PENASCO BRIDGE REPAIRED



PASADENA, California, - The uestion "why are blue eyes blue," can be answered at the William G. Kerchoff biological laboratories. They are like the blue sky.

In fact, neither the blue sky, nor lue eyes, are blue.

It is just a matter of reflected light. That causes one to see them in that restful color.

Blue eyes are really colorless biological research has revealed, there being an absence of pigment in the outer layer of the iris so that the inner layer is exposed. It conteins a whitish substance. The reflected light makes this appear blue because in the scattering of light the shorter rays are scattered more readily, and these short wave lengths are in the blue spectrum. If longer wave lengths were scattered more readily than shorter wave lengths these eyes and the sky would appear yellow.

Then comes the question "Why are brown eyes brown?" Biologists have found that brown eyes are present in those people where there is much brilliant sunlight. The dark eye, or brown pigment, protects the retina against too much light from the sun. Biologists find that in all other respects blue-eyed individuals appear to be as capable as dark-eyed individuals.





Plague Bacillus Found

by Japanese Scientist The paths that lead to obscurity and fame are ever present in the field of science. Baron Shihasaburo Kitasato spent all his long life on the most painstaking researches on tuberculosis without making one new and really important contribution to our knowledge of the disease. But he discovered the bacillus of plague in a few days.

Forty years earlier, Dr. Claude Lillington relates in Hygeia Magazine, the world had settled down to the comfortable conviction that plague had little more historical interest and that modern sanitation had banished it from our midst. In 1894 an epidemic of plague broke out in Hongkong which startled the entire world. Kitasato, who had been sent from Japan to Germany to study under the eminent scientist Robert Koch, hurried back to his own country. Two days after Kitasato had arrived in Hongkong, he had found numerous bacilli in the infected glands and in the heart of a patient who had died of plague. In a few days Kitasato again cabled Koch to tell him that he had succeeded in cultivating the bacillus artificially.

I have no vicious or intemperate habits which m at any time interfere with the performance of the official duties of the office.

The office of Probate Judge is a judicial office. The duties and jurisdic are prescribed by law. No question of policy with which political parties conthemselves is involved. While many are inclined to regard the office as a m office, it is in truth and in fact an office of great dignity and touches the of humans more closely than any other governmental agency.

The principal function of the Probate Court in this county is its jurisdic in the probating of estates. But also has jurisdiction in the matter of esche adoption proceeding, the appointment and control over guardians, and in the ma of orphan and indigent children. All of these matters involve questions of which a competent lawyer can pass upon more satisfactorily than can a layn. It is only fair to state that under the laws of this State a layman is eligible to elected to the office, but this is a concession made necessary because a procourt is indispensible and in many counties a lawyer is not available for the posit

While there are fewer probate cases here than in more populous counties communities, yet those having an interest in the probating of an estate, either an heir, legatee, devisee, creditor, or otherwise, are as vitally interested in the I ters coming within the jurisdiction of the probate court that they be dealt with accordance with the established principles of law as the the docket were crow with probate cases. It is a regrettable fact that too often a considerable por of estates in probate are dissipated and squandered by the allowance of exces charges and fees, due to a lack of knowledge on the part of the probate judge to what are lawful and proper alllowances and charges. Also improper decisions which wellwhich make an appeal to a higher court necessary result in unnecessary expe and delay. Legal questions present themselves in every stage of the proceeding

AN OPEN LETTER

my stewardship: (1) During this period of time the educational qualification of the average rural teacher has been increased from a little less than two years of college training, to two and one-half years of college training.

(2) The instructional service rendered in our rural schools has been improved through better trained teachers, texts furnished all indigent children and the furnishing in sufficient amount all necessary school supplies.

(3) Introduced use of standard graduation tests for all children completing the eighth grade of rural schools. (4) Particular attention has been given to the safety factor of school transportation. For the first time school busses have been required to carry alll safety devices. All trucks have been compelled to carry Public Liability Insurance, thus protecting you against any financial loss incurred by reason of your child being injured in any accident while riding to and from school.

