The financial condition of West Plains Medical Center is serious to say the least, it will probably take three years, perhaps longer to stabilize the financial condition of the hospital.

Without an immediate infusion of substantial cash, the hospital will be lost to its creditors in bankruptcy. There are many things that must be done in order to bring the hospital back to a healthy, full operational status. Some of these things are:

1. *First* - definitely first - the election of the Hospital District must pass favorably.
2. *Second* - The hospital must secure full Medicare Certification

City Council Discusses 9-1-1 Emergency Service

Tuesday morning, the first order of business for the Muleshoe City Council was to certify the results of the city council election held last Saturday, then administer the oath of office to the two councilmen elected.

A total of 97 votes were cast in the election that saw A. V. Wood being re-elected to Place Two and Troy Stegemoeller elected as councilman, Place One. Mayor Darrell Turner administered the oaths.

very soon. Each day the hospital is unable to properly serve the citizens of Bailey and Parmer counties area, and the hospital is unable to maximize its financial return on daily expenses. (The hospital's Emergency Room staffing waiver also expires May 31, 1989.)

3. *Third* - Affiliations with other hospitals and consideration of Group Purchasing Programs should be examined. Every effort must be made to reduce operating costs - purchasing costs.

4. *Fourth* - A strategic plan should be developed that identifies and markets new in-patient, out-patient, wellness, and home-care services of interest to the citizens of the hospital's service area. Services that all who live in the area will utilize. Services that

are easily accessible to all citizens.

5. *Fifth* - Selective physician recruiting in concert with members of the medical staff must occur immediately. Surgery and OB-GYN services are needed.

6. *Sixth* - The Nursing Home should be re-conditioned inside and out. Painting, lighting, drapes and flooring should all be considered. A comprehensive needs assessment and expansion program may be necessary.

With the above six points of reference in mind, it is a pleasure to provide a summary synopsis review in the following areas:

CONDITION REPORT PHYSICAL PLANT (A SYNOPSIS)

The West Plains Medical Center Maintenance Department has been seriously neglected over the past three-four years. When one adds the fact that the hospital remained closed for one year, the condition of the hospital is in a mechanically poor state.

Some of the problems facing the present administration are:

1. Re-organization of the maintenance department.
2. Sparse to inadequate inventory of tools necessary to do the work at hand. (Hand-tools, elec-

Muleshoe Man

Shot Saturday;

Sent To Lubbock

Later Saturday afternoon, following a day of harsh words and bickering, a shooting broke loose on South First Street in Muleshoe and a local man, Humberto Melendez (Pedro) Mendoza suffered gunshot wounds.

According to police reports, Mendoza was taken to West Plains Medical Center in a private vehicle about the time local officers were notified that a shooting had taken place.

Nurses at the hospital notified the Muleshoe City Police Department that they had a gunshot victim at the hospital.

Following emergency treatment at WPMC, the victim was taken to Lubbock General Hospital by the Flight For Life helicopter for further treatment.

Reckless conduct was filed against a local 27-year-old man following the shooting.

Mendoza was reported to have been shot in the right hand and left abdomen. Two other shots were fired, but no one else was injured in the shooting, according to the officer's reports.

Next 120 Days 'Critical' For Future Of Hospital

During a joint meeting on Monday night of the Temporary Board of Directors of the proposed Muleshoe Area Hospital District and the current West Plains Medical Center Board, it all boiled down to "trying to keep the doors of the hospital and nursing home open until the Muleshoe Area Hospital District election, which is scheduled on June 20."

The MAHD Board had asked for the joint meeting with the WPMC Board to learn the current condition of the physical plant at the hospital and nursing home, and the financial condition of the hospital.

The Muleshoe City Council chamber was crowded with people during the meeting, most of them concerned directly with the hospital and/or nursing home.

John Chisholm, administrator at WPMC, asked several of his staff to report on different phases of the hospital and nursing home.

James Pollock, maintenance supervisor, reported on the physical condition of the hospital and nursing home facility, citing a lack of tools and working capital to make necessary repairs, and saying that some of the repairs will have to be extensive and expensive.

Pollock said air conditioning is expected to be turned on in 'a

It was emphasized over and over that the MAXIMUM tax that can be paid by a resident of the Muleshoe Area Hospital District will be 25 cents per \$100 valuation.

For instance, if your city taxes are now \$800, the Hospital District will cost you less than \$400 per year. It will be approximately one third of your school tax if you live in the county.

"The Muleshoe Area Hospital District can tax up to 25 cents per \$100, but that does not mean taxes will be that high," according to the MAHD Board.

When he was named to the finals on Saturday, and went on to capture a first place in Lincoln-Douglas Debate and first place in the state in Persuasive Speaking.

