



Christmas Trees

By MARJORIE HAYES in Boston Herald

TEARLY every one has Christmas tree nowadays, but if you had been a child in America a hundred years ago the chances are that you might never have seen one. The custom was universal in England many years before it was very common here. except in communities of German or Scandinavian settlers. For it was in Germany that the Christmas tree had its origin. There are several different legends in regard to it. Here is one which dates from the Twelfth century:

An English monk named Winfred who had gone as a missionary into Germany, came upon some priests about to sacrifice the young prince Asulf to the god Thor beneath the "blood oak." He stopped their ceremonies and ordered them to cut down the oak, whereupon a young fir tree appeared in its place which Winfred told them signified the tree of life, or of Christly living. From that time Germans who became Christians made the fir a part of the Christmas festival, decorating

The spruce tree is pyramidal in shape, the long cones hanging from the branches near the top. The needles are arranged in spiral rows around the stem, those at the top pointing sharply upward. They have three or four distinctly angled sides. Some common varieties are the red, black, white and Norway

Another evergreen sometimes used as a Christmas tree is the hemlock. It is more slender than the spruce, with feathery waving branches which grow very close to the ground. The needles are ar ranged in two flat rows on the twigs. and have tiny stems. They are



MONUMENT TOWNSITE IS SOLD FOR TAXES

The townsite of Monument was sold for delinquent taxes at the sale on December 3rd, according to the Lovington Leader. The amount of taxes charged against the property was \$83, and it was bought by Mr. Payton of Hobbs for \$84, that being the highest bid.

Monument is one of the oldest of Lea county towns. In fact, it is much older as a town than Lea county is as a county, having been established before the creation of the county while that territory was still a part of Eddy county.

When the oil boom came just after the discovery of the Hobbs oil pool, a new townsite was surveyed and platted and some of the lots were sold. But with the delay of oil activities, interest in townsites, and especially those in wildcat oil territory, dwindled and Monument went the way of other oil townsites. Taxes have not been paid on these vacant lots for several years and hence they were offered for sale last Monday with the result of being sold.
