Resident Tuberculosis

Mexico is simply and solely a probthe tuberculosis problem in New lem of health seekers coming into the state from elsewhere. It is certain that New Mexico cannot afford to provide free treatment for the tuberculosis population of the United States. But have we no tuberculosis problem of our own? This was one of the questions that the Health Survey set out to answer. The survey doctor, a physician with special experience of them 63 who surely had tuberculosis and 76 who probably had it. a total of 139. Of this number residence in the state was not determined. Of the remaining 136 all but 14 have lived in the state for two years or more; 101 have

It is, perhaps, not probable that health seekers recently come to the state because they know that they have tuberculosis would attend a health examination. I do not at all tuberculous in the state have lived here more than four years. But it does appear that of the 10,000 or more cases which Doctor Buck estimates as our state problem three quarters have lived here for more