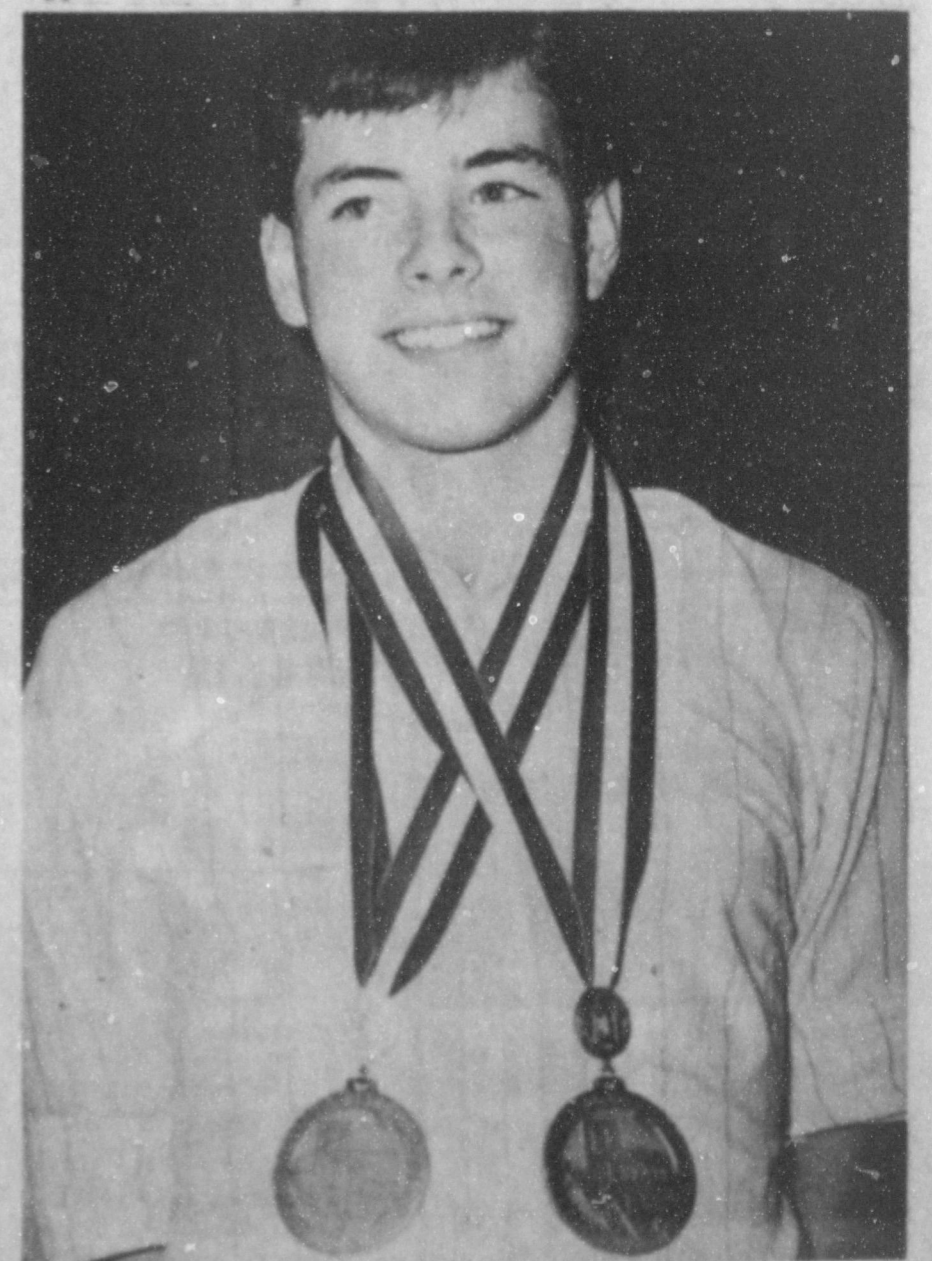

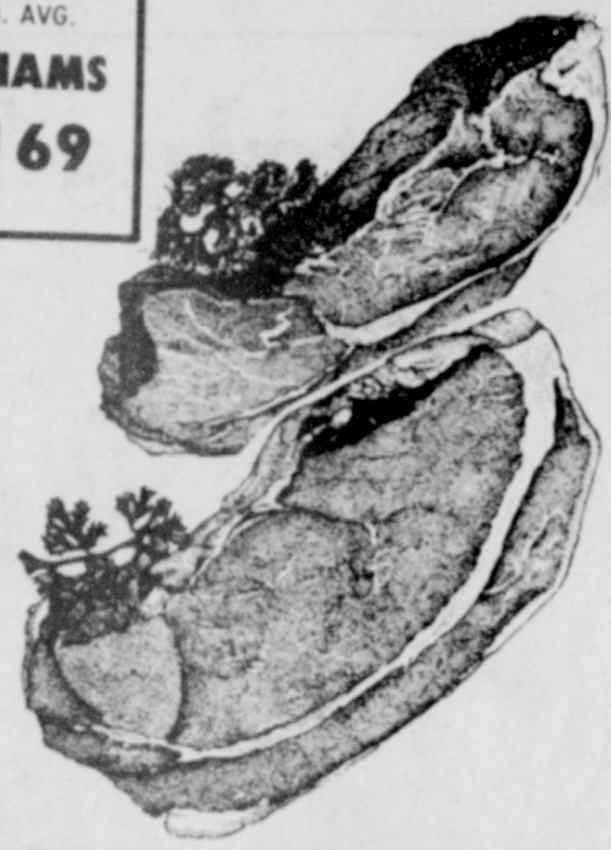

Bredford Homemaker Wins \$3,000 Beef Cook-Off

"This is probably more money than I've ever had at any one time," declared Kathy Rypkema of Bedford as she was presented the \$3000 top prize at the Texas Beef Cook-Off. Her winning recipe of Cajun Sunshine Beef Salad used a flavorful combination of seasonings with a "Little bit of cajun." The attractively served salad consisted primarily of a spiced rice topped with thin strips of cajun-seasoned top sirloin and positioned on a bed of lettuce outlined with thin rings of red, yellow, and green pepper

slices. Second place in the 12th annual state contest sponsored by Texas CattleWomen was Beverly Sebastian of Fort Worth with Honeycomb Hot Sirloin, an entree using spices that included chili powder, black pepper, fajita seasoning, honey and dark brown sugar. Sebastian received \$2000 cash.

Anita Wright of Tyler placed third and was awarded \$1000 cash for her Zesty Meatballs With Asparagus Spears, a very colorful red and green presenta-

tion using a traditional idea in a new form with the meat balls being topped with chopped tomatoes and surrounded by asparagus spears.

A former medical-surgical and psychiatric nurse, Kathy Rypkema (rip'ku-muh) is presently a full-time homemaker with three children who enjoys needlework, gardening, writing poetry, has a special love of antiques and contributes many volunteer hours towards Special Olympics.

Having entered her first cooking contest several years ago, Kathy has been "hooked" ever since. Last year's participation in the National Beef Cook-Off in Jackson, Mississippi as representative of the Microwave's South Region was her first competition on the national level. Having an idea of what the National contest is seeking, she "created this year's entry to reflect the trend toward lighter, healthier eating, and used colors and flavors representative of Southern cooking." Having successfully accomplished this goal has provided her with not only a cash prize but another expense-paid trip to the national event, this time to Portland, Oregon.

Ten finalists were selected from 345 entries to receive the expense-paid trips to Prude Ranch where each finalist prepared his/her recipe for a panel of five judges.

