country," Col. Henry L. Doherty, chairman of the 1935 Birthday Ball for the President, called on leaders who raised a million dollars last January for the Warm Springs Foundation to redouble their efforts in the 1935 campaign.

Money raised at the parties, which will be held in communities throughout the nation on the evening of January 30, will be divided this year, following a suggestion made by President Roosevelt himself. At his request, embodying the recommendation of the trustees of Georgia Warm Springs Foundation, no part of this year's fund will go to that institution. Seventy cents of every dollar will be used for the rehabilitation of handicapped children within the community raising the fund or within the geographic unit of which the community is a part. The other thirty cents will be

"Only by a renewed and far more comprehensive effort this year can we hope to launch a successful nationwide drive that will eventually succeed in stopping the disease and in giving adequate aid to its victms," Col. Doherty said.

He emphasized that the disease, unlike smallpox, tuberculosis, cancer, diphtheria, typhoid fever, yellow fever, and similar maladies, has not until recently been given its proper importance as a national menace.

The need for funds to fight it, he pointed out, is best summarized in a statement made by the late William H. Woodin, former Secretary of the Treasury, who said: "To be very, very conservative, infantile par-

"Again being radically conservative," Col. Doherty stated, "this last expenditure can be estimated by multiplying the estimated number of victims-200,000 for the nation-by the cost of caring for each of them during a year. Put the figure at \$300-a ridiculously low sum-and you have an annual curative cost of \$60,000,000. No wonder the President has so generously loaned his birthday anniversary in 1935 to another nation-wide party dedicated to financing the war against the disease!"




