1958 MHS Graduate Visits Athletes Talking About Track

Athletes from Muleshoe High School and Watson Junior High School got quite a treat Monday. Jimmy Clyde Holt, son of Clyde and Mary Francis Holt, was a visitor in the P.E. classes and had quite a message to tell.

Now the President of PCA at Georgetown, and himself the father of five sons and one grandson, Holt talked about his years participating in track.

A 1958 graduate of MHS, Holt participated when the school image was "Yellowjackets" instead of the "Mules."

There was just one track meet a year in junior high and that was the district meet.

When he participated in high school track, there were no uniforms. They ran in levis, and no track shoes.

They either wore street shoes or tennis shoes, generally.

However, during his years, Holt was also known to run in his socks, or even barefoot.

At that time, the track was

behind (west) of the football field. There were no houses there at that time.

He recalled running as a freshman, and also running in the snow.

Willard Hedges was his coach as a freshman, and he was a member of the freshman relay team that won district.

He didn't participate as a sophomore, as he was injured and on crutches.

But, as he told the athletes, he came back as a junior and ran the quarter and half mile. At Odessa, in the district meet, he won the 880 with a time of 2:07 and at regionals, was in second at 2:02.9.

During his senior year, he participated in the 100-meter, 440-meter; the 880-meter; the mile relay and broad jump.

At district, they won the 440; the broad jump and the mile relay.

At regionals, he won the 440 and placed second in the mile

relay and was one of six thinclads to go to state competition.

Now, comes the fun part. Of course, they did not have uniforms -- so some of the boys were in a drygoods store one day before the state meet and found some cotton shorts with big, blue polka dots on them. They purchased the shorts, took them home to their moms, who cut up the sides to resemble running shorts, sewed up the fronts, and the Muleshoe Yellowjackets ran in their polka-dot shorts at the state meet.

To this day, a lot of people who have never been to Muleshoe still remember the Muleshoe team and their polka dot running shorts at the state meet. Holt also showed the athletes the original shorts, which he has kept during all the years.

Holt also told the young athletes about attending the University of Texas and another college where he continued to participate in track.

He told them, "Set goals above what you've already done -- then do the new goals."

He then individually met each athlete following his talk, and offered a few words of encouragement.

(3) Assessed of speech therapy and/or oral language development.

MDA Launches New Program 'Cell Therapy'

Encouraged by promising laboratory findings, the Muscular Dystrophy Association (MDA) has launched a crash program to develop an experimental "cell therapy" technique as a treatment for muscular dystrophy and related muscle-wasting disorders, MDA National Chairman Jerry Lewis announced earlier this week.

"No experimental therapy has ever held such tremendous potential for treating devastating muscle diseases," said Lewis. "We're going to pull out all the stops to learn if what works in the laboratory will work for 'my kids.'"

Lewis added, "I'm asking every American who cares about defeating the scourge of muscular dystrophy to support MDA as never before. To make the dream of cell therapy a reality, this year's Labor Day Telethon, seen on KLBK, Channel 13, must be the most successful ever."

MDA South Plains Chapter President Patty White, stated, "Our fund-raising efforts this year will be dedicated to providing our scientists with the support they need to move full speed ahead in this promising research."

The treatment approach involves injecting healthy immature muscle cells called myoblasts into diseased muscle tissue. MDA-supported research teams at Children's Hospital in Boston and the Montreal Neurological Institute have recently reported success in using the approach in a strain of dystrophic mice. The mice lack the same muscle protein, called dystrophin, the absence of which—due to a gene defect—causes Duchenne muscular dystrophy. Researchers found that after injection with genetically normal myoblasts muscle cells in the mice produced the protein.

MDA will bring together this spring scientists from throughout the world who are conducting research related to cell therapy

for an unprecedented meeting to discuss future studies in muscle disease patients, according to Jerry Lewis. Preliminary clinical trials, involving a limited number of patients, could begin within six months, he said.

While several problems, including the need for large numbers of myoblasts, must be overcome for cell therapy to become a viable treatment, scientists believe the approach could be effective not only in Duchenne muscular dystrophy, but in all forms of dystrophy and many other related muscle diseases.

MDA supports a worldwide research program to fund the causes of and cures for, forty neuromuscular diseases. It also maintains a nationwide network of 230 clinics providing a wide range of services to people affected by the disorders.

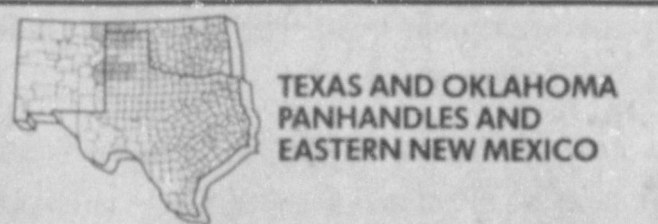

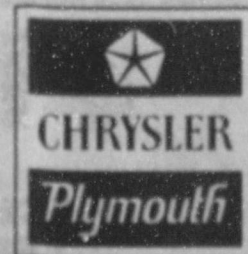

NEW PHONE SYSTEM

ANNOUNCED

Plans for a dial telephone system at Muleshoe were announced today by G.D. Shelley, District Manager for Southwestern Associated Telephone Company.