Contestants were "entertained" with a ride in a covered wagon to an old-fashioned outdoor cook-out, tours of Old Fort Davis and the Big Bend, and an opportunity to view the stars from McDonald Observatory.

FIRST PLACE WINNER CAJUN SUNSHINE BEEF SALAD

Preparation time: 12 minutes
Cooking time: 15 minutes
1 1/2 pounds beef top sirloin,
1-inch thick

1 teaspoon cajun blackened beef seasoning (in specialty section of grocery store)
3 tablespoons olive oil, divided
2 large cloves garlic, divided
4 or 5 thin strips fresh lemon

over medium heat. Add 1 garlic peel
1/4 cup each chopped green, red, and yellow bell pepper
2 teaspoons fresh lemon juice
2 tablespoons fresh minced parsley
1/4 teaspoon crushed red pepper (or to taste)

3 cups cooked, converted rice
salt
leaf lettuce
6 each green, red, and yellow bell pepper rings, sliced 1/4-inch thick
parsley sprigs (optional)

Dressing:
1/2 cup dairy sour cream (may substitute yogurt)
1/2 teaspoon freshly grated lemon peel

1/8 teaspoon crushed red pepper
1 tablespoon minced fresh parsley

Trim beef well and rub cajun seasoning on both sides. In large skillet heat 1 tablespoon olive oil

clove, sliced, and strips of lemon peel. Sauté for about 1 minute until garlic begins to brown. Remove garlic and lemon with slotted spoon and discard. Sear beef in remaining hot oil on both sides until browned. Reduce heat to low and continue pan-frying until beef is cooked but still pink in center (3-5 minutes per side). Remove beef to plate and wipe pan with paper towel to remove any residue. Add remaining 2 tablespoons oil to pan over low heat. Mince remaining garlic clove, and add to oil along with chopped bell peppers. Sauté 2 minutes. Add lemon juice,

parsley, crushed red pepper, cooked rice, and desired salt. Continue sautéing 2-3 minutes more, stirring until warmed through.

Line 6 salad plates with leaf lettuce. Overlap 1 each green, red, and yellow pepper ring on lettuce. Top with rice mixture, dividing evenly among plates. Slice beef thinly on diagonal and mound in center of rice. In small mixing bowl combine dressing ingredients and place dollop in center of beef strips. Garnish with additional parsley sprigs and serve warm or cold. Makes 6 servings.

