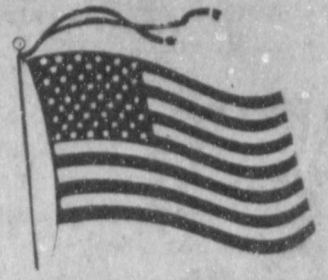

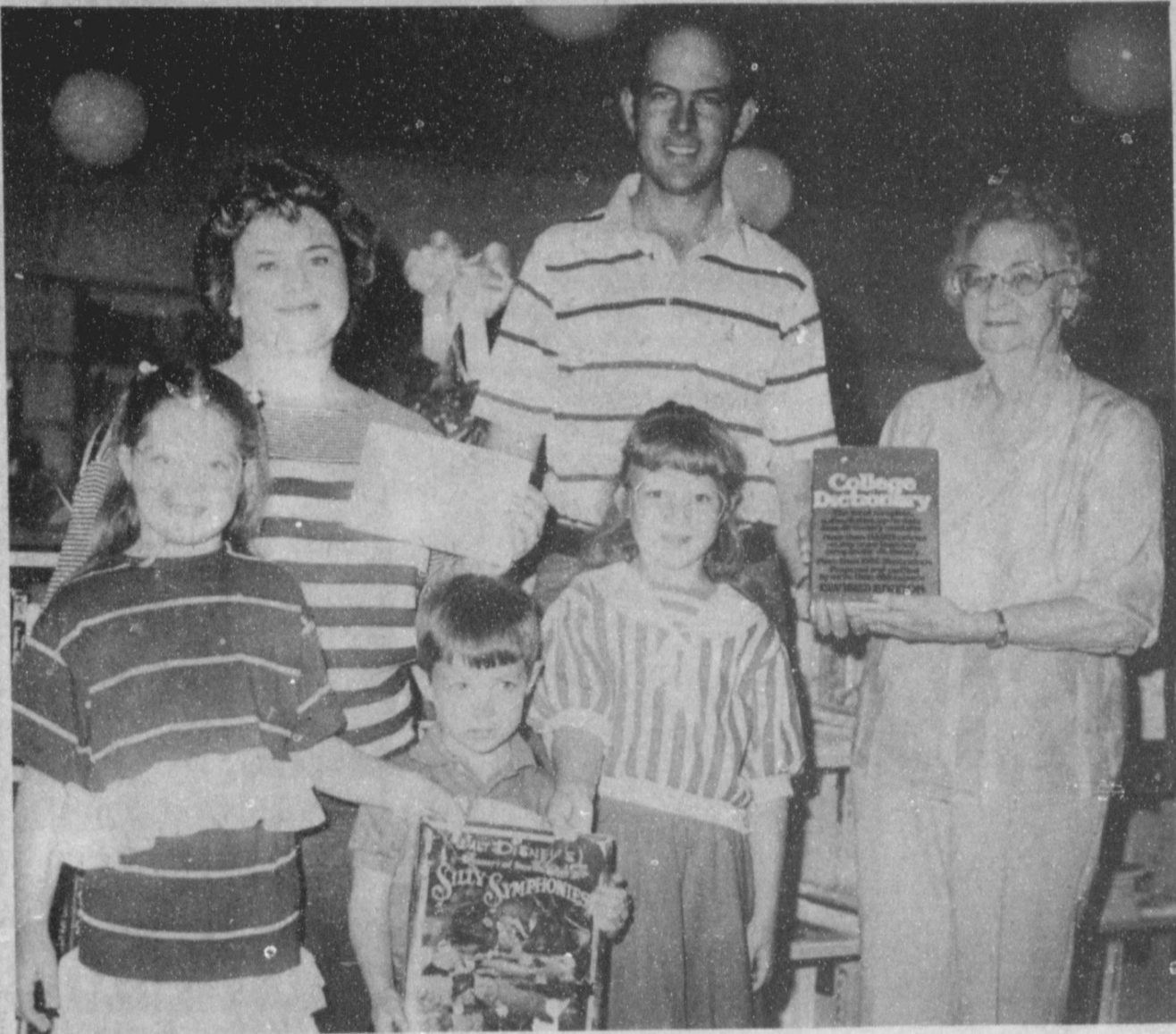

## U.S. Post Office Official Gives Rotary USPS Rates, Services

At Rotary Tuesday, it was a day for the United States Postal Service. Muleshoe Postmaster Abel Arguello was in charge of the program and introduced Janice Starns, director of Marketing Services for the USPS. She explained many of the services offered by the US Postal Service.