(5) An honest attempt has been made to curtail school expense keeping in mind the interest of our school and justice to the teachers as well as regard for the

taxpayers ability to pay. Direct charge accounts for all rural schools of North Eddy County have been reduced as much as from 200 to 400 per cent. The Rural Administrative Account (Office account of County Superintendent)

during this period has been reduced 30 per cent. Both Direct Charge accounts and Rural Administrative reductions were made at the insistence of your County Superintendent, and not as a result of demands made by taxpayers.

The above statements are simple facts, taken from the public records of Eddy I am now asking your support in my race for a second term. It has been my purpose to maintain and improve the efficiency of our rural schools, attempting to hold our nine month term, yet keeping our expenditures within the taxpayers ability to pay. SANTA FE-Democratic state headquarters issued a statement expressing the belief that Governor Arthur Seligman, democratic candidate seeking re-election as governor, will be re-elected by a plurality of anything from 8,-000 upward.

Using the vote cast for Dillon in 1928 as a basis, headquarters said there was a turnover of more than 10,000 to the democratic party in 1930. WATER LEVEL IN THE VALLEY IS HIGHEST SINCE YEAR OF 1927

Water levels in the Pecos valley are now higher than at any time during 1931. Clifford Smith, artesian well supervisor announced at Roswell Saturday. The peak was reached last year in the latter part of December and during the ealy days of January, Mr. Smith said.

The water level as shown on the Orchard Park recorder is now 1.7 feet higher than at any time since 1925. The nearest approach to its present level, the records show, was in January, 1927. The Berrendo and Artesia recorders are still about 2.5 lower than the level reached in the winter of 1927.

Water will continue to rise in the valley for the next two months, Mr. Smith said, and it is expected that the levels on the Berrendo and at Artesia will show a winter high greater than that recorded in 1927.

Mr. Smith says that the plugging of the large artesian well across the Pecos river southeast of Roswell and the plugging of other wells in various parts of the valley, especially those on the Oasis ranch, are responsible for the high water level recorded at Orchard Park. which is about four feet higher in proportion thn levels in Artesia and the Berrendo district.





NEW MEXICO COTTON IMPROVES IN QUALITY

In recent grade and staple reases by the Bureau of Agricultural THURSDAY NIGHT Arizona and California, New Mexico showed a larger perceentage of otton in the higher classes and better staples than either of the other states, says G. R. Quesenberry, of the New Mexico state college. This shows that the cotton improvement program, fostered by the New Mexico State College and the New Mexico Crop Improvement Association is obtaining definite and progressive

> The staple lengths reflect on the work done by the Extension Service during the past eight years, in cooperation with the New Mexico Crop Improvement Association. Pure seed has been released thru the Extension Sevice to the different crop improvement units in every county where cotton is grown. In this release 34 per cent of the New Mexico cotton staples run from 1 1-16 to 1 3-32 inches, and 66 per cent to 1 1-8 inches and better. This was the highest record of any state. All the cotton ginned was tenderable. The grades show 78 per cent of extra white good middling and better and 22 per cent extra white strict

New Mexico cotton growers have practically eliminated all cotton except Acala and little seed planted during the past year was more than two years removed from certified seed. This cotton is demanding a premium over other cotton sufficient to more than cover the freight from

The Acclimatization Station at State College, which is under the direction of the Bureau of Plant Industry, is, at present, turning its stocks of seed over to the College. These are then released by the Extension Agronomist to the individual crop improvement units in the various counties and they in turn are distributing this seed to farmers in follow out the mandatory provision their immediate vicinity, thus making certified and pure seed available to every cotton grower in New Mexico. Not only is the staple of this cotton holding up, but, according to the Census Bureau figures, the acre yield of lint has been increasing in New Mexico for the past ten years.
