

A GOOD CROP TO TIE TO

It is unfortunate that local cantaloupe shippers have encountered unstable market conditions on their first venture in supplying the eastern trade. We hope that general condiions may be more picture camera. satisfactory during the remainder of the growing season. Growers who are not too easily discouraged will no doubt find the cantaloupe venture more profitable over a series of years and if so, melons will give the farmers another cash crop to tie to, thus enhancing the value of our farm land. Nearly every truck crop this year has been more or less disappointing and in view of this condition, it would still be more unfortunate if the borrower and lender have forgotgrowers who have tried melons this year would give up the venture entirely. The situation in this case would be similar to the merchant who, because he found one advertisement unsatis- at a Chamber of Commerce lunchfactory would condemn the whole advertising system.

One car from Carlsbad is reported to have brought \$2.50 on the New York market, which would leave the growers a profit of about 50 cents per crate, after expenses were paid. On hearing this report one grower remarked that he could realize much more-from 50 cents per crate cantaloupes than from cotton at the present price. He said that his cantaloupes would easily run a hundred crates to the acre, which would mean a cash return of \$50.00 per acre is complete without some pickles at the above market price.

INCLUDE SOME PICKLES IN HOME FOOD SUPPLY

No supply of home canned food and relishes, says Veda Strong, of the New Mexico Agricultural

Pickles may be made of either fruits or vegetables. Usually the kin. made of vegetables chopped fine. not rank high in actual food value they do add zest to a meal thru their spicy, characteristic flavor.

A few general suggestions to observe in making pickles are given. Use only a good grade of vegetables, fruits, vinegar and spices. Fruits and vegetables should be fresh, crisp and free from blemish.

There is a great difference in the acidity of vinegars. Vinegar should be diluted if too sour, but if diluted too much the pickles will become soft from fermentation. Cider vinegar is a good vinegar loses its strength. Pick- Intending to oust them from his les heated too long in vinegar land. become soft from overcooking. ed over pickles, they become shriveled. Soft or slippery pickles will reprevent the growth of bacteria. To avoid this condition, keep the pickles well below the brine and the brine at proper strength by adding more salt each week during brining process, which is usually about five weeks except in localities with low altitude and warm climate, in which the time



DAVIS GRANTED NEW TRIAL BY HIGH COURT OF NEW MEXICO

Frank Davis, convicted of killing James Elliott in Carlsbad a year new trial when the supreme court reversed a previous opinion.

Davis was appealed from the first degree murder sentence passed on him by Judge G. A. Richardson in the Eddy county district court and in March 1932 the supreme court confirmed that conviction.

Thursday's opinion was written by Justice John C. Watson with every time. Chief Justice Howard Bickley, and Justice D. K. Sadler and A. H. Hudspeth concurring.

The supreme court held that evidence in the case had not been introduced which showed it to be one involving voluntary manslaughter when Davis was alleged to have shot Elliot "in the heat of passion and

The shooting occurred when Davis diphtheria." was called to the curb by Elliot twice with a shot gun. 

New Mexico during the special permit season, extending from October 1 to 5 inclusive, will be issued by the state department of game and fish until the 300 to be granted have been issued, it was announced by Elliott S. Barker, state game warden.

It was originally planned to have a drawing on September 1, today, at which time the names of the 300 permittees would be determined. Owing to the fact that many hunters did not receive advice concerning the season in time the department has decided to extend the period for receiving applications until the 300 have been

Permits will be issued, therefore to the first 300 making application in the order in which they are received. In the event there are more than 300 received prefernce will be given to those received according to priority.

The special permit season on antelope allows the killing of one buck having forked horns in an area in Catron and Socorro counties. Conditions governing antelope hunting may be obtained from the department of game and fish. The special permit calls for the payment of a \$10 fee by any hunter who holds a big game license. No permit will be issued to those who do not hold such a

German Folk Festivals Recall Old Traditions

Many a tradition and ancient observance have succumbed to the frantic speed and insanity of an increasingly materialistic age, but one still finds in Germany folk festivals that go back many centuries for their beginnings. This is especially true of religious festivals-like that of Oberammergau-in Bavaria, and other parts of the country where the population is predominantly Roman Catholic. In some instances, despite the march of secular and sordid trends, these archaic celebrations are perhaps more affectionately observed than ever before.

The "Leonhardtritt," or procession of St. Leonard, which takes place in parts of Bavaria every November, is one of the most popular of these old anniversaries. The most notable festival in honor of this saint is held annually at Bad Toelz, a spar renowned for its lodine springs, where thousands of sufferers from goiter and sclerosis seek relief. This famous resort is in the center of a rich farming and grazing country, and as St. Leonard has been the patron of cattle and other live stock ever since the Seventeenth century, it seems only befitting that his day should be specially honored here. In these ceremonies numbers of domestic animals, especially horses, are included, moving in columns around the churches, in humble obeisance to their patron and protector. Dancing and feasting on the part of the villagers generally end the day .-