"You're all familiar with mail carriers. Everyone knows about that, but, what you may not know is that the Postal Service has 67 other products and services."

She exhibited the new rate chart for the USPS which gives discount rates and delivery times. It spells out Postal insurance and how various mail

can be covered up to half a million dollars. This would include such things as payroll checks and legal documents.

She suggested that people take a look at what the USPS can offer for the mailing 'dollar' as compared to other overnight mailing or shipping services.

She told of pre-print labels available for corporate accounts during the last two years, and how there are now six different ways to pay postage on first class mail.

Ms. Starns told how pre-sorting mailings, which are in excess of 500 pieces each time, can save the business money. She also explained how pre-sort plus the 'zip-plus four' can save

additional money.

The Postal Official also explained about 250-piece mailing and who is eligible and said .9 cents can be saved on 250-piece mailing on the zip-plus four mailings.

"The United States Post Office continues to grow," she added, "and more and more, is turning to automated processing. During the last five years, mail volume has gone up 30 percent, but there are 250 less workers in the section of Texas she covers.

According to Ms. Starns, 94-96 percent of all USPS mail is from the business customer, with the other four percent comprised of personal communications.

A lot of the mail volume today is advertisement mailing, she added.

## It's All For The Birds-- Racing Pigeons, That Is!

Muleshoe has had all kinds of races over the years, horse races, mule races, foot races, and yes -- even elephant races -- this reporter knows for a fact, having ridden one of the elephants.

Last weekend, a different type of racing came to Muleshoe...pigeon racing.

That's right, around 4 p.m. last Friday, Bruce and Alice Byrom of San Antonio checked into the Heritage House Inn with a 16 foot trailer containing approximately 1,200 racing pigeons.

The Byroms, who reside in a suburb of San Antonio did not own the racing pigeons, but officially handle the pigeons for a combine of two different San Antonio clubs, Woodlawn and All City Flying.

They were to release all the pigeons simultaneously at 7:30 a.m. behind the Heritage House Inn, weather permitting.

Their watches had been synchronized with watches in San Antonio for this closely timed race.

In talking with the Byroms late Friday evening, it was found that each pigeon had been banded, with witnesses, immediately prior to loading into special carrying crates on the 16-foot trailer.

On arrival back in San Antonio, the pigeons would immediately have the band removed and placed into a special box that would immediately record the arrival time.

After all the pigeons arrived, the arrival time would be put on computer to determine the winner of the race.

The special bred pigeons fly at about 50 mph depending on

weather conditions, and Muleshoe was determined to be 400 air miles from San Antonio.

Byrom and his wife explained that the pigeons would stay together at first, and swarm when first released from the trailer.

"The pigeons are easy prey at that point," said Byrom, "because they are flying close to the ground until they get their bearings.

"Then the birds tend to separate somewhat and the faster birds are soon out of sight of the others."

He explained that racing pigeons are born and raised at the owners' houses. When they are in training, they are first

**CITY IRRIGATION RATE EFFECTIVE THIS MONTH 6,000 GALS. FOR \$2.00**  
Effective April 1 the summer water irrigation rate is in vogue for municipal users according to the city secretary.

The regular rate has been a minimum charge of \$2.00 per month for the first 3,000 gallons, while the special rate permits use of 6,000 for that price, with a charge of 12 1/2 per 1,000 used over that amount. The rate will be effective until October 1 this year.

Mayor Lewis is commenting on the special offer stated he hoped many of the citizens would take advantage of the art to beautify their lawns and flower beds, giving them plenty of water for rapid growth, thus improving the general appearance of the city.

