The manner in which the candidates are selected by the various parties probably does not He vetoed some nine of them. make too much difference to the voting public as long as they have a chance to make their final se-

It is a well known fact they haven't had too much to say about it in the past. Even the parties admit there have been times when they had to hold their noses when they endorsed one of their own party members as a candidate. Certainly there have garding this or regarding that. been times when the voters had to hold their noses when they cast their ballots even for some of the

But under the new set-up party conventions will screen out those desiring to run for office and only those able to muster the support of at least 25 per cent of the convention will be able to submit their names for consideration. It will be the purpose of the convention to pick out one, two or even three candidates and these names will go on the

In this way the field has been narrowed down; the voter may have less choice but the number he must consider will be fewer. And in the final analysis a candidate must have more or less the endorsement of his or her party if they are successful in their campaign for election.

The convention will be a pre-primary affair with the candidates being considered by their party at this convention. The primary election will continue to be held under the new law but every candidate desiring to seek office won't be able to run unless they do win or have the approval of their own

Those favoring the new law have declared that by doing away with the free-for-all, the party again accepts responsibility for its candidates. It is also believed it should work for better representation for the whole state. It is pretty well known that it was the past it has been possible for the whole state ticket to be from one section or even one county in the state.

It is not believed this will be possible under the new law with delegates in attendance from over the entire state to prevent any one area or county from grabbing all of the offices or from putting up the candidates for those offices.

It is true, of course, that the individual desiring to be a candidate must have party approval and to seek public office may be halted. But it is also much about the whole book. true that the successful candidate for the nomination almost has to have party endorsement in order to win. Now and then there are exceptions and individuals, outstanding men and women, have been than the rule.

There is no question but what some regulation is needed to slow down every Tom, Dick and Harry. who wants to run for public office. And the convention method of endorsing candidates could set up a few more requirements and select better candidates if they so desired instead of picking, endorsing or approving candidates on the basis of how good a party member they are rather than on how well qualified they are to serve the public .- O.E.P.

Seldom do they even enjoy the hospitality of a jail, for they are floated out of town rather than ailed, which carries with it the expense of their

We saw one such pitiful derelict the other day, a woman who undoubtedly was a hophead and who needed help. But there is no provision to help such people. They must move on and on.

There should be provided a place in every state where such sick persons could and would be properly housed and treated, in an attempt to restore them to usefulness. If they would not respond to treatments, then they should be taken care of permanently the same as are the insane-and not in snake pits, either-rather than have them continually wandering from place to place, homeless, friendless and pennyless, unwanted, disrespected and shunned.—A.L.B.

A FTER CHECKING OVER that the Legislature, which adjourned some weeks ago, actually offered a total of 714 bills and adopted 189 of these, we can't keep from wondering just when some ses sion of the state law-making body will meet solely Under New Federal Rent Act for the purpose of taking a few of the laws off the state statute books.

Of the some 714 measures introduced in the State Legislature 285 of them died in committee while another 145 were killed by the committees. This means that over 50 per cent of the bills never reached the floor of either house, were never discussed, and probably were not worthy of considera-

Of the bills, which were considered, the legislators actually only passed 189 of them, but only previously decontrolled because 180 were actually signed into laws by the governor. they were not rented for any suc-

But that means that 180 new laws were added to the statute books. At the previous session of the Legislature some 221 bills were passed and signed.

Here Are Some Helpful Fertilizing Suggestions to Make Your Lawn and Flower Beds More Attractive



COTTONSEED MEAL has many advantages that recommend it as a fertilizer for lawns and its popularity is increasing among those who take pride in the attractiveness of their lawns. Cottonseed meal does not contaminate the lawn with weed seeds and will not injure foliage: the rate of availability of its nitrogen is slow which allows grass to develop with a uniform, dark green color. Apply 5 pounds (about one gallon) per 100 square feet of lawn in the early Spring and again in the late Summer.

COTTONSEED MEAL is widely-used fertilizer for shrubs and flowers. Cottonseed Hulls, mixed with the soil when evergreens and shrubs are planted or applied at intervals, help to held moisture and loosen heavy soil. When shrubs are planted, one teacupful of cottonseed meal should be worked into the topsoil around each plant. Larger plants require two to four teacupfuls of cottonseed meal. Continued use of Cottonseed Meal maintains good growth after shrubs and evergreens have been planted.

For Roses, Cottonseed Meal is an excellent fertilizer. In setting out roses, work a teacupful of Cottonseed Meal into the topsoil around the plant and water well. The same amount will help your growing bushes and should be done twice a year. When your beds are spaded, apply about 6 pounds per 100 square feet and work well into the soil. ### Sun Porch Plan For Baby Chicks Being Adopted

More and more progressive poultry-raisers are adopting sun porches for their young birds. The practice of allowing young stock on sun porches is well-established in the turkey-growing field, and many hick-raisers are following suit.

The advantages of using sun orches in conjunction with broodrs are the young birds derive more health-giving benefits from the direct sunlight and they become oughened to outdoor living. At the same time, sun porches, properly used, are sanitary and easily-main

Sun porches should be attached brooder houses and should pro vide an equal amount of floor space compared to the house. Porches need not be elaborate affairs; they can be simply constructed of one-inch lumber and poultry netting. Through this program, methods of soil conservation and managent can be put into use on many farms in a short time. The program is set up in every agricultural country, is administered by farmercommittees elected by their neigh-bors and is in reach of all farmers.

### Land Contouring Helps To Conserve Soil And Water

Explaining soil and water conservation practices which farmers of Eddy County may carry out with assistance under the 1949 Agricultural Conservation Program, Roy Forehand, chairman of the county committee, said that contour farming will do much to save soil and water on sloping, tilled land.

"Furrows on the level even though the land is rolling" was the simple way Forehand explained contouring. Contouring means carrying out tillage operations-plowing, disking, harrowing, planting, and cultivating-around the hillsides instead of up and down the

Practical application of contour-farming usually calls for contouring and strip-cropping, sometimes terracing, he points out .A stripcropping system provides definite contour guide lines for the farming operations. Once the farm lines-either with terraces or contour strips—the farming operations can be carried on year after year on the contour

Many farmers find farming easier and more economical where the land is laid out on the contour. But the real purpose and value of contouring, the chairman explains, is in the topsoil saved and the moisture held in the ground for the growing of crops.

Contoured furrows form small dams, which prevent the water from flowing down the slope. The moisture soaks into the soil for future use of the crop and the top soil is not washed away. Contour
