# JUVENILE OFFICER LAYS DELINQUENCY BLAME

Judge J. D. Josey, juvenile officer, has issued a challenge to the citizens of Artesia, which he has titled "Planting Seed in 1944 and Reaping Your Harvest in 1964."

The problem of juvenile delinquency is one which has been receiving considerable thought not only in Artesia but over the nation. Possibly the complete solution is not contained in Judge Josey's remarks, but they certainly meet the problem in straightforward manner and contain food for

His challenge is published in full as a guest editorial:

The subject of juvenile delinquency has been discussed, pro and con, for quite some time and we are all acquainted with conditions p. m. that contribute to juvenile delinquency.

The question now is: What are we going to do about it? Your child today in 1944 will be mature in character and habits in 1964. What seed you sow in the mind and heart of your child now will bear fruit in 1964; what will the harvest be? Your answer is: What seed did you sow?

I wonder what it requires to get some people really and truly interested in their own children. I mean interested in their children to the extent of providing the worth-while things of life.

Yes, I know it's not your children who do wrong; it's the other fellow's children! I have heard that statement so many times, then when I tell them that such-and-such happened on a certain night at a certain time, how surprised they were! I know you have confidence in your children and you should have, but don't you think they are precious enough and entitled to your confidence to be checked up on at times? Don't just think, but know; it's your own child.

Can you put a value on your boys and girls of today? I can't, but I do know they are our nation's most valuable asset. That being true, it behooves us all to put the welfare of juveniles in the place

it rightfully belongs: Our No. 1 problem and obligation. Isn't it a lovely picture to see a happy family, well dressed and provided for, seemingly with all desires supplied? Now that is just Mass on Sunday morning. fine as far as it goes and the parents are to be congratulated. But these things are only small contributions to their lives. Our boys and girls are entitled to much more than that; they need dressing up

on the inside to be really prepared for all kinds of weather. This is the group that we call juvenile delinquents—those boys

and girls who are only dressed up on the outside. I'm frank to admit that the juvenile problem is beyond the control of law enforcement officers. It has always been and always will be, and unless our homes are re-established and rededicated to the purpose of dressing up our boys and girls on the inside, tomorrow and in future generations we will reap a harvest of calamity, sorrow,



# Julia tells-How to prepare variety meats

WE HOUSEWIVES in the United States are learning how truly delicious many of the less familiar "variety meats" can be. And we're keenly interested, because these meats are relatively plentiful in supply and therefore cost us fewer ration points. We're learning, for example, that

# KIDNEYS

are especially choice if they're lamb kidneys, but that those of calf, beef, and pork are also good Simple prep-aration: wash them well in cold water, and split to make them lie flat; remove white tubes and excess tissue and fat; soak in cold salted water (1 tsp. salt per qt.) about 30 mins.; drain and dry well; cook until just tender, by broiling, sauteing, or

Kidney Stew: saute onion in drip-pings, melted butter or margarine; add cut-up kidneys, salt, pepper, nutmeg, Worcestershire sauce, and parsley to taste, and water to cover; cover and simmer for 20 mins. or until tender; thicken with flour mixed to a paste with a little cold water, stirring constantly; serve immediately.

Similarly, with HEARTS we're learning that both calf and lamb hearts are tender, that beef hearts take a little longer cooking,

and that pork hearts are coarser.


To prepare: wash well in slightly warmed water, take out arteries and veins that may be cut away; simmer slowly in water until tender, adding 1 tsp. salt to each quart of water when half done; allow about 2 hours for calf, lamb and pork hearts, about 3-3½ hours for beef hearts.

And when it comes to TONGUE

we're learning that all four kinds are good, with beef the favorite of course. To prepare: wash well, scraping and cutting away any excess tissue; cover with boiling water and bring to a boil; then skim water and bring to a bon; then skim water and simmer tongue gently until tender; add ½ tsp. salt per lb. when half done; allow 2-3 hours for calf tongue, 1-1½ for lamb, 3-4 for beef, 11/2-2 for pork.

Simply take equal parts of liver and stewing beef or lamb, add 3 tbsps. of flour for each ½-lb. of liver, salt and pepper and grind. Form into patties and fry—or make into meat loaf.