taken out for 5-10 mile flights, then the trainers start lengthening their flying miles. The birds start racing when they are 7-8 months old. A year old bird is considered to be an old bird. Most racing pigeons race for five to six years, although 10 year old birds have been in competition. September and October is the racing season for young birds. They compete on eight weekends, and the farthest they fly is 300 air miles, or near the Lamesa area, according to Byrom. The young birds start racing at 100 miles, then 150 miles, but never start at over 300 miles. Old birds, those a year, or older, race in the spring. They start at 150 miles, and graduate to 500 miles. Next week, the birds will be released at Santa Rosa, N.M. to wend their way back to San Antonio. The birds are very carefully raised, well-fed and receive medication, including shots (in their neck). As the weather cooperated, and it was clear, a bright sun beginning to peep up, and a

light, very cold wind on Saturday morning, it was an awesome sight as the nearly 1,200 birds immediately swooped from their cages, swarmed together almost immediately, and were almost immediately out of sight, on their way home to San Antonio. The Byroms said that depending on weather conditions, the birds may be flying as low as fence-top, if it is cloudy, or soaring out of sight, in the bright sunshine as they head for home. In the trailer, they left behind a number of freshly laid, and fertile, pigeon eggs. On Saturday, May 14, at approximately 7:30 a.m., another 1,200 pigeons are expected to be released, on the second leg of their spring flights. Onlookers will be welcomed to watch the unique race start in Muleshoe.

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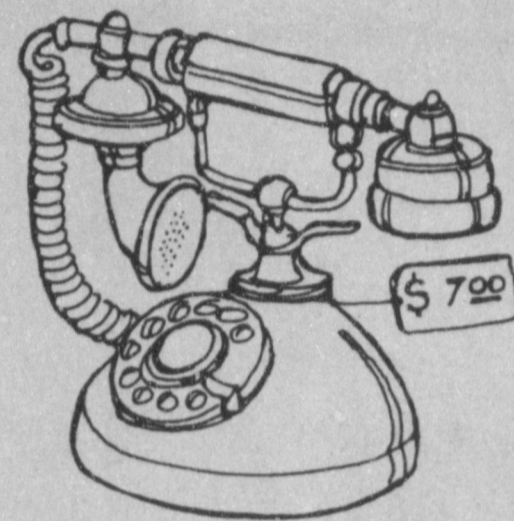
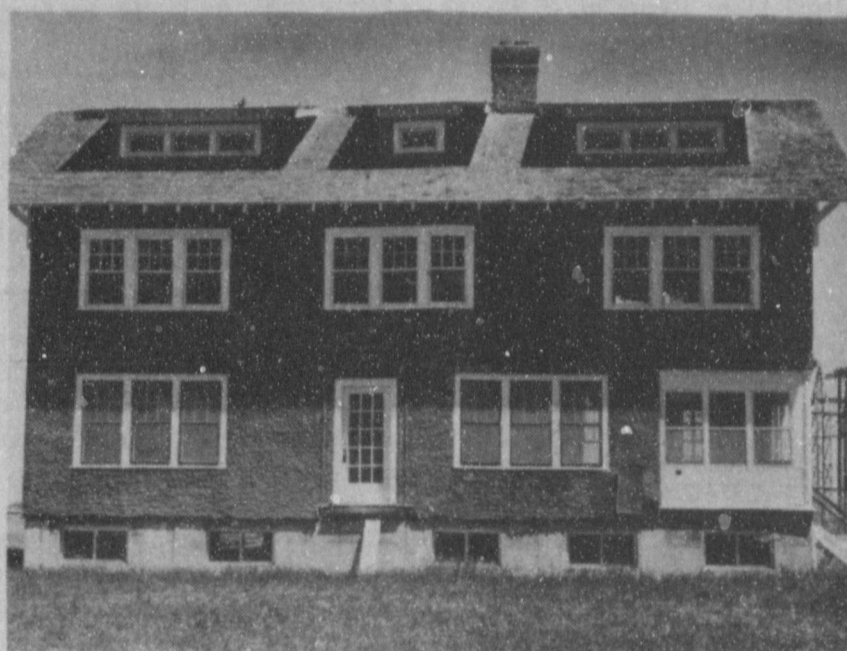
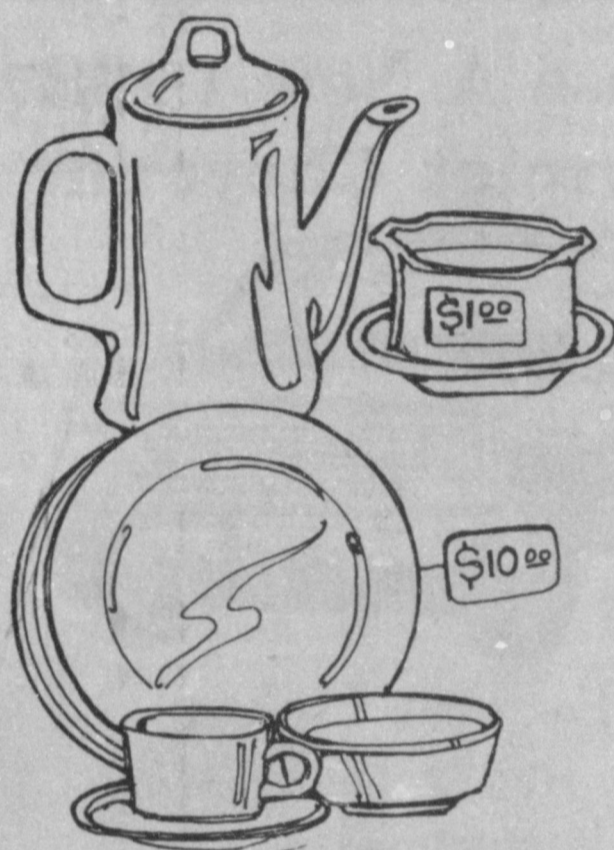

