We showed last week that this disease is caused by a minute animal parasite that lives in the blood of infected persons. When the parasite breeds an attack of chills, fever and sweating follows. In between attacks adult parasites are still present in the blood. Certain mosquitoes when

they suck this blood also become infected with the malaria parasite and when the infected mosquito later bites a healthy person that person too becomes infected.

The malarial parasite is killed by quinine and most popular remedies for chills contain this drug. If all the parasites are to be killed, it is important that quinine be given at the right time and in the right quantity. For this reason the patient should be under a doctor's care. Even with the best medical attention it is






