Sometimes things are accomplished by working quietly and sometimes by shouting to the whole world what is wanted.

It has been known for some time that Artesia might be considered for a high octane gasoline plant for use in national defense, but only a relatively few people have been in on that knowledge, as they quietly tried to devise methods to encourage bringing to this city such a plant.

But since an Associated Press story, carrying a Washington, D. C., dateline, was released Friday to the effect that the government is drafting a program for the construction of fifty 100 octane gasoline plants, stories and rumors have been flying around town that Artesia is to be one of the selected sites.

So now it can avail nothing to keep the plan a secret; in fact, it might be the proper thing to tell everybody about it and to enlist the entire community in a concerted fight to bring to Arthree times that amount.

The government plan, as announced by Secretary of the Interior Ickes and Jesse Jones, federal loan administrator, involves fifty new refining plants at an estimated cost of \$150,-000,000 to provide high octane gasoline for our own defense and for nations being aided under the Lend-Lease Act.

It is possible that Artesia might be awarded one of the plants as a windfall, as the government has the last word in such matters. But it will be more probable if someone is sent to Washington-now, at once; not next month-with all available information, to be placed in the hands of the proper authorities, including Secretary Ickes and Jones, as well as our congressional delegation.



His influence too is responsible for the high price for silver which redounds to the benefit of his state while it taxes the rest of the people of the United States.

Senator Nye comes from a state of only 641,935 inhabitants who have also been the recipients of greater government bounty than was received from them in taxation. Here, too, the citizens of the larger states are taxed in their behalf.

Why these two men, representing such a small minority of the people of these United States, should consider they have the right to travel about the country exhorting the rest of the citizens to defy their elected President and their government is beyond me.

As for Charles Lindbergh, he has neither the capacity, sagacity nor the experience necessary to advise the American people. In his latest attack, Mr. Lindbergh seems to have thrown off his

mask and appears as a full-fledged supporter of Nazism. He even shocked Hearst's New York American, which referred to his speech as unpatriotic, un-American and unsound.

I think we should take heed of the prowling Nazi wolf and cut the claws of his cohorts in this country. And, instead of permitting Nazis and Nazi sympathizers to confuse the main issue with trivialities. let us concentrate on the job of destroying the wolf first. Then we can always go back to the family bickering among ourselves—and much less dangerously.-Charles Benedict in The Magazine of Wall


