



A STORY ABOUT SOLDIERS

in it." What you heard was half a story that the world should know

things a man wants his little nephews who love him so to believe

was born behind the eight ball with two strikes on him.

It doesn't tell about the nights of stark mad fear when shells dropping all around you and the men you have learned to love that queer detached way that is war are falling all around you.

It doesn't give you any idea of how it feels to look out the wind of a hospital and see a nurse lead two men, one on each side, do the hill to where the captured German guns are so carefully displayed. You don't see how the men are permitted to run their hands along the shining steel barrels and feel the little black and white notice that by planting more trees and devise ways and means of hiding trash tells where they were captured. The pair helped capture them. But piles and dump heaps. they can't see them. They are blind. Both of them are blind.

It doesn't tell you of the agonies of gas. How you swallow and cleaner more attractive farms. gag and spew and wish God would let you die right then. And then you spend days and weeks in agony. You can't eat. You can't sleep.

It doesn't tell you of the men who went over the top on a cold and rainy morning. They trotted into eternity, Billy. Barking machine guns, standing almost ghostly in the dimness, cut them down. I've seen a buddy grab at his belly and hold on to his entrails. He had been almost cut in two by machine gun fire. His nerves carried him a few feet but he never got up.

It doesn't tell you of the high explosive shells that came over during the terrible barrages that both sides laid down. Shells that plopped into the mud near you and nearly severed the head of a man standing eighteen inches from you. His head rolled to one side and for what seemed an eternity he stood stock still. Finally, of course, he fell into the trench.

No, Billy, it tells you nothing of these things. It's a beautiful book and I'm proud to have my picture in it. I guess I was a firstrate soldier. They say so anyway.

So, little boy, that is all I can give to you. They tell me that I haven't much longer now. I guess that's best. It's gotten pretty tough the past few months. I don't seem to have any patience any more.

Plant more trees and shrubbery.


