That, of course, has been said many times before. Everyone in the Pecos Valley not only knows that the future of Artesia depends on the water supply but that the future of this entire valley depends on our water supply.

The matter has been discussed pro and con supply; we have been able to irrigate and to cult to underwrite the funds necessary for a "Y," produce crops and we have, as a result, taken

the water supply for granted. But Artesia depends on its water supply. Even our oil field business depends on water. for adult use. Take away our water and we are through as a city and a community. What we have and own the kids come in? here will be worthless and in a few years Artesia would become a ghost town like the old mining towns of the West.

We, of course, know this. There is nothing new in the above statement. But it does appear that a real dark picture is going to have to be painted for us to begin to realize what we must do in the months and the years ahead.

Everyone is hopeful that the water tables, which seemingly are dropping, will build back up. Everyone is hopeful that the wonderful supply of water, which the Pecos Valley has enjoyed during the past, will continue in the future.

But we haven't, as a people, done much to insure this. We haven't followed the recommendations, which were made to us. We have not conserved our water supply or used it sparingly. The fact is that we have been wasteful.

But the future doesn't appear so bright. And we are very much concerned. The time to have gotten concerned was years ago. But we didn't. w we face a condition, which should make us conserve every ounce of water and one, which should result in the halting of our wasteful prac-

ARTESIA FOR MANY YEARS now has been denied certain services to which it has been entitled by the railroads.

Snowden Oil & Gas Company, Ltd., which has properties and production in the Eddy County oil fields and offices in the Carper uilding here, has negotiated a oan for \$8,000,000 covering oil properties in eight states, it was disclosed in The Dallas Morning

The News quoted Snowden as saying the loan will be used to retire outstanding obligations and the development of properties. A drilling program of 60 to 100 wells is in prospect.

The deal was consummated at Dallas Aug. 15, according to The News, ending negotiations extendng over several months.

Participating in the loan were the Mercantile National Bank of Dallas, the Massachusetts National Life Insurance Company of Springfield, Mass., and the John Hancock Mutual Life Insurance Company of Boston.

Properties pledged against the loan are located in New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, and Louisiana, involving 715 producing oil and gas wells. Total gross oil production is approximately 200,000 barrels of oil a month. In addition, Texmass operates a natural gas plant at Cement, Okla. with a rated capacity of 20,000,000 cubic feet daily.