Sports Network To Carry

Texas Special Olympics

Home Sports Entertainment (HSE), the southwest's regional cable sports network, has announced that it will carry a portion of the Texas Special Olympics 1989 Summer Games as part of its sponsorship of Special Olympics.

HSE will tape throughout the three-day event, May 24-26, to compile a two-hour glimpse of the games and its more than 4,000 athletes. The program will then air on HSE May 31 at 7 p.m., Central Daylight Time, with replays scheduled for later dates.

"Because of its many events and athletes, we're having to take a different approach to our coverage of Special Olympics than we might a baseball or basketball game," says Greg Lucas, associate sports director for HSE and one of the announcers during the program. "Basically, we intend to show a representative sampling of the events and the games, and not necessarily just the winners," he added. "The participation, the drive of these athletes, and the heart of the operation is what we're after."

For the first time in 15 years, the Summer Games will be held on the campus of Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos, Texas. It will also mark the first time that HSE will be

broadcasting the event.

"We're excited about the games," said Jay Finegold, HSE vice president/marketing. "These are outstanding athletes in a true sporting event that will be a welcome addition to our programming."

Denis Poulos, executive director of Texas Special Olympics, said the organization's relationship with HSE will open up new avenues for individuals with mental retardation. "HSE's coverage will create a new public awareness for our program," he said. "At the same time, it will enable us to expand our outreach program and tap into others who might benefit from Special Olympics."

Lucas will be joined during the broadcast by HSE announcer Alvin Jackson, and a representative with Special Olympics. Bill Worrell, HSE's Houston sports director, and Norm Hitzges, the network's D/FW sports director, will also provide pre-recorded special features throughout. Mike Anastassiou, senior producer out of HSE's Houston office, will produce the program.

HSE, with headquarters in the Dallas/Fort Worth Metroplex and Houston, provides coverage of various regional sporting events, highlighted by broadcasts of Texas Rangers, Houston Astros, Dallas Mavericks, Houston Rockets, and San Antonio Spurs games, and Southwest Conference college events. The network is available on numerous cable systems throughout Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, New Mexico, and Arkansas.