## National Honor Society Purposes, Policies Given

The purpose of the National Honor Society shall be to create enthusiasm for scholarship, to stimulate a desire to render service, to promote leadership, and to develop character in the students of secondary schools.

Membership in the National Honor Society is an honor bestowed upon students. Selection for membership in the Muleshoe Chapter of the National Honor Society is based on outstanding scholarship, character, leadership and service. The selection is made by the faculty council. Once selected, members have the responsibility to continue to demonstrate these qualities. Members who resign or are dismissed are never again eligible for membership or its benefits.

To be eligible for membership, a student must be a second semester junior or a senior. The candidate must have

been in attendance in Muleshoe High School for one semester. Students must have a 3.6 grade point. Students with this scholastic requirement are evaluated on the basis of service, leadership, and character. The selection of each member to the chapter shall be by a majority vote of the faculty council.

A National Honor Society member who transfers to Muleshoe High School and brings a letter from the former principal or chapter advisor shall be accepted automatically as a member of the Muleshoe chapter of the National Honor Society providing the student meets the classification requirement. Transfer members must meet chapter's standards within one semester in order to retain membership.

Members who fall below the standards which were the basis for their selection shall be

warned in writing by the Chapter advisor and given a reasonable amount of time to correct the deficiency. Immediate dismissal may take place in the case of a member falling below a 3.5 cumulative grade average or for flagrant violation of school rules or civil laws and does not require a warning.

### Dale Keeling 'Educator' Of The Week

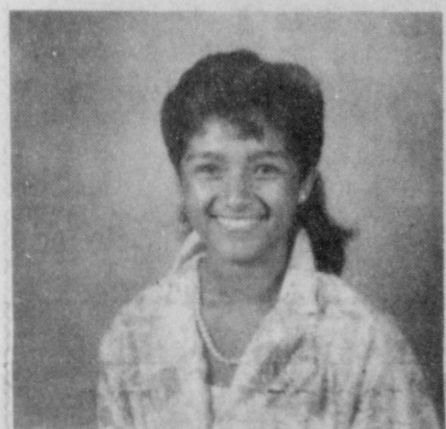

Students then went to Chevy's Restaurant for lunch and then home again. Mrs. Pat Watson (English teacher) and Mr. Kevin Smith who had his

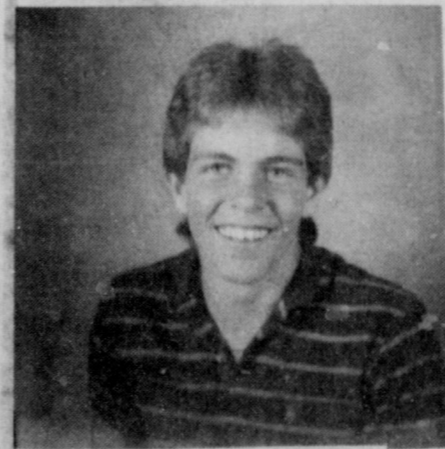
last day as a student-teacher under Coach Carver and Mrs. Allison helped sponsor the trip.
