

For, borne on the night air, the female anopheline mosquito seeks its meal of blood. To protect ourselves and our

children from her malaria bearing bite we cover our windows with wire screens (no. 16 mesh), our doors with screen doors which should open outward. All cracks must be covered. Even the chimney top must be covered with wire screen. Reprint no. 1153 from Public Health Reports, April 22, 1927, tells how to screen houses against nosquitoes.



## SHORT SUBJECTS

#### Snakes in Hibernation

Snakes seek fissures among the rocks in which to hibernate during the winter months. Although during this period of inactivity they can stand considerable cold, temperatures at or below the freezing point are quite likely to kill them. They seem to have an uncanny instinct of selecting their winter shelters at points that will not fall below the danger line in temperature.

#### Prized Food Fish

The pompano belongs to the Jack family and is one of the most prized of the world's food fishes. ## MESCALERO INDIANS STILL BELIEVE IN WEIRD OLD CUSTOMS

The Mescalero Indians believe in witcheraft says Martha Fall writing in the El Paso Post. It seems odd returned this week from a two that within 100 miles of Artesia a people still live who believe in the strange customs and traditions.

The Mescalero Indians practice burial rites 2000 years old . . .think giving birth to twins is a sin . when they become ill from watching an owl, seek cure from a medicine and steadfastly resist the advance of the white man's civilzation.

They are the Indians of the Mescalero Apache reservation, New Mexico.

John L. Mixon, missionary who works with them, says that the Indians haven't changed fundamentally in the last 2000 years.

Soon after an Oklahoma Indian woman went to visit relatives at Mescalero, a man died. The Indians concluded that she had "witched"

The woman thought the Indians in turn would witch her. She begged Mr. and Mrs. Mixon to protect