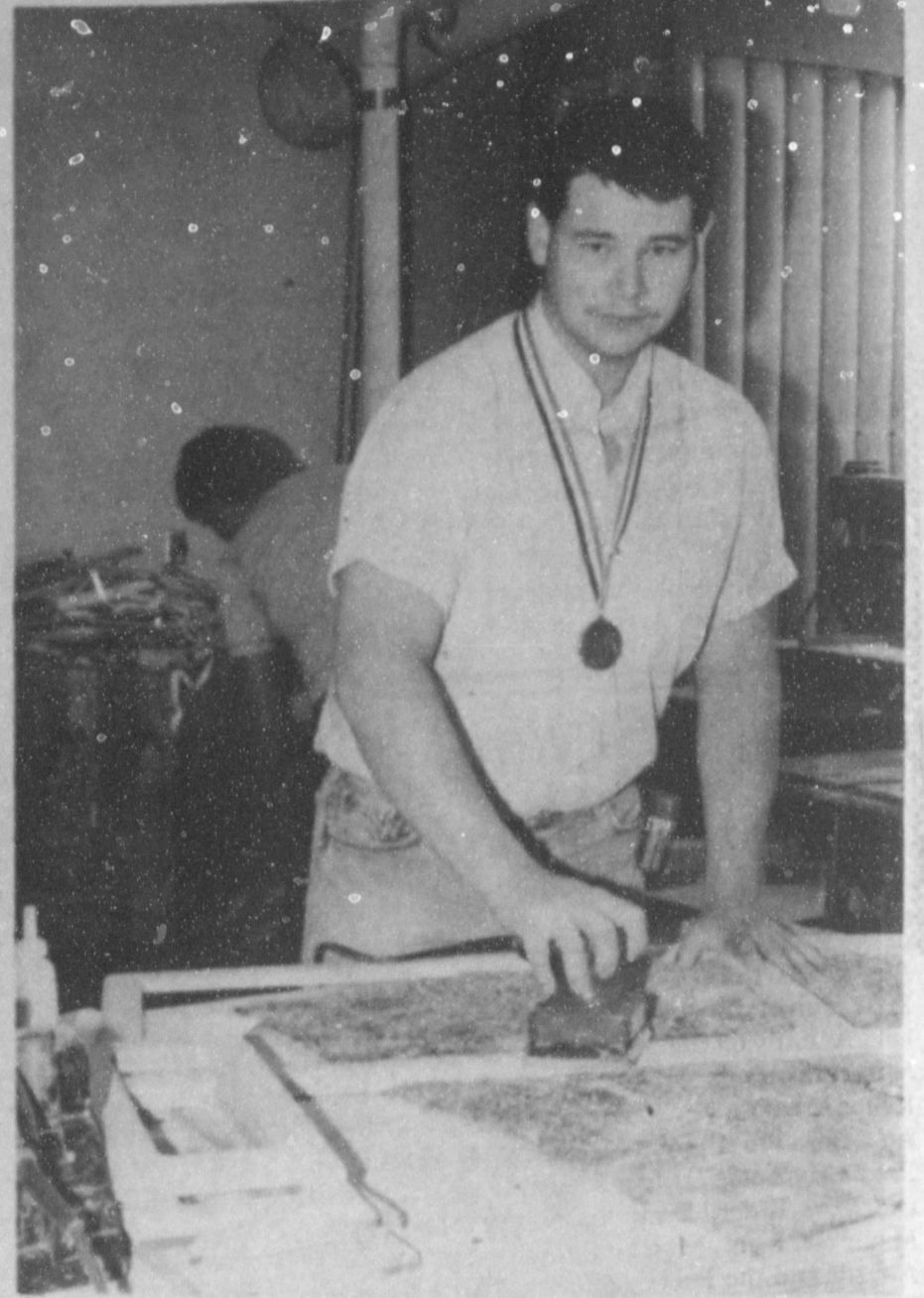

recruiting RN's because the nurses currently receive no benefits. She said they are hoping to have commitments from enough RN's to help qualify for Medicare, but said benefits for nurses must be assured.

She was asked by MAHD member, Bob Finney that if the situation changes, and the hospital district is approved, would recruiting become easier. Ms. Swint said if the hospital district is approved, and the hospital is stabilized, recruiting will become easier.

Chisholm commented, "Newspaper headlines are doing more to get people interested in the hospital than all the ads we can run."

He said there would be no extension for the emergency room waiver, so something must be done for the Medicare waiver which was the first one issued in the state of Texas. Under the Medicare waiver, Medicare patients could be observed for 23 hours, although not admitted to the hospital as a patient.

Dr. Bruce Purdy told the MAHD Board, "The medical staff would like Medicare as soon as possible. We realize the increased financial load that would accompany Medicare certification, but we must find a way for the increased staff and plant changes required."

Muleshoe Nursing Home Administrator Rachel Snider talked about upcoming changes in nursing home procedures.

Currently, the nursing home has three levels of pay, but will be changing to 11-different levels of care, with graduating charges for each level.

She said that currently, the nursing home is full. It has 47 people, and a waiting list for residents. She also said the nursing home is licensed for 57 beds, but because some of the patients have contracted for private rooms, the nursing home is full at 47 residents.

She also said currently, 60 percent of the residents are Medicaid and 40 percent are private pay.

Ms. Snider explained changes in the Texas laws that will be affecting all nursing homes, and extra expenses that will be involved with extra personnel to be hired.

She also talked about inspectors and what they will find wrong at the Muleshoe Nursing Home. There are no major difficulties, but smaller problems that inspectors say will "take away from the quality of life for the residents."

Unlike hospitals, it was explained that nursing homes can be assessed penalties in the form

of fines, which have to be paid.

Coy Noles, a CPA from Lubbock talked about the financial condition of the hospital. He said that according to the records provided by the bookkeeping staff at WPMC, the hospital is pretty much in range with operating losses of other hospitals he works with. "I have seen worse," he commented.

He said the most critical area at this time was to get necessary upkeep done, and try to take care of some old debts was of major importance.

He said the \$25,000-\$30,000 operating losses at the hospital right now could be substantially cut down. And, at best, according to Noles, it will take 4-5 years to 'get over the hump,' and everything paid off, such as old debts.

Noles also said that if the hospital is used by local and area residents, it could be in the 'black' by as little as three years.

The CPA said one additional patient a day can make a big difference in losses and that two additional patients per day can make a \$25,000-\$30,000 difference in hospital income in only one month.

"I would urge you, as a board," Noles told the Temporary Board of the Muleshoe Area Hospital District, "to demand monthly financial statements; review them closely. And, ask questions!!"

Finney then asked about the hospital operating for another 50 days as it currently operates, and received a 'very doubtful' answer.

Kay Swint said the hospital could handle as high as 8-9 patients per day as easily as they are handling the same approximately three patients at this time. This would involve very little extra expense for the hospital's operation, she said.

Dr. Purdy discussed the method of payment for Medicare, but emphasized, "we've got to figure out how to service all our patients."

Dr. Purdy also briefly explained the difference in Medicare payments to urban and rural hospitals, and how much it takes away from rural hospitals.

The WPMC administrator told the MAHD board about reorganization being underway in the billing and insurance offices at the hospital and the new methods of collecting overdue accounts.

"Most everything is beginning to move into place," he said. "We will be trying to do things financially for the next two months. We believe good things will be coming for West Plains Medical Center," added Chisholm.

holm.

Buck Campbell, president of the Muleshoe Area Hospital District Board, said "This will be a pretty tough deal, any way you look at it, for a few years. A hospital district will only give us a foothold."

