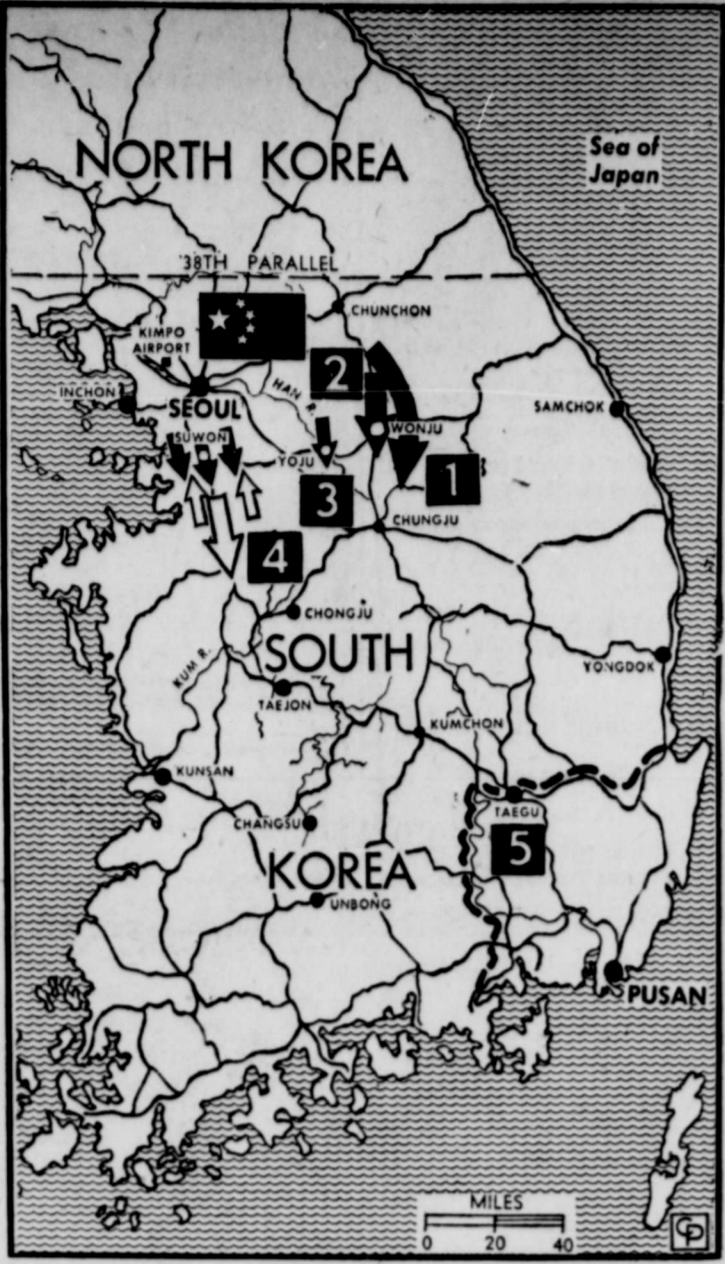

Local Man, Manager of Saudi-Arabia Farm, Describes Work in Near East

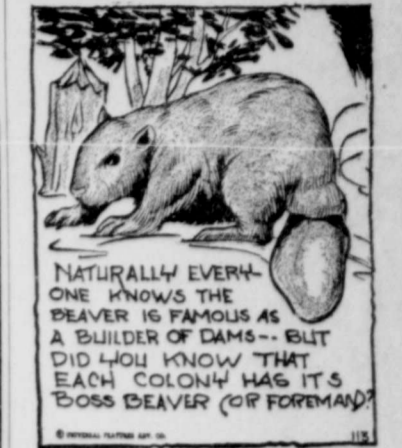

The GI Bill farm training has shown the way to better living on the farm. In a Louisiana parish, half of all the farm trainees had their homes wired for electricity. In Oklahoma, in one year's time, 3000 trainees remodeled their houses, 1000 put in phones, 3000 wired their farms for electricity, and 1000 piped in running water.

Automatic Cotton Sampler Has Been Developed

A mechanical cotton sampler that automatically collects lint during ginning and packages a cross section of the bale into a true sample has been developed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, according to Marshall Thompson, extension cotton marketing specialist at New Mexico A. & M. College.

The uniform size and preparation of samples taken by the new machine are favorable to accurate classification. The sample is long enough and contains enough cotton to allow it to be divided into duplicate samples. One sampler has been installed in a New Mexico gin where samples are being used for classification and marketing.

GI Bill Farm-Training Bill Has Far-Reaching Impact on Veterans

What does the GI Bill farm-training mean to the nation? Under this program, which combines classroom studies with actual experience on the farm, two-thirds of America's 900,000 veteran farmers have been enrolled at some time or other. The Veterans Administration has just completed a compilation of state and community surveys of the achievements of this program.