Shelley stated that studies were now being made of equipment and cost of a dial system for Muleshoe and that as soon as they are completed he will go before the City Council to explain operation of the system and present rates that will be necessary for dial telephone service. After the City Council has approved plans and rates for dial service, the telephone company will make a canvass of subscribers to determine whether they want dial service and are willing to pay the rates necessary. Shelley said that if 70 percent approved of the new type service and rates, final plans would be made.

In discussing plans for the dial system, Shelley said that it would be of the switch type, which would be expanded to serve several thousand telephones. It

was also stated that a building would be constructed to house the dial equipment.

More than 300 telephones have been added in the last three years, or almost as many as were in service on January 1, 1945. This has been possible only by major additions to the cable and wire system, together with additional switchboard equipment in the telephone office here.

The program will include Swine Producers To Have Seminar On April 10

Swine producers from the South Plains and Far West Texas will gather here April 10 for a short course which will examine common production problems and present some possible solutions.

The training will begin at 7 p.m. in the Seminole Civic Center. It will be presented by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, an educational arm of the Texas A&M University System. The program is free and is open to all swine operators.

The program will be led by Dr. Bruce Lawhorn, Extension Service veterinarian from College Station, and Dr. Ivan Munenink, veterinarian from Andrews. Among the items to be covered are vaccination and preventive health measures, and a television presentation and live demonstration of artificial insemination techniques.

"This will be a good opportunity for swine operators throughout this area to get the latest information and get answers to questions they have," said David E. Kight, Gaines County extension agent.

Sergei Prokofiev's "March, Op. 99," Gustav Holst's "First Suite in E Flat," John Barnes Chance's "Elegy," Vincent Persichetti's "Divertimento for Band, Op. 42," and Joseph Willcox Jenkins' "American Overture for Band."

Russian composer Prokofiev's second march for the medium of the concert band was written in 1943 and received its premiere under the baton of Major Petrov, the leading bandmaster of the Soviet Union. It premiered in this country in 1945, with Serge Koussevitzky conducting the Combat Infantry Band.

Holst's suite is considered the cornerstone of a number of works written by British composers for concert band. Composed in 1909, it is one of the few band originals that have been transcribed for symphony orchestra (the reverse process being more common.)

As the name suggests, "Elegy" is solemn in nature. It was the fourth of five band compositions written by Chance before his accidental death in 1972.

"Divertimento for Band" was commissioned of Persichetti by the Goldman Band and premiered by that organization in 1950. His first work for concert band, it led the way for many other band works by the American composer.

"American Overture" is Jenkins' most successful band piece. It was written in 1955 for the U. S. Army Field Band and dedicated to its conductor at that time, Chester E. Whiting. The work calls for near-virtuoso playing by several sections of the ensemble, especially the horns.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Wednesday that a representative from his agency will be in Muleshoe, April 19, 1989 to answer questions about Texas taxes and assist taxpayers with paperwork and problems.

"I'm sending my employees out to help people with questions, filling out forms, and working out problems on a local, one-to-one basis. There's some things you just can't do as well over the phone or through the mail," Bullock added.

Muleshoe area taxpayers who can't attend the courthouse visit can still get individual tax assistance by calling the Comptroller's toll-free telephone number, 1-800-252-5555 from anywhere in Texas.

The Lubbock office, headed by David Cain, serves 19 counties, including Bailey County.

Texas Official Outlines Water Management Issues

Depth to water measurements taken by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 reveal an average decline of about one half foot in the groundwater levels of the Ogallala Aquifer in the Water District's 5.5 million acre service area during 1988.

Very poor soil moisture conditions prior to spring planting coupled with below average precipitation over most of the area during the growing seasons caused irrigators to apply larger and more frequent irrigations than normally required. This heavier pumpage reversed the trend of the previous three years where water levels were stable in 1985; rose 0.5 of a foot in 1986 and rose 0.9 of a foot in 1987.

These depth to water measurements are taken from a network of 1,012 observation water wells scattered across the 15-county Water District service area and are used to determine the annual change in the quantity of water in storage within the Ogallala Aquifer. Since the majority of these irrigation wells are operational, Water District Technical Division staff members take depth to water measurements during January and February in an attempt to allow water levels to stabilize from the previous irrigation season.

By comparing the 1988 depth to water measurements with those taken from the observation well network during January 1987, staff members were able to note the change in groundwater levels.

The 1988 depth to water measurement data reveals average annual declines in nine of the 15 counties within the High Plains Water District. The largest decline was noted in that

portion of Hale County within the Water District, where groundwater levels declined an average of 1.48 feet.

Other groundwater declines were noted in Castro County, 1.45; Deaf Smith County, 1.42 feet; Parmer County, 1.24 feet; Floyd County, 1.08 feet; Potter County, 1.03 feet; Lamb County, 0.75 of a foot; Randall County, 0.31 of a foot; and Lubbock County, 0.23 of a foot.

