

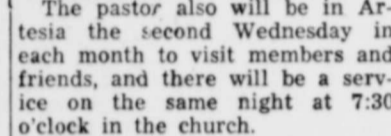

**People Of Eddy County Increase Bond Purchases**

Eddy County people invested \$78,950 in all three series of U.S. Savings Bonds during March, L. B. Feather, county chairman of the Savings Bond Committee, has announced, on the basis of a report received by him from the Treasury Department.  
This total was \$13,610.75 more than in March, 1946, and \$14,909 less than in February of this year. Eddy Countians bought 6.18 per cent of the state's total of \$1,278,549.50 in March, as against 7.26 per cent of the Savings Bonds in March, 1946, and 8.68 per cent of all U.S. securities purchased by New Mexicans during the war, said Feather.  
Residents invested \$58,806.25 in Series E bonds last month, which will be worth \$78,408.33 at maturity, he continued. This amount is less than investments in February by \$17,168.75 and falls below those in March, 1946, by \$5,637.50.

**Condition Of Lambs Average For Season In Western States**

Western states generally report favorable conditions during the month of March for the development of early lambs, although other early lambing areas of the country were not so fortunate.  
Unseasonably cold weather delayed the start of pastures in Texas, Missouri, and the Southwest states, and heavy feeding of grain, hay, and roughage was necessary to maintain the condition of ewes and lambs.  
While feed prospects improved materially in some of the early lambing sections of California, in the South San Joaquin Valley of California dry weather has limited feed growth, and the development of lambs has been retarded. In the Pacific Northwest, March weather was very favorable, new feed was well advanced by April 1, and lambs made good to excellent progress.

**Anderson Tells Farmers AAA Is Proven Effective**

"The Triple-A approach right down to the county level, and especially at the county level, has proved itself to be the most effective organization thus far devised for administration of any national farm program." Secretary of Agriculture Clinton P.

Anderson recently told a large group of farmers and others at Sioux Falls, S. D.

"A grass roots administration has to be the basis for any effective farm program. It will be the basis for the machinery of farm programs in the future, whatever form the programs may take. This country has never witnessed a finer demonstration of the process of democracy in action than has been given, county by county, and community by community, in

what has now become the Agricultural Conservation Program, and which is the basis for our whole national farm effort.

"It should be said to the credit of the farmers that they have done their part in living up to the aspiration of the leaders of those drab days in the development of democracy in agriculture. This development continued right through the war and was the forerunner of the wartime production goals by which farmers themselves charted the course for agriculture at a time when the very existence of democracy throughout the world was at stake.

"This democracy in action, which proved itself in time of depression and in time of war, can now be depended upon in this period when the United States and the whole world are seeking adjustment to changed conditions."

**The Telephone Strike Situation Today**

You as a telephone user have an important stake in the issues involved in the telephone strike. We would like to give

you the straight answers to some questions you may be asking.

**Why Is There a Telephone Strike?**

In recognizing its responsibility to the public, to the workers in the business, and to the owners, the management could not in good conscience accede to the Union's excess-

sive demands. The Union refused the offer to continue the present liberal contracts, and has refused the Company's offer to submit wage issues to arbitration.

**What Were the Demands?**

There were over one hundred items and the pay roll cost would amount to over \$27,000,000 a year. That is about five times the Com-

pany's net earnings last year. If added to the present payroll it amounts to more than all the revenue collected last year by the Company.

**Why Doesn't the Company Grant an Increase?**

The Company's earnings in relation to its investments are at the lowest point in its history of operations. It is in the process of seeking increases in its charges for service based on 1946 costs, the largest element of which was wages. A further increase in wages will make it necessary to seek additional telephone rate increases in areas where recent increases have been made, and larger increases

than otherwise would be necessary in areas where rates have not yet been increased.

The Company feels, therefore, that if present wages are fair and just, it should not increase them and thus increase the cost and eventually charges for the service.

Mountain States Telephone wages have increased 72 per cent over 1939.

**Are Present Telephone Wages Good?**

The Company thinks so. Here are some typical wage rates in Artesia:

A girl starting as a student OPERATOR in Artesia begins at a minimum of \$26.00 for a five day week; gets two raises the first year and after 18 months has a basic wage rate of \$29.00. Regular increases bring this basic rate to a top of \$34.00. This does not include overtime and premium payments for evening and night work.

For INSTALLER-REPAIRMEN the minimum rate for

beginners learning the business is \$28.00 a week. Regular increases bring this to a top of \$61.75 per week. In addition there are overtime and Premium payments for evening and night work.

There are other advantages to working for the Telephone Company, including eight holidays a year with pay; vacations with pay, of one, two or three weeks, depending on length of service; liberal sickness and death benefits; pensions, with full cost paid by the Company—and telephone work is STEADY WORK.

**Arbitration—What Is It?**

The Company thinks its wages are good, but the Union does not agree. The Company suggests that a board composed of impartial citizens of this area who are not associated with either the Telephone Company or any union, and who are mutually agreeable to the Union and the Company, should decide the question.