GI farm training has had a far-reaching impact on veterans in agriculture. It has helped them to buy, rent or lease their own farms. On Sept. 1, 1950, a total of 94 per cent of the 314,800 farm trainees were in the owner and operator classes.

In many areas it has helped to boost farm incomes, it has led to increased farm production and to extensive soil conservation activities, and has encouraged farm improvements that have made for better living.

Following are a few random examples—and not exceptional cases—of the results of six years of GI Bill institutional-on-farm training:

A young Pennsylvania veteran, with three years of GI farm training, has doubled his crop yield. He has also doubled his milk production, and his yearly net income.

this "learn while you farm" program so far have invested 100 million dollars in land, homes, stock, and farm equipment.

In one Indiana county, trainees took four out of five prizes in a corn acreage contest.

A Montana veteran, a full-blooded Indian, did so well in his first seven months of training, that his tribe advanced him the money for his own farm. Since then, he has added livestock, rebuilt his house, bought a pickup truck, and kept up his farm loan payments.

The average net income of farm trainees in one Pennsylvania county was \$400 before they started their courses. Now it is \$1400. A survey from Western Massachusetts, placed the average net income for GI farm trainees at \$1300.

Also, these state farm surveys indicate that the techniques taught to farmer-veterans under the GI Bill program have played a vital part in raising the productivity of their farms. For example, in three West Virginia counties, veterans have been averaging more than 100 bushels of shelled corn per acre, compared with an area-wide yield of 43 bushels to the acre.

The GI Bill program's emphasis on soil improvement and conservation is responsible for these examples: North Carolina veterans con-

structed 15 million feet of terraces for the purpose of conserving the soil, reforested 6000 acres of land, and limed 16,000 acres, all in the period of one year. In Georgia, 21,000 farm trainees developed 150,000 acres of pasture from eroded red clay land that at one time was nearly worthless.

Finally, the surveys reveal that in many areas across the country,

It was realized that this 100 per cent convalescent rating did not always reflect the permanent condition of the veterans, that many were not totally disabled even at that time. It was realized also that with improved diet and a return to normal home life their health would naturally improve. Under the law, all convalescent ratings must be reviewed at periodic intervals and the veteran given new medical examinations. Accordingly, compensation ratings could be revised according to subsequent medical findings as the veteran improved in health. Thus, by 1948, these Bataan veterans' compensations were being reviewed—and in some cases, being reduced.

By mid-1949 the problem of handling POW cases had become a serious one. Some of these veterans began to complain that their compensation had been reduced several times, yet they were often unable to work. Individual cases were brought to the attention of Robens and VA started a survey. The results were placed before Administrator Carl R. Gray, Jr., who sent a medical and claims advisor to Albuquerque to assist in a complete survey of all prisoner-of-war cases.

Study revealed that approximately 80 per cent of the former prisoners of war who had filed disability compensation claims were currently receiving compensations, that an additional 7 per cent had at some time received compensation and that less than 3 per cent of the claims had been disallowed, although they had been granted service connection for their disabilities.

The long-standing policy of the Veterans Administration was reviewed: Former prisoner of war must be given every consideration possible in the light of medical findings and the laws, but compensation cannot be allowed simply in the belief that it is warranted because a veteran was a former prisoner of war.

Out of days of intensive study and research by the VA came revised procedures designed by medical and claims experts to deal with this particular class of veterans.

First of all, more complete medical check-ups were found desirable and the VA promptly scheduled 150 Bataan veterans for new examinations—two-day affairs entailing a full study of the gastro-intestinal tract.

Then new yardsticks based on legal interpretations of compensation laws were set up for the rat-

Safely Done in '51 Is Suggestion Of County Agent

"Get all work safely done in 1951" is a resolution suggested by County Agent Dallas Rierson, who points out that such a resolution is not only thoroughly practical, but also of great importance. "It can be carried out by the whole family, to the benefit of all," he says. "Making and keeping New Year's safety resolutions by each member of the farm family is recommended by the National Safety Council," Rierson explains. "More than a pastime, it is a means of assuring happiness and well-being of farm people every where."

The National Safety Council offers the following suggestions for

New Year's resolutions for farm family:
We will check the farm and home to locate and remove hazards.
We will keep all shields and guards in place on machines.
We will handle poisons and pesticides carefully, keeping them well labeled and out of reach of children.
Regardless of the emergency, we will not permit young children to operate or ride upon farm machinery.
We will keep guns unloaded and out of reach of children.
We will be cautious in handling all farm animals.
We will encourage farm activities in all our organizations.
We will be alert for safety weeks of the year.

