Bagworms are one of the major-
pests of junipers and other trees
and shrubs in Texas. Spring
hatch began in early May on the
South Plains this year. Hatching is usually completed in about three weeks. Insecticide control

In the spring, bagworm lar emerge from hatching larvae

leaves making them camouflaged and hard to see. As the larvae

For this reason it has never been able to take full advantage of its facilties and its potential market.
Q - How would the hospital halp the older people if it qualifies for Medicare, ste.
A - A minimum of $50 \%$ of the West Plains Medical Center's possible patients are the recipients of medicare benefits. Currently Medicare will not pay for patients at WPMC hospital so persons eligible for Medicare have to go elsewhere.
0 - If the hospital district tails, what effect will this have on the Nursing Home?
A - West Plains Medical Center, Inc. owns the nursing home. clinic and hospital. If the corporation cesses to exist the Nursing Home will be closed.
$\mathbf{Q}$ - Is it true that if we do not vote in a hospinal district here, that Lubbock or another hospital district could include us in their district and tax us on it?
A - Probably! The legislature will authorize the creation of six hospital districts in our Senatorial District alone during the current session. It is highly unlikely that anyone will be outside of a hospital district in the future.

The MAIN ISSUE to be decided in the June 20th election is to have MEDICAL CARE AVAILABLE IN OUR AREA or not. Assuming a positive outcome, public mestings will be held with the Muleshoe Area Hospital District Board to determine the level of care and a tax rate will be set


accerdingly, not to exceed the maximum allowable.
