

The reported planting intentions have been analyzed and interpreted to a potential harvest-acreage base assuming that the growers' planting intentions for 1935 will bear somewhat similar relationship to the acreage eventually harvested as has prevailed in the past. In other words, the adjustments may be said to allow for average invarious causes and similar exigencies.

The figures are to be considered only as indicative of the probable acreage for harvest judging by plans now reported by growers. 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

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



One that is usually quite serious

is undulant fever, also called

brucellosis. This is a disease that

Although common in Mexico this

worm is not found often in the

United States. Moreover we are

protected from it by meat inspection if we buy meat with the gov-

ernment stamp on it. The disease

we catch most commonly from

pigs, however, is trichinosis and

against this disease meat inspec-

tion is no protection. This point

deserves emphasis. It is not commonly known that microscopic ex-

amination for trichinella spiralis

was abandoned in 1907; partly no

doubt because even with such an

examination it is impossible to be

sure that the meat is not infested.

The trichinella spiralis is a

worm that lives its brief adult life

in the hog's intestine. Mr. Worm

is one sixteenth of an inch long

and his wife almost twice as long

as he is. When she has been an

adult for about ten days Mrs.

Worm gives birth to 1,000 or more

babies each one two hundred and

fiftieth of an inch in length. These

babies get into the blood stream

and thence to the muscles. Having

grown to ten times their original

size they curl up each into a

larva. The larval cysts are so

small and so much the same color

as muscle that when you look at

your pork you cannot possibly see

them without a microscope. If you

eat them uncooked the larvae come

out of their cysts in your intestine

and in two or three days are adult

worms. About two weeks after the

pork is eaten thousands and thou-

sands of new babies are in your

blood and burrowing into your

muscles. Whether you live or die

depends on how many thousands

there are. Unless the doctor knows

you have been eating raw sausage

or undone pork he will not be

likely to knnw what is wrong. He may think you have rheumatism or

nfluenza or even typhoid fever. There is only one way of guarding against trichinosis: If you eat

pork, be sure that is is well cooked.

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