The doctors believe that once a hospital district is approved, it will be easy to recruit new doctors to Muleshoe. He said that eight years ago, there were more than five doctors, and a surgeon. Adding additional doctors, and a surgeon, would increase the patient load in WPMC, adding, he already has three inquiries from doctors, including a respected surgeon, about moving to Muleshoe.

Also, the transfer of many patients to Lubbock would cease, as they could be adequately cared for in Muleshoe.

Both Dr. Purdy and Kay Swint said the operating room and O.B. are well-equipped, and the nurses have a lot of good, modern equipment. It is not the medical part that needs updated, said Dr. Purdy, but the physical plant itself.

The CPA reminded that should the hospital close again, there will be a loss of jobs, property devaluation, loss of more businesses, and the medical dollars that could be staying in Muleshoe will be spent out of town.

Both boards will be working toward finding both temporary and permanent solutions to the hospital situation while the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture and a nucleus committee, headed up by the Muleshoe Activities Committee work in the election campaign.

tronic metering devices, etc.)

3. Complete up-date of all policies and procedures to include development of fire and safety programs.

4. Implement a full-scale preventative maintenance program. (Costly but necessary).

5. Re-institute a stable water treatment program.

6. Overhauling the air conditioning and boiler systems. (steam valve, piping, chiller compressors, cooling towers, hot water generators, coils, air handling units, pneumatic controls, etc.)

7. The fire alarm, telephone system, nurses call, and auto-clave system are all in need of repair.

8. Repairs to the roof and parking lot areas are due and necessary immediately.

9. Central clock system throughout the hospital is in need of repair.

10. The hospital's emergency generator system is in need of repair.

12. Many items of medical equipment and furniture have reached its useful life expectancy and must be repaired or replaced. (Mattresses, furniture, blood banking equipment, laboratory scientific equipment, radio, paging and communication equipment.)

In summary, it will take over a full year of planning and assessment, and acquisition of those items needed to bring the hospital into contemporary, state of the art condition.

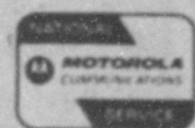

Tailwater Cases 'Up' Says Water District

High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 officials have noted an increase in tailwater reports during the 1989 pre-plant irrigation season. However, these additional reports do not signal a return to the groundwater waste that occurred in previous years, according to Ken Carver, assistant manager.

Drier than normal soil conditions over the area have caused more farmers to apply a pre-plant irrigation this year than in the previous three years. The amount of tailwater escaping from the fields has increased accordingly.

"Tailwater waste causes depletion of the Ogallala Aquifer without deriving beneficial use from the pumped water. Irrigators must also pay pumping costs for the runoff without realizing benefits from that cost. The waste affects all of us," says Carver. He adds that tailwater can also erode topsoil, damage

neighboring crops, and create safety hazards by filling roadway ditches and culverts.

Carver reminds irrigators that tailwater waste is not only costly in terms of water and energy, but it is also against the law.

State law and High Plains Water District rules strictly prohibit tailwater waste. Water District rules define tailwater waste as "Willfully or negligently causing, suffering, or permitting underground water produced for irrigation or agricultural purposes to escape into any river, creek, or other natural water course, depression, or lake, reservoir, drain, or into any sewer, street, highway, road, road ditch, or upon the land of any person other than the owner of such well, or upon public land."

District field personnel document tailwater occurrences with photographs and written memorandums. In most cases, the

District is able to work with landowners and operators to reduce or eliminate tailwater waste. However, in some cases, habitual violation of tailwater laws results in court-ordered injunctions against both the landowner and the operator. Continued tailwater waste is then considered "contempt of court" and can carry a maximum fine of \$500 and/or jail sentence of six months per occurrence.

Carver notes that most irrigators are cooperative in correcting tailwater problems when informed of the benefits of tailwater prevention.

"Overall, the farmers realize that they need to conserve their water and prevent waste. Even though an increasing number of tailwater problems are being addressed this year, the trend is toward better water conservation by the farmers," he says.

Carver cites several water conservation techniques that irrigators may incorporate into their management plans to reduce and/or eliminate tailwater.

Tailwater return systems may be installed in an excavated pit, or a modified playa lake, to store runoff water. With a lake pump in place, irrigators can transport the reclaimed water from the pit for re-use in the field. This helps lower the cost of pumping groundwater and also reduces the dependence upon groundwater.

Surge irrigation can also reduce or eliminate tailwater by utilizing a series of timed irrigation cycles to quickly send water down the furrow. When the water reaches the furrow end, the surge cycle time is cut back to prevent tailwater runoff. Surge irrigation can increase furrow irrigation application efficiencies from 10 to 40 percent.

Another irrigation method that is being widely adopted across the Water District is the center pivot sprinkler. By adjusting the pivot's traveling speed, the volume of water can be matched to the soil's infiltration rate in order to reduce runoff.

