Gunshot Wound Is Fatal for Jimmie Hill, 21

Artesia Youth Dies in El Paso Hospital Early Sunday—Second Tragic Death in Family Here in Last Four Months.

James Arnold (Jimmie) Hill, 21, died in Southwestern General Hospital, El Paso, at 12:27 o'clock Sunday morning from the effects of a gunshot wound in his left heel sustained June 9, the second son of Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Hill of Artesia to meet a tragic death in less than four months.

His brother, Glenn C. Hill, 30, lost his life by drowning in Red Bluff Lake March 11, when a boat capsized in rough water.

Jimmie Hill sustained the fatal wound the evening of Monday, June 9, while hunting rabbits by spotlight with "Red" Polk and Clay Rooke. He had just entered the automobile and placed his gun muzzle down when it was discharged and the shot entered the inside of his left leg just above the ankle. The shot came out on the outside and somewhat forward, carrying away the heel bone.

He was a patient at Artesia Memorial Hospital until Saturday (Continued on last page, col. 3)

Work Starts on City Warehouse Tenth and Quay

Work started Monday on a new city equipment building and warehouse on the standpipe property at Tenth and Quay Monday morning. The building, of concrete brick construction, will be 120 x 40 feet in size and will face west.

When completed the building will be used for storage of city equipment, trucks and the like, and as a supply room.

The work is being done as a WPA project and should be complete about the middle of October, P. V. Morris, city manager, said.

The project was set up some time ago, prior to the 40 per cent cut in WPA appropriations for New Mexico, which went into effect a few days ago.

The city warehouse has been contemplated for some time and will fill a need for the equipment in the maintenance and work set-up for the city.

Roberts Denies Contract Made With A. H. Hover

Roberts is concerned, and the twisting of facts as presented by said Hover in this article, apparently to make himself appear in print as owner of the wells rather than as promoter or lease broker which he was, and merely received compensation as such.

Dog Poisoner Is On the Loose Again in City of Artesia

Reports are coming in that the most hated of humans—or inhumans—the dog poisoner, is on the loose in Artesia again.

Or it may be there are two of him, for victims have been reported from two widely separated districts.

In the neighborhood of Rose-lawn and Texas two dogs and four cats are known to have died of poison and in the southwest part of town at least three dogs have died, believed to have been from poison.

It has been pointed out that the practice not only is inhuman and inhumane, but that there always is a danger that some child might find poisoned food and eat it.

A city official commenting on the present poisoning flare-up said Wednesday that anyone who would do such a thing should be given a sentence of twenty years in the penitentiary, and others echoed his remark.

Employment Service Representative Here Tuesday, Wednesday

Howard Rutz, formerly in charge of the New Mexico State Employment Service office in Artesia, but at Carlsbad since the work in Eddy County was consolidated there, was here Tuesday and Wednesday of this week in the regular weekly call.

He said a number of persons do not realize the Carlsbad office sends a representative to Artesia each Tuesday and Wednesday to handle compensation claims and work registrations.

The representative will be at the city from 10 o'clock in the morning to 4:30 in the afternoon each Tuesday and from 8 o'clock each Wednesday morning until he finishes work, Rutz said.

Forty-Eight of Artesia Young Men Register

In Eddy County Tuesday 176 young men registered for the Selective Service program, of whom forty-eight registered at the Artesia city hall, 123 at the courthouse in Carlsbad and seven at Carlsbad Caverns.

The Eddy County local board has no information as yet regarding the new registrants, who became 21 years of age since the general registration day last Oct. 16.

However, a call has been issued for eighteen men from Eddy County July 9.

Chaves County did not quite equal Eddy County in the number of registrants Tuesday, 160 being reported by the board there.

It was expected that nearly a million young men the nation over would have reached 21 years and would register Tuesday.

NO ANGLE SLIGHTED

All Possible Contacts Are Made by Various Groups During Period.

An incomplete check-up this morning in the local drive for funds for the United Service Organizations indicated \$700 probably will have been collected by this evening, when the drive closes. An even \$500—the penny—was raised by various committees Friday and Saturday, the opening days of the drive in North Eddy County. Grady Booker, general chairman of the North Eddy County committee of the United Service Organizations for National Defense, Inc., expressed the thanks of the local group to everyone who contributed in the drive, and to those who assisted in the publicity.

Members of the various committees, he said, reported that practically everyone received them graciously and that response was good, especially considering that national publicity about the organization, which is very new, did not take on any great proportions until the last week, about the time The Advocate announced the local drive a week ago today.

THE BILL OF RIGHTS

We believe the editorial column could be put to no better use in an Independence Day issue than to publish the Bill of Rights and urge that everybody again read those ten first amendments to the Constitution proposed to the states by Congress on Sept. 25, 1789, and ratified on Dec. 15, 1791. So pause here a few minutes, read and ponder:

ARTICLE I

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

ARTICLE II

A well-regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free state, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.

