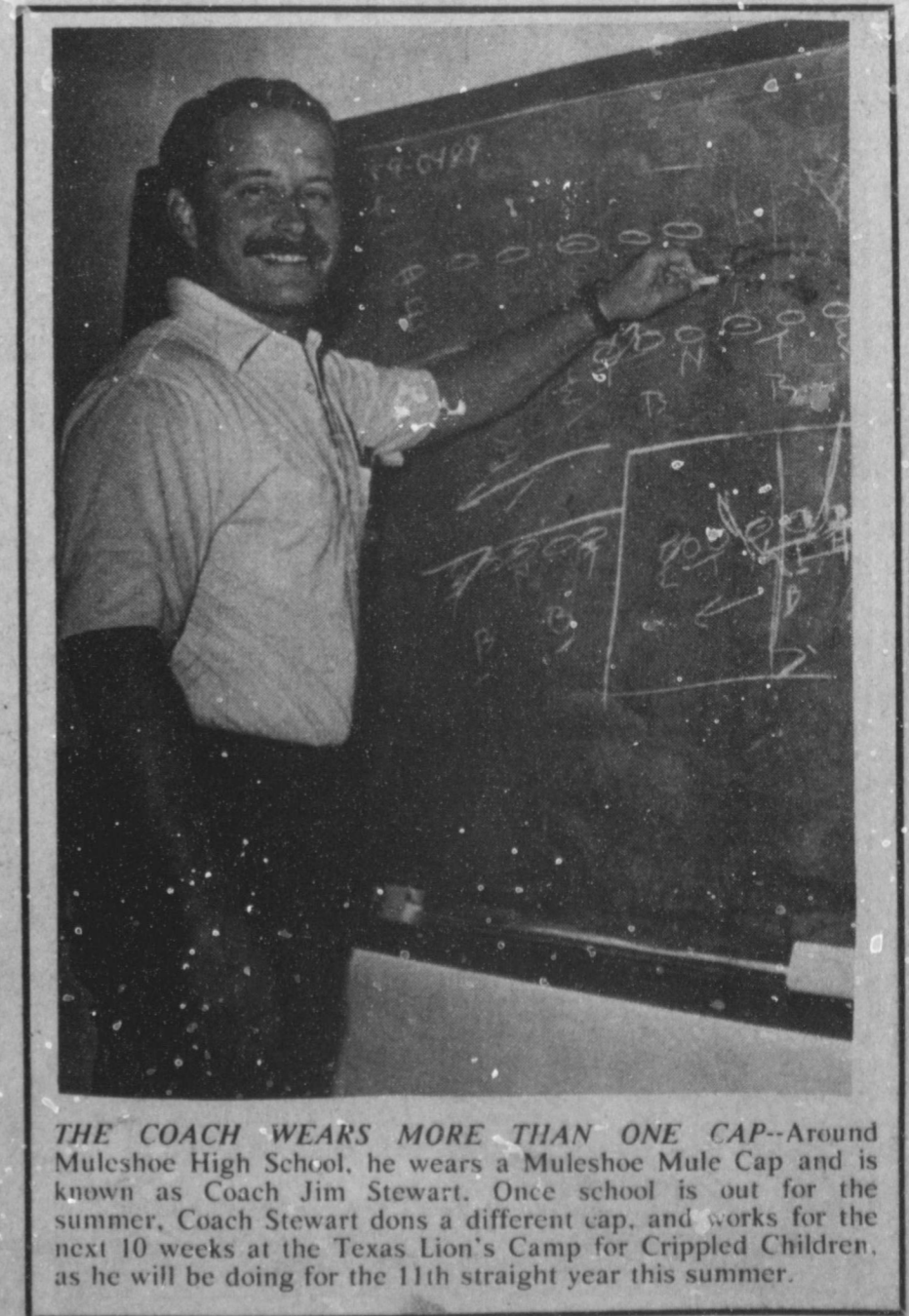

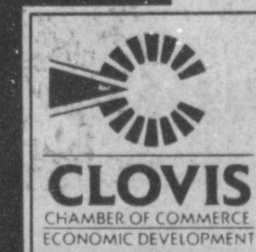

AMHERST ENTERS LAMB COUNTY SEAT ELECTION JUNE 15

Following the lead of Littlefield two weeks ago for location of Lamb County seat now at Olton, in the northern part of county, Amherst last week made application for such location to the county commissioners. Due recognition being granted, and another three-cornered fight is now on. Voting will take place Saturday, June 15th.

This is the third time citizens of Lamb county have been called upon to vote on their county seat location, the first vote having been taken in 1929.

Because of the location, the law provides that Amherst may obtain the county capitol on majority vote, since it is within the five mile radius of the county center, while Littlefield outside the radius must have a two thirds majority for removal.