Center pivots modified with droplines reduce evaporation losses and increase water application efficiency ratings. Modi-

fied dropline center pivot systems demonstrate about an 80 percent water application efficiency rating, while LEPA, or low energy precision application, systems can achieve up to a 98 percent water application efficiency rating when used with furrow dikes.

"There are many physical methods available to help control or prevent tailwater waste, but the individual operator is usually the key to whether or not water is wasted. Careful management of irrigation water normally provides the best results for eliminating tailwater waste," he says.

"The High Plains Water District commends the many area farmers who are doing an excellent job of managing their water, and we want them to know our District staff is always available to assist the farmer in utilizing his water wisely," he adds.

New Legal Service Helps The Elderly

Often, the people who need a lawyer the most can least afford one. A new service, the Legal Hotline for Older Texans, is now being offered to any Texan 60 years of age or older.

"We want this to be a first resort for older Texans when they have problems or questions about legal matters," said Randall Chapman, director of Texas Legal Services Center. "Our primary aim is to provide older Texans, especially those on low, fixed-income, with free or low-cost legal services."

Hotline attorneys determine if callers have a legal problem, give free legal information and advice over the phone, and provide brief services such as calling a third party or writing a letter to resolve a legal problem. Problems that cannot be resolved by the Hotline will be referred to legal aid organizations for low-income clients, or local attorneys in private practice who agree to charge reduced fees.

Hotline services are free. People requiring follow-up services may be referred to a local attorney.

"Licensed attorneys will help resolve such caller's problems with Social Security, health care, consumer problems and elder abuse," Chapman said. "Our service will place a lot of emphasis on public benefits and health care. I believe our primary clients, elderly on low, fixed-incomes, are in dire need of these particular services."

O. P. 'Bob' Bobbitt, executive director of the Texas Department on Aging, believes the Hotline will enhance the efforts of his department in providing legal services to the elderly. "This hotline will be a very useful resource to the elderly, especially the homebound and those who may be institutionalized. We are presently enhancing our efforts in the area of benefits counseling and legal services are certainly an integral part of it," he said.

The Legal Hotline for Older Texans is primarily supported by a grant from the American Association of Retired Persons, with additional in-kind support from the State Bar of Texas and the Texas Department on Aging.

Some New Water Wells May Violate Water Laws

"It is important for people to know that their water well driller may not legally complete a single water well in both the Ogallala Formation and the Triassic Formation," says Ken Carver, assistant manager of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in Lubbock.

The reason for this restriction is that water will drain continuously from the upper formation into the lower formation, eventually depleting the upper formation.

Carver cited a recent Randall County domestic water well completed to pump from both geological formations as the reason for the District-wide reminder.

"In the past, some well drillers tried to get the 'best of both worlds' by perforating the casing opposite both formations. The Water District considers any well which allows groundwater from the Ogallala Formation to move into the Triassic Formation to be wasteful.

In 1965, the District's Board of Directors adopted a rule setting forth procedures designed to correct this type of water waste," he says.

According to Rule 16(A) of the High Plains Water District, any water well or test hole drilled through the Ogallala Formation

into the underlying Triassic Formation, or redbed, must be completed so that groundwater from the Ogallala Formation will not be able to move into the formation beneath it.

If a well is drilled to produce water from the Triassic Formation, the casing must be set through the Ogallala Formation and into the Triassic a minimum of 10 feet. The area between the wall of the well and the casing must be cemented to the surface. The well may then be drilled through the surface casing to the water sands in the Triassic Formation.

If the portion of the well penetrating the Triassic Formation is abandoned, the drillers must follow one of the procedures discussed in Rule 16(A):

* If no casing has been placed in the well below the top of the Triassic Formation, the hole will be filled with dirt, rock, mud or similar material to a level no less than 50 feet below the base of the Ogallala Formation and sufficient cement added to fill the hole to the base of the Ogallala Formation.

* If the casing has been set through the Triassic Formation with perforations located below the Ogallala Formation, all such perforations located below the Ogallala Formation, all such perforations shall be closed with cement and a cement plug at

least 10 feet in height placed in the casing below the base of the Ogallala and above the highest perforation in the Triassic.

"If blank casing (no perforations) has been set into the Triassic, then either (a) cement shall be pumped below the shoe of such casing in sufficient volume to fill the annulus of such casing and the wall of the hole up to the base of the Ogallala Formation, or (b) the casing shall be removed from the well and the hole shall be filled with dirt, rock, mud or similar material to a level no less than 50 feet below the base of the Ogallala Formation and sufficient cement added to fill the hole to the base of the Ogallala Formation."

"In the thin saturated thickness areas of the Ogallala Aquifer, some people may think that drilling deep and combining the water from the Ogallala and Triassic Formations will provide more water to pump. However, when the well is not being pumped, groundwater from the

Ogallala Formation drains into the lower formation and is lost. This just compounds the problem of depletion of the Ogallala Formation," says Carver.

