Persons Eligible to Vote on June 6 May Register Monday

Places Will Be Open 9 to 6, County Clerk Wilcox Announces, as He Lists Locations in North Eddy Precincts

Plans are being completed for registration of eligible voters in all NUMBER 18 parts of Eddy County, except the Carlsbad and Otis precincts, from 9 o'clock next Monday morning to 6 o'clock that evening, it was announced this week by R. A. Wilcox, county clerk.

Persons eligible to vote at the primaries June 6 are those who will have reached their majority by that date and will have lived in New Mexico a year, Eddy County ninety days, and the voting precinct thirty days next preceding election day.

The thirty days prior to the primary date will be Sunday, May 7. Theoretically the poll registration books should close on that date, but it being Sunday, they will be open through Monday. And after Monday, the books will be closed and it will be impossible for anyone to register, even at the clerk's office, until after the primaries. Then the books will be opened again until thirty days prior to the November

Men from this locality read The Advocate during the Tunisian campaign, as they pushed Rommel into the sea. And from there, it followed them into Sicily and Italy.

A number of copies go regularly to the British Isles, where some of our boys read The Advocate between sorties over the occupied countries and into Germany.

And after the beachhead of the second front has been established, The Advocate will follow Eddy County boys across Europe and to Berlin.

We hope it will not be too long until Eddy County men in the armies of occupation, billeted in Berlin and Tokyo, will be reading their home-town newspaper in the capitals of the defeated Axis na-

And surely it will, for The Advocate is getting around these days, now that it has worldwide circulation.

A MINUTE OF PRAYER

The Amarillo chapter of American War Dads is asking every man, woman and child in Amarillo to pause for one minute of prayer when the invasion of Western Europe is announced.

The suggestion is being carried to the national War Dads organization with the idea of making it general.
