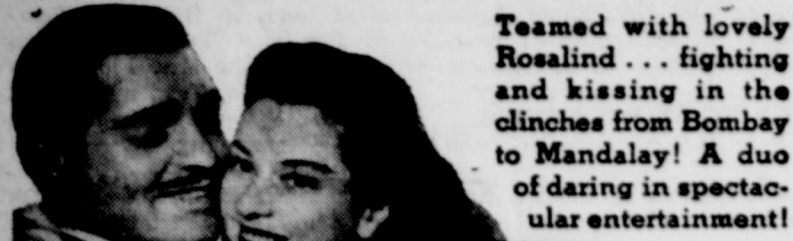

Gable, with Rosalind Russell as his co-star, is obviously in his element in this stirring romantic saga of adventure in the Far East. The picture is vital and arresting throughout in capturing the authentic flavor of the colorful Orient while highlighting the action-filled adventures of its principals.

Those same fans will be amazed, no doubt, to find their hero in the suave role of a gentleman thief at the opening of the story. The part is a departure for Gable, although it may be remembered that he did extraordinary work as a gangster early in his film career, a factor which helped to earn him stardom.

New Migratory Bird Regulations Announced By Ickes; Sixty-Day Season Opens on Nov. 2

A sixty-day duck hunting season was proclaimed by Secretary of the Interior Ickes starting Oct. 1 in the northern states, Oct. 16 in intermediate states and Nov. 2 in southern states, including New Mexico, which will be seventeen days later than last year's season, which opened Oct. 15.

In issuing 1941 regulations for hunting migratory game birds, Ickes left unchanged the sixty-day season and the ten-a-day bag limit of last year, retained the prohibition against use of bait or live decoys, but added a clause forbidding the taking of water fowl by using cattle, horses or mules as blinds.

As in recent years, hunters must plug repeating and automatic shotguns to a limit of three shells and must not use guns larger than 10-gauge. Hunting with bows and arrows is still permissible. Shooting hours remain the same, sunrise to 4 o'clock.

A drastic reduction was ordered in the shooting season for mourning doves, because, Ickes said, the number of these birds was found to be "decidedly unsatisfactory." Whereas the season in some areas ran as long as seventy-seven days, this year's season was reduced to a maximum of forty-two days. The system of split seasons in many areas was eliminated.

Other major changes from last year included:

Closed season on Wilson snipe, commonly known as jacksnipe.

A ten-a-day limit on canvasback and ruddy ducks, formerly limited to three a day.

Transfer of Ohio to the northern zone and New Mexico to the southern.

Legalizing the taking and possession of one wood duck per hunter in Pennsylvania, Delaware, Kentucky, Missouri, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Arkansas, Louisiana and Texas.

A closed season on snow geese in heavy concentration areas of certain counties in North Carolina, Illinois and California.

An open season for Puerto Rico.

The limit on geese and brant (except snow geese in Idaho, snow geese and brant in Atlantic Coast states, and Ross' geese throughout the country — which may not be

Complete Year Of Service in Defense Army

New Mexico motorists have completed their first year of service in the national defense tax army, H. W. Hunsaker, secretary of the New Mexico Motor Carriers Association, said in commenting on the fact that the second federal tax on motor fuel, levied for national defense purposes, has been in effect for one whole year.

"Motor vehicle owners were one of the first groups to be affected by defense taxes, and the burden of their taxation has been increased the most," said Hunsaker. "Congress imposed, effective on July 1, 1940, an additional tax on motor fuel at a rate equivalent to 50 per cent of the rate previously prevailing.

"No other group of taxpayers have had so heavy a burden added to their national defense tax knapsack. And no other group have borne as cheerfully the extra burden of defense taxation. Motor vehicle owners not only shoulder a knapsack for the federal government, but they also carry a heavy load of state taxes.

"Duration of service in the defense army has been placed by Congress at five years. The levy was adopted on that basis, to end on July 1, 1946. Our motorists are hopeful that their federal tax demobilization will take place at that time."

The original three or six, it was explained, may also include or consist entirely of blue geese, hence it is possible for a hunter to take six blue geese a day or have twelve in possession if he takes or possesses no other kind of geese.

Workers Advised Against Leaving For Other Areas

Employment Service Suggests Contact Before Farm Laborers Shift

Farm workers seeking employment are advised to contact the New Mexico State Employment Service before leaving their homes to look for jobs in other areas, James A. Tadlock, farm placement supervisor, has advised.

Tadlock said crops were late in some areas and that if workers leave their homes to seek jobs elsewhere they may find themselves far away from home and no prospects of employment for several weeks.

The farmers, too, can help in keeping the flow of agricultural labor orderly, Tadlock said, by contacting the nearest office of the New Mexico State Employment Service and making arrangements early for the recruitment of the labor he will need during the harvest season.

"When we know approximately the number of workers that will be needed in the agricultural areas and when they will be needed, we can start early to organize the labor pool to meet the demand," Tadlock said.

"The farmer also will be protecting himself against difficulties in recruiting the number of workers he needs by doing his 'labor shopping' early."

In some communities, the housing situation presents a problem, Tadlock continued. In many places, farmers are providing shelter for their workers where there was inadequate facilities in the past. All government agencies whose activities touch the farmer or farm worker are cooperating this year to seek to forestall any stringencies in the agricultural labor market.

Imagine the crew's surprise when it discovered the rear wheelman's post vacant. Fire Chief Ed Welch said the truck had pulled out in such haste that Tillerman Russell Wyatt was unable to climb aboard.

At Canyon, Tex., prisoners laughed, Jim Cheyne, night watchman fumbled—it was embarrassing to say the least. Cheyne accidentally was locked in a cell when he went to feed prisoners. He fired a bullet to attract attention, then took the cartridge and used it for a whistle. He fired and whistled, fired and whistled until his gun was empty. He finally was freed by officer Oscar Gamble.
