Is Still Impossible

EVERY NOW AND THEN we are questioned about our plans for Artesia in so far as The Artesia Advocate is concerned.

We are also questioned as to what we think about a daily paper for Artesia.

Every community seeks and wants a daily newspaper. We would be more than glad to have a daily newspaper and to provide Artesia with a daily paper. And we propose to do just that if and when the newsprint is available and when business here will justify the venture.

We have sought for the past 18 months to secure sufficient additional newspaper to give Arte- Bicycle Ordinance sia a twice-a-week paper. We have talked to our source of newsprint not once but many times re-

garding this matter. They have warned us they can and will continue to supply us with the newsprint necessary to provide the weekly, but they cannot guarantee us paper for twice a week and will not accept any re-

sponsibility for that. It is true that others have gone out and purchased newsprint on a "black market" and they have sought to start papers. Some have been started and they are already in trouble. Others have man-

aged so far to get along. But the prices of "black market" paper are almost prohibitive. The regular market price of out of their mouths. newsprint for that matter is almost prohibitive.

in the past two years. It has grown worse and not most of them as well as we do. . only has the price advanced several times but it is more scarce now than during the war.

That problem faces us even when we have endeavored to step the paper up to twice a week.

The same problem faces us if we sought to Look It Over First step up to a daily. In addition to this we must secure another press before we go daily or if we es pect to speed up production.

The newsprint and press are two problems facing us. But there are other problems. We will the front office and in the back shop.

We would have to have sufficient business to a survey and actual contacts could determine whether there is sufficient business here to warrant, a daily paper. It would probably involve the signing of advertising contracts to use sufficient advertising space to insure there is sufficient business.

A daily newspaper means there must be suf. | pervised. ficient advertising five to six days each week, not one to two days per week.

There is also a circulation problem involved. In other words the circulation will be limited to the most part to Artesia. There is little or no mail Put Artesia First or train service in and out of the city, which per mits delivery of an afternoon daily newspaper the same day of publication to nearby communities. The fact is these communities in themselves are lim-

We have given the matter considerable thought and study. We know Artesia is growing and ex- to preach trade or buy at home. panding. We want to grow and expand with it. And we do plan to step up the publication of The Artesia Advocate when the newsprint and equipment are available and when it can be done.

And that set-up will continue toward a daily if and when it can be done and the business will justify it. More than a year ago we set in the second linotype machine with this in mind.

But we have had an order in for equipment for the job shop for more than a year now and we were promised delivery in four months when we placed that order. We have not even been promised deliv-

That is the situation, which is faced when we consider doing what we would like to do and what Artesia wants done .- O.E.P.

For Death Or Pleasure

ONE OF MAN'S MACHINES, invented and perfected for enjoyment and pleasure, has become the greatest instrument of death.

Seemingly not a single hour goes by any more but what from one to 60 individuals lose their lives killed by or in an automobile accident.

We spend time discussing, our conversation filled with fear, the atomic bomb. We voice concern about the rockets; we are alarmed about future wars, but we climb in our cars, cast care to the four winds and start driving-start driving, disregarding every safety rule and regulation we know.

It is perhaps true that some, maybe many, automobile accidents are unavoidable. But scores and

scores of the others are needless, unnecessary, and are the result of our absolute refusal to employ the safety knowledge we possess.

Today individuals are almost afraid to get in their cars and get out on the highways. They are afraid because, even if they do employ care and caution; even if they do have their car in good condition and their brakes work, they may be struck, injured, or killed by the other fellow, who has little or no concern for his fellow man.

The answer, of course, to the deaths resulting from automobile accidents, crashes and smash-ups rests in the hands of the car drivers.

We as individual drivers are responsible and to blame for what is happening and occurring. And we alone can halt the mounting toll of deaths from automobile accidents.

Certainly the law calls for applicants for drivers' licenses to undergo tests; the law calls for a check of the brakes and lights every four months; the law requires us to so operate our automobiles that we have them under control at all times. It isn't the lack of law but rather our failure to observe these laws and to enforce these laws.

Yes, the machines created by man for business. entertainment, and pleasure have now become the nation's greatest instrument of death.-O.E.P.