Arbitration is simply a means of letting an impartial person or group of persons settle a dispute after reviewing the facts and giving full consideration to both sides. The arbitrator acts as a judge or umpire. We think this method of having an unbiased party decide the wage question would be fair to the employees and the Company. It would certainly be in the public interest.

It hardly seems logical that the Union should oppose arbitration, especially when the Company is not proposing a reduction in wages if the board should find that telephone wages are above community levels of pay for work requiring similar skill and training.

**Should Increases Granted in Some Industries in Other Areas Set a Pattern For Telephone Wages Here?**

The Company does not think so. It will be noted that some of these other industries whose business is of a competitive character have stated that it will not be necessary for them to increase prices. An impartial board of arbitration would, of course, decide among other things the extent to which recent wage settlements in other indus-

tries have a bearing, if any, on telephone wages in the Rocky Mountain Area.

We regret the continuation of this unhappy situation. We are doing everything we can to bring about a restoration of service. In the meantime we sincerely appreciate the friendly understanding and cooperation of the public.

Package Bee Business Is Humming Now

Scientific studies and practical experience of farmers with the value of bees in orchards, in clover fields, and in alfalfa plantings harvested for seed account for the heavy northward movement of bees this spring. County Agent Dallas Rierson said.

"The bees are coming literally by the billions, according to the Department of Agriculture," the county agent said. "Perhaps five billion in all, but in individual lots of a few thousand each. These are known as package bees."

Rierson declared that the USDA anticipates that the total shipments this year will total about one and a third million pounds, with about 3500 bees to the pound.

"The average person still thinks of bees primarily as honey gatherers," he said. "In recent years more and more farmers have come to realize that honey is really not much more than a by-product of the bees' main job. Orchards need bees working to insure a good set of fruit. Unless bees are active in alfalfa fields the plants do not set much seed. Bees are essential in alfalfa seed production and are helpful in cross-pollination of many other crops."

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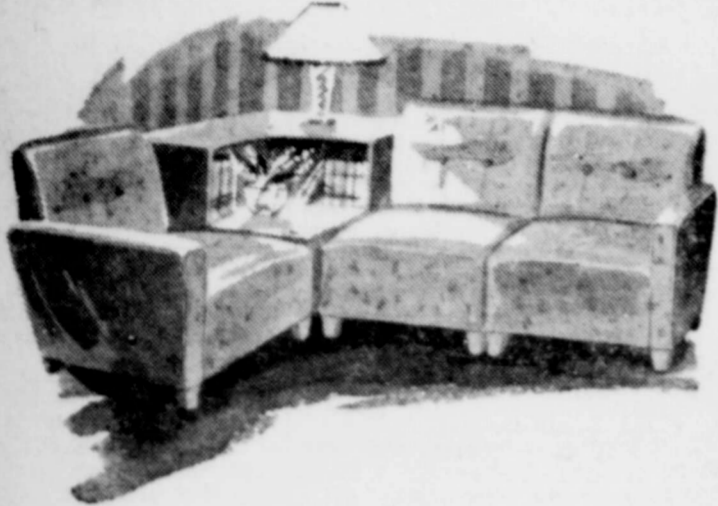
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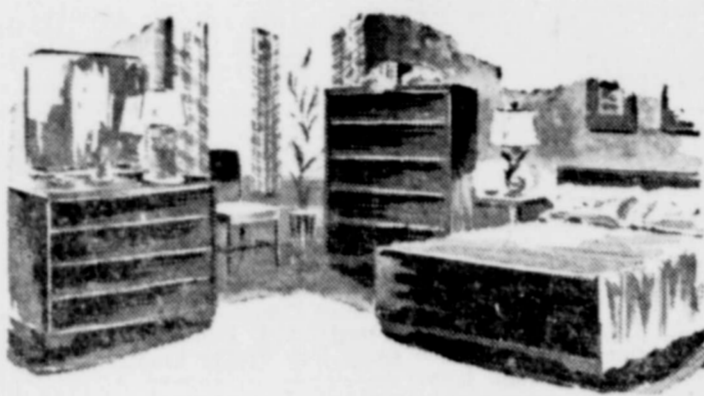
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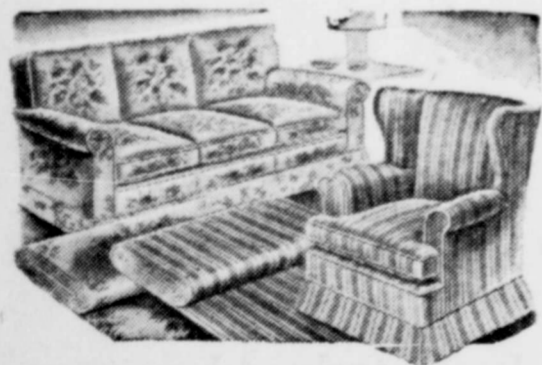