The remaining six counties within the Water District showed a rise in groundwater levels during 1988. Hockley County recorded the largest rise in groundwater levels with a 0.86 of a foot average increase. Other counties showing groundwater level rises include Cochran County, 0.53 of a foot; Armstrong County 0.46 of a foot; Lynn County, 0.45 of a foot; Crosby County, 0.14 of a foot; and Bailey County, 0.13 of a foot.

The ten-year average annual change in water levels for the Water District service area shows a decline of 0.39 of a foot per year from 1979 to 1989. However, the average annual change in water levels from 1984 to 1989 marked an increase of 0.06 of a foot.

High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 officials commend area producers for improving their water management, which has played a major role in slowing the rate of decline from the Ogallala Aquifer.

Texas A&M sociologist studies universities' minority graduate programs

COLLEGE STATION — Learning why some major universities are more effective than others in enrolling and retaining minority graduate students is the focus of a new national study by a Texas A&M University sociologist who serves on several national education policy boards and committees.

Dr. Gail E. Thomas has received a \$350,900 grant from the Graduate Record Examination Board to assess the progress of top doctoral institutions in recruiting and retaining U.S. graduate students who are black and Hispanic.

"We are going to focus on six nationally known institutions which can be viewed as role models in higher education," Thomas said. "The institutions that we have selected are concerned about the status of blacks and Hispanics in graduate education and are attempting to do something about it."

The two-year project will examine each institution and its environment as well as the policies and practices that enhance or inhibit minority recruitment, enrollment and retention. Thomas said.

"What we're doing should be of interest to educational policymakers at the state and federal levels," she added. "Employers who are constantly seeking 'talented' minorities with higher education credentials should also be interested. I anticipate a larger amount of future research of this type to take place."

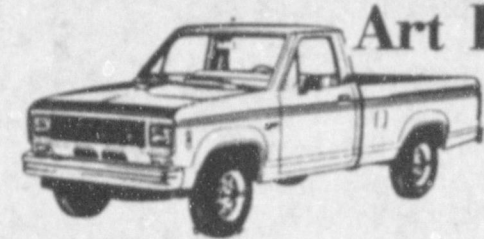

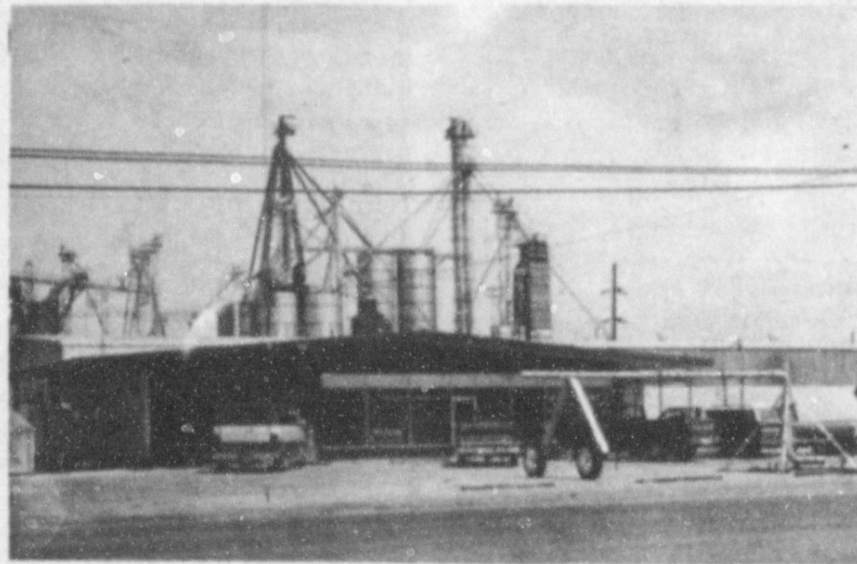

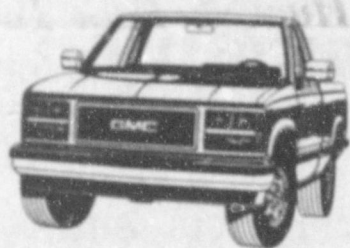

Pest Control, Security Service

To Charge Taxes

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Tuesday that pest control businesses and security service companies should remember to collect state and local sales taxes on their services.

"The Legislature says sales tax is due on protection from pests, whether they're bugs or burglars," Bullock said.

Some 2,100 pest control businesses and 1,300 security service companies in Texas were added to the tax rolls effective October 1, 1987 after the 70th Legislature broadened the state's sales tax base.

The services provided by pest control businesses which are taxable include inspections and preventing, controlling or eliminating insects, birds, weeds or undesirable animals from homes, yards and businesses.

Taxable security services in-

clude investigations, security guards, guard dogs, burglar alarm systems, armored cars, and armed couriers.

Security service and pest control companies do not charge sales tax to federal, state and local governmental agencies and some nonprofit organizations which have a sales tax exemption certificate from the Comptroller's office.

Long-term contracts for pest control services and security service companies signed on or before July 21, 1987 may qualify for an exemption from sales tax. That exemption will expire December 31, 1989. If the contract is renegotiated or renewed, the exemption is lost.
