



A TRAIT THAT STICKS

This is a tendency to blame our misfortunes on some other person or possibly on some unseen thing. Even the road hog will blame the other fellow in case of an auto accident. Instances are rare where an auto accident occurs and both drivers agree to share the blame equally. It is much easier to blame the other fellow, because it for fuel this winter. salves one's conscience to cogitate over some sort of a mishap until the individual actually leads himself to believe that the other fellow or the other thing is wholly responsible for his own misfortune.

Welfare workers tell us that a number of individuals who have applied for aid in the past are largely to blame for the plight in which they find themselves. There is a class of people who even in good times, live from day to day and in case of unexpected misfortune they must call on charity for assistance. Quite naturally the position of the unfortunate is magnified when the number of unemployed are taken into consideration.

There are several factors to be taken into consideration when a people endeavor to improve their position, but after all the principal source of aid must come from individual initiative.

A STEP TOWARD PROSPERITY

In a recent address, John Hays Hammond urged the rehabilitation of silver as a step toward the restoration of prosperity.

He pointed out that one of the major causes of world depression has been the appreciation of gold in gold-standard countries, and the depreciation of silver in silver-standard countries. The drop of silver from 60 to 30 cents an ounce has reduced by half the wealth and purchasing power of millions of people. Silver has long been the poor man's gold-and in what Mr. Hammond calls the "backward" countries, silver alone is accepted as a medium

There is not gold enough to keep the commerce of the world in motion. In addition, the supply of gold from the Rand, which has supplied half the world's needs for three decades, is expected to decline materially. No potentially important gold fields are known to exist. A practical solution is rehabilitation of silver so that it may take its old place in the machinery of finance and wings — anterior, posterior and pounds of butterfat per cow per bacteria.

AN OVER SUPPLY OF DEER REPORTED IN THE LINCOLN FOREST

Sportsmen who have visited the Lincoln National Forest said they predicted state game officials will permit a second open season after the first one this month.

The sportsmen estimated there are 13,000 deer and 2,250 turkeys in the forest. Their estimates were based on figures supplied by the forest officers in the field.

The deer are very plentiful in the entire Alamo canyon watershed and the sportsmen have suggested the second open season as a means of relieving the overstocked condition.

The regular season this year is from October 25 to November 10. During the season last year, which was shorter, there were 2,100 hunters in the field and 1,300 deer and 500 turkeys were killed.

Wild game has increased despite heavy losses through predatory animals, forest reports indicated. During 1931 it was estimated 1,100 deer were killed by are 2,000 predatory coyotes in the forest; 1,400 bobcats and 100

Protection is given against typhoid fever by immunization with typhoid vaccine. The immunization should be repeated at least every three years to maintain the protection. Some doctors, including the writer, believe that the vaccine may be taken by mouth. This method has the advantages of avoiding reactions.

I don't like the depression, because no one is happy. Even my not ahead, wife, who smiles in prosperous times, cannot get a kick out of dull ones. HUNDRED ATTEND THE C. OF C. LUNCHEON

Approximately 100 members and guests attended the monthly luncheon of the Artesia Chamber of Commerce yesterday noon and heard the monthly report of Fred Brainard, manager and the annual resume of the activities of the organization discussed by Mark Corbin, president. Ex-Governor Dillon and a party of republican speakers were guests of the Artesia hotel management. Several other out of town visitors were present from Carlsbad, Roswell and Hobbs.

The monthly report of Mr Brainard was brief. He touched on the annual flower show, stating that it was attracting increasing attention each year and that the dahlia growers here had affiliated with the national dahlia show.

Mr. Brainard also told of the efforts to secure an agricultural loan bank for the state, but said up to date a bank had not been located in the state and that this section had been placed in the Wichita, Kansas district. In mentioning the federal crop loan, the speaker stated that Eddy county was leading the state in the repayment of the loans and that this region was leading the United States. The Chamber of Commerce directors endorsed the amendment No. 1 to the state constitution and the proposed amendment was explained.

The welfare board co-operating with the Chamber of Commerce had requested Artesia's quota of ready made clothing for the needy from the Red Cross. The Artesia junior baseball club was discussed by Mr. Brainard, who explained the workings of the league.

Col. Woods announced that he had received a telegram from Owen D. Sherrell of Dallas, regional director of the federal crop loan stating that the organization would continue to function and would possibly be expanded.

Mark Corbin, president took occasion to introduce the visitors and guests before giving his resume of the year's work of the Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Corbin stated that the Chamber of Commerce and the welfare board had handled about \$2000 in funds during the past year. In addition the welfare board had distributed to the needy 1,100 sacks of Red Cross flour, 750 cans of meats and vegetables, 1,000 pounds of beans, 300 pounds of dried fruits, and much old and used clothing. In all Mr. Corbin said that approximately 6,000 people had been aided in the past year.

The remainder of Mr. Corbin's address was devoted to the establishment of the Sacramento Methodist Assembly and the improvements on highway 83.



STOCKMEN MAY NOW **GET FEDERAL LOANS**

Federal loans for stockmen of southeastern New Mexico will be available immediately, B. C. Culp, director of the Agricultural Credit corporation for four states, anthe Roswell Dispatch.

A regional office will be estabience of stockmen of this section of the state and in order that the applications and loans may be facilitated, Mr. Culp announced.

Applications for loans are to filed in the local office on mates. blanks prescribed for the pur-Following the application inspection of the stock will be made by inspectors designated for the purpose, it was said and the applications and reports of the inspector in charge will then be forwarded to the Wichita, Kansas office, for final examination.

The local office is only a temporary setup, Mr. Culp explained and is for the purpose of avoiding delay in the filing of applications and the consummation of loans. Under the system worked out at Roswell, the inspection will immediately follow the filing of applications in the Roswell office, otherwise the application would have to go to Wichita, then come back to Roswell for the inspect-

Another branch office for the state of New Mexico has been located in Albuquerque to handle the loans originating in the northern, central and western portions of New Mexico. The Albuquerque office was established Monday and is already functioning.

"This is federal money being loaned direct from the United States to the stockman," Mr. Culp explained Tuesday. "A total of \$3,000,000 is available for loans sum is exhausted, if it is, additional loans may be made by rediscounts through the Federal Reserve bank," Mr. Culp announced.

Loans will be made for a period of one year on range stock and federal loans will be made for six or eight months, or for the duration of the feeding period, it was announced.