He adds that proper completion of a well -- either in the Ogallala or the Triassic Formations -- will better serve the individual, the public and the aquifer.

GTE Adding Code For North Texas

Mathematically it had to happen: the seemingly endless supply of telephone numbers available for customers in north and northeast Texas is nearing depletion, according to John D. Wallace of GTE. He says continuing growth in these regions is causing a shortage of available 214 area code numbers, with a projected depletion in late 1991.

The continued growth will be accommodated through the addition of a new "903" area code, effective November 4, 1990. Dallas and 27 surrounding cities will remain within the 214 area code boundary. Some 200 cities outside the Dallas metropolitan area -- and currently within the 214 area -- will be assigned the new 903 code.

"We are doing our best to see that this change results in as little inconvenience as possible for our customers," said E. L. 'Buddy' Langley, GTE Southwest president.

According to Langley, telephone companies serving the 214 area code service area are announcing the planned change at this time so that customers who may be affected can make plans well in advance of the November 4, 1990 change, whether it be simply notifying friends and relatives of the new area code or in displaying it on their stationery and in advertising.

GTE and other telephone companies will be making extra efforts to ensure the changeover is as painless as possible for customers.

After November 4, 1990, customers served by the new 903 code will continue to receive their long distance calls for six months -- even if the caller mistakenly uses the 214 area code when dialing.

"We'll be promoting the change through out GTE telephone directories, bill inserts, news releases, advertisements and customer handouts. And we're sure our customers will start early, too. But despite our best efforts, it will take time for all customers to become aware of the area code change. The six month grace period will give callers an opportunity to begin building new dialing habits. In the meantime, those who haven't gotten the word or who forgot about the change will be able to complete their calls," Langley said.

No changes in local dialing requirements or seven-digit local numbers are planned for customers in either the 214 or 903 calling areas as a result of the change.

The area code change will have far-reaching impact. Telephone switching offices throughout the nation route millions of telephone

calls daily. The electronic switches are controlled by computers which have been programmed with area code and number information. To successfully implement the new area code, all telephone company switching equipment must be reprogrammed to recognize the new 903 area code. Software changes will also be necessary to redefine the 214 service area.

Some business and residential customers who own sophisticated equipment designed to route long distance calling through the fastest and most economical routes will also be required to make modifications to accommodate the new area code. In such cases, it may be necessary to contact the appropriate vendor, added Langley.

"This is a necessary change which is required due to simple mathematics," Langley said. "Within the 214 area code, all available numbers are being depleted. We must take the necessary steps to accommodate the continuing growth of north and northeast Texas."

Is inflation here to stay, or only making a cameo appearance?

Some recent news indicates inflation may have returned in full force. Indeed two consecutive months of annualized producer price hikes of 12% are alarming enough.

When you throw in oil prices that have been moving higher, wages that appear to be showing an upward bias after years of moderate growth, and the likelihood of a higher minimum wage, the prospects for sharply higher inflation certainly are present.

We're not the only ones who notice these events, as evident by the Federal Reserve Board's tight money policy in recent weeks. The Fed has been boosting rates sharply in hopes of squelching inflation. Too tight a policy could lead to recession.

Rising interest rates from a tight money policy are usually bad for the market. Rising inflation wouldn't be a plus. A no-win situation, one might say.

However, never forget it's the market that will have the last word; it's still too early to be ringing the death knell for stocks.

Comptroller Says Economy Better Now

State Comptroller Bob Bullock says that an expanding economy will make an extra \$210 million available for the 1990-1991 state budget.

Bullock added the \$210 million in new tax revenue in a revised revenue estimate he sent to the Legislature on Thursday. Earlier this year, Bullock had already upped his original estimate by \$150 million to reflect improved sales tax revenue.

"This additional \$210 million is directly attributable to the Texas economy," Bullock said. "Our economy is no longer just recovering, it is expanding."

The latest infusion of new tax money into the estimate brings to \$3.8 billion the total increase in funds available for the 1990-1991 budget compared to the current 1988-1989 budget.

Besides the projected new tax money, the increased available revenue comes from several bookkeeping transactions adopted by the Legislature, legislative actions on tax issues involving the franchise tax, and guarantees against legal challenges.

Among the state's major tax sources, significant increases were forecast in sales and natural gas taxes. Improvements were also seen in the franchise tax and in federal money for MHMR facilities.

But projected motor vehicle sales taxes were lowered in the revised estimates because interest rates have caused a slowdown in new car sales.

A significant increase in the hotel/motel tax was also projected because of increasing occupancy levels and the rebounding state economy.

Bookkeeping transfers and repairs to the state's franchise tax law will capture more than \$1.5 billion, Bullock said. A reduction in reserves for pending legal challenges adds another \$415 million to the estimate because the potential for tax refunds has diminished.