ARTICLE III

No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

ARTICLE IV

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated. And no warrant shall issue but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

ARTICLE V

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law, nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

ARTICLE VI

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury of the state and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation, to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.

ARTICLE VII

In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury shall be otherwise re-examined in any court of the United States than according to the rules of the common law.

ARTICLE VIII

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

ARTICLE IX

The enumeration in the Constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

ARTICLE X

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited to it to the states, are reserved to the states respectively, or to the people.

ORDINANCE NO. 64

AN ORDINANCE MAKING IT UNLAWFUL FOR ANY PERSON TO DRIVE ANY MOTOR VEHICLE UPON THE STREETS OF THE CITY OF ARTESIA, NEW MEXICO, WITHOUT HAVING IN HIS POSSESSION AN OPERATOR'S OR CHAUFFEUR'S LICENSE REQUIRED BY THE LAWS OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO, AND PROVIDING A PENALTY THEREFOR.

SECTION ONE
Definition of Terms:
The following words and phrases when used in this ordinance shall be deemed to have and shall be held to include each of the meanings set forth in this Section, to-wit:

(a) Streets: Every street, avenue, boulevard, highway, roadway, alley or place used by or laid out for the use of vehicles.

(b) Motor vehicles: Every self propelled vehicle upon which any person or property may be transported or drawn upon a public highway, except road machinery or any farm implement temporarily on the streets.

(c) Operator: Every person, other than a chauffeur, who is in actual physical control of a motor vehicle on the street.

(d) Chauffeur: Every person who is employed for the principal purpose of operating a motor vehicle, and every person who drives a motor vehicle while in use as a public or private carrier of persons or property.

SECTION TWO
That from and after the effective date of this Ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person to drive any motor vehicle upon any street in the City of Artesia, New Mexico, without having in his immediate possession a valid driver's license as an operator or chauffeur, as the case may be, in accordance with the requirements of the laws of the State of New Mexico.

SECTION THREE
It shall be unlawful for any person to knowingly employ any chauffeur to operate a motor vehicle upon the streets of the City of Artesia who is not licensed as a chauffeur under the laws of the State of New Mexico.

SECTION FOUR
It shall be unlawful for any person to knowingly authorize or permit a motor vehicle owned by him or under his control to be driven by any person on the streets of the City of Artesia, New Mexico, who is not licensed as an operator or chauffeur as required by the laws of the State of New Mexico.

SECTION FIVE
Any person or persons, firm or corporation, who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not more than ONE HUNDRED AND NO/100 (\$100.00) DOLLARS or imprisonment for not more than thirty (30) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

SECTION SIX
This Ordinance shall be published once in the Artesia Advocate in its issue date the 3rd day of July, 1941, and shall be in full force and effect five (5) days from the date of publication thereof.

ORDINANCE NO. 63
AN ORDINANCE MAKING IT UNLAWFUL TO OPERATE ANY MOTOR VEHICLE ON THE STREETS OF THE CITY OF ARTESIA, NEW MEXICO, WHEN THE LAMPS, BRAKES OR STEERING EQUIPMENT OF

Such vehicle are improperly adjusted or unsafe, and providing a penalty therefor.

SECTION ONE
The word "street" when used in this Ordinance shall mean and include every street, avenue, boulevard, highway, roadway, alley or place used by or laid out for the use of vehicles within the city limits of the City of Artesia, New Mexico.

SECTION TWO
It shall be unlawful for any person to drive any motor vehicle upon the streets of the City of Artesia, New Mexico, when the lamps, brakes or steering equipment of such vehicle are improperly adjusted or are unsafe.

SECTION THREE
It shall be unlawful for any person to operate a motor vehicle upon the streets of the City of Artesia without having upon said vehicle a certificate, as provided by the laws of the State of New Mexico, showing the lamps, brakes and steering equipment of such vehicle have been tested by a duly authorized testing station within the preceding four (4) months.

SECTION FOUR
Any person or persons who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined in any sum not exceeding TWENTY-FIVE AND NO/100 (\$25.00) DOLLARS for each offense.

Arnold, from Buckeye, Ariz., the new world's champion, will defend his title in Roswell against King Merritt of Cheyenne, Wyo., at a date yet to be set. The match will be given under the auspices of the Roswell Lions Club, and the club already has contracts with the two men to appear.

In roping his tenth steer Crosby's horse was jerked off its feet by the steer, the horse falling on Crosby's left leg and rolling on up his body.

When the accident happened Crosby was roping his tenth steer and was ahead 25.2 seconds. Arnold went ahead and roped his tenth steer, making his total time 317.3. Crosby's time up to the accident was 270 seconds for nine steers, compared to Arnold's 295.2 seconds.

Crosby made a good catch of his tenth steer which ran out to the end of the rope, jerking the horse, which fell on Crosby. He was injured on the leg, back and neck and suffered a slight concussion when his head hit the ground.
