

On the heels of the announcement of neighboring counties applying for federal relief for maintaining public schools, and other counties faced with the problem of an early closing, the announcement from the office of County Superintendent H. R. Rodgers that the schools of Eddy county now have sufficient funds on hand for the operation of a full term of nine months comes as a welcome relief to taxpayers and school patrons alike.

The wholesome condition of the schools of Eddy county can be directly attributed to the fine spirit of the taxpayer and to the administrative acumen and watchdog policies of the school boards superintendents of the rural and municipal school systems of

Eddy county in the spring of 931 was the first county of New Mexico to realize the seriousness conditions confronting taxpayers and those to whom the public schols must look for support, and to begin a curtailment of school expenses. The fact that today schools of Eddy county are debt free, operating on a budget of 40% less than that of four years ago, is ample proof of the wisdom of the policies of the

present school authorities. Credit should also be given to the county superintendent of schools for the present day condition in the rural schools. Careful planning of school budgets and the reduction of expenses wherever possible has enabled the county to maintain its educational standards in the face of a dereasing revenue.





Slave Breeding Continues

Slaves are actually bred in certain parts of Arabia and Africa. Some of the mothers are sold from one owner to another and rarely see their children again. The total number of slaves in the world exceeds 5,000,000, more than the population of Scotland. These were among the startling statements made by the secretary of the Anti-Slavery society, at a public meeting in Glasgow, Scotland, to commemorate the abolition of slavery in British possessions 100 years ago.

Six Different Vitamins

The term "vitamin" is considerable of a mystery to the average individual. As a matter of fact six different vitamins have been identified, namely vitamins A, B1 (or F), B2 (or G), C, D and E. The apparent conflict in these designations has arisen as a result of simultaneous discoveries and Christenings in this and in foreign countries. Vitamin E is the one most recently isolated and its most prolific source is the wheat germ.

Indian Reservations

Almost every state contains nonreservation Indians who have adopt reservations are territories set apart as homes for the Indian charges of the nation, where they are protected and taught. 



Money Market Terms

The term "cables" is a money market term for cable orders or cable transfers, also a money market report term under which the rates of exchange for such orders or transfers are quoted. According to "Escher's Foreign Exchange Explained," the prices of sight drafts and long bills are fundamentally based on the price of cables. The first thing in the morning the foreign exchange banker, say in New York, receives a cablegram from his correspondent in London, telling him just what the rate on New York is over there. With this information on hand, he is in a position to commence buying and selling. The rate for cables having been established, it is easy enough to fix the price of demand drafts, the latter being cheaper by an amount corresponding to ten days' interest. When a banker sells a cable he makes immediate payment out of his balance abroad. When, however, he sells a sight draft, his balance abroad remains undisturbed for eight or nine or ten days, which is the quickest time in which the draft he has sold can be presented for encashment. Naturally he will charge less than when ne sells a cable and loses the use of his money at once.



SALIENT FACTS IN **COTTON COMPARISON**

The profits of cotton growing are determined on each farm by the price received above a given cost of production, says G. R. Quesenberry of the New Mexico Strictly Cash With Copy State College. This cost may vary from farm to farm, but each additional dollar above that cost adds to the profits and comfort of the particular farmer.

A complete summry of al cotton produced from registered seed was compared with that grown from foundation seed released by the college, and also with the state totals of all cotton grown in New Mexico, to get the value of registered seed to the individual farmer.

tion stocks of seed all graded Primary: strict middling and better. The first year releases, or cotton grown from registered seed, classed 97.56% strict middling and better; the state totals 90.1% in this class. This shows conclusively, as in the past, that College Acala is storm proof and does not readily string or drop, as many varieties do. Some individual farmers growing registered seed showed every bale grown by them in the strict middling and better class, also 1 1/8 inch class and better. All registered seed growers showed almost 100% in this highest class up to December 15.

The actual value of cotton grown by registered seed growers was approximately \$3.75 per bale more than that grown by other New Mexico farmers.

Pure seed is now reflected in all cotton produced in the state. On the May market, middling 7/8 inch cotton is worth 11.16 cents per pound, f. o. b. 



The building is constructed of brick and rock-the basement being of the last mentioned material and the two stories of brick, burned by a pioneer named Weldon, well remembered by old Mr. Weldon not only burned the brick, but together with his son and several other bricklayers, put them into the walls. The construction of the building was under the direction of G. W. ("Boston") Witt, still a citizen of the Pecos valley, living in Lovington. "Boston" was assisted by Ed. Wilson, still a citizen of Carlsbad, but incapacitated by age and an accident which confines him in the Eddy County hospital. So much for the early history of the court house.

The picture shown above is a splendid and true likeness of the first court house of Eddy county and has housed many men and women who have taken a leading part in the history of the Pecos valley. The county jail, at first located in the stone part, and the county offices on the first floor, the third story being given over to the court officials-court room, judge and jury rooms and clerk's

The county clerk occupied the first room on the right as you enter the building from the south, and on the same side was the office of the assessor, directly opposite being the office of the county treasurer, the sheriff having office directly opposite that of the county clerk.

It is hard to remember names of people for almost a half century, but the writer remembers hazily; the first board of county commissioners, which authorized the issuing of bonds for the construction of the court house-J. O. Camerson, from the first district; R. H. Pierce, the second, and-I forget the name of the man from

the third. Later on, in 1915, an addition not shown in the above picture, was built and the county offices were moved to the new partone of the finest and most substantial buildings in the state, being absolutely fire-proof, being built of brick, steel and stone,

with marble floors and stairways. But before I mention the new part it would be well perhaps for me to say something of the present jail, which is built across a little driveway directly north of the old building.