Problem of Realistic Compensation For Bataan Veterans Near Solution

The problem of providing realistic, yet sympathetic disability compensation, for about 300 Bataan veterans and other former prisoners of war is believed near solution as the result of a year-long review by the Veterans Administration regional office in Albuquerque.

So satisfactorily has the problem been met, according to Gene A. Robens, manager of the VA regional office, that only a few former prisoners of war have voiced dissatisfaction with their latest disability ratings.

In a diagnosis of the true conditions of men who were starved and subjected to the most brutal treatment for as long as four years in Japanese prison camps. Then there is the additional problem of applying disability compensation laws to these men whose ailments and physical problems run the gamut of the medical dictionary.

Robens explained that back in 1945 and 1946, when more than 1500 Bataan veterans returned from Cabantuan, Bilid and other famous prison camps, they were almost

without exception seriously ill. They suffered from avitaminosis, malnutrition, pellagra, dysentery, malaria, dengue fever, beriberi and many had the additional complication of an anxiety condition.

In a matter of a few months, several hundred veterans filed claims for disability compensation. It was impossible to provide promptly for these men yet properly evaluate their illnesses. The rating boards, which decide a man's disability compensation, found the only immediate practical means of caring for these veterans was to combine their various disabilities in many instances under a blanket convalescent rating of 100 per cent disability.

ing boards. The local VA rating boards began their tedious review. Almost immediately they were enabled under the law to discontinue the periodic reductions in many cases and to grant others actual increases in compensation.

Today, the VA announced that of the Bataan veterans who have been called in for these extensive reexaminations, more than 70 per cent had received actual increases in compensation and just two had had their disability ratings reduced.

"The problem is basically a medical one," explained Robens. "You must remember there is little precedent for handling conditions which show up in former prisoners of war cases. Repeatedly in the past year we have had to revise our interpretations of claims procedure in the light of new findings. We believe the VA has been sympathetic but still realistic."

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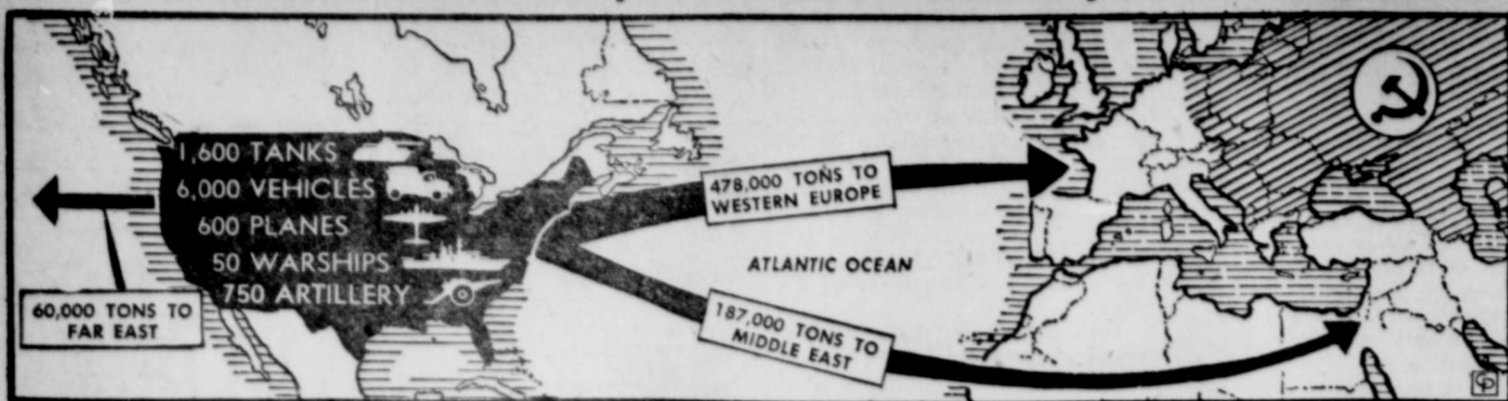

tude, the observers said, probably in the stratosphere, but certainly outside the earth's dense atmosphere. For one thing there were no vapor trails. And at the speed they were traveling, they would have melted and burned, in the manner of a meteor, had they been inside the atmosphere.

The speed, probably in the thousands of miles, was described by comparison by one of the men at the airport as that of a jet plane passing over at 4000 to 5000 feet. The "flying saucers" were by comparison about a fourth the size of the balloon and were a dark gray. Two of the men said that they noticed a sort of flutter and the appearance of being flattened—like a saucer—just before they disappeared in the east, perhaps as they started a turn to circle the balloon.

The observers from White Sands Proving Grounds, although greatly interested in the "flying saucers," which they said have been seen before while aerial experiments are being made, had to turn

back to the balloon, so as to further chart its progress and make ready to take off for the recovery of the instruments, which may reveal scientific knowledge leading to discoveries of forces greater than any yet known to man.

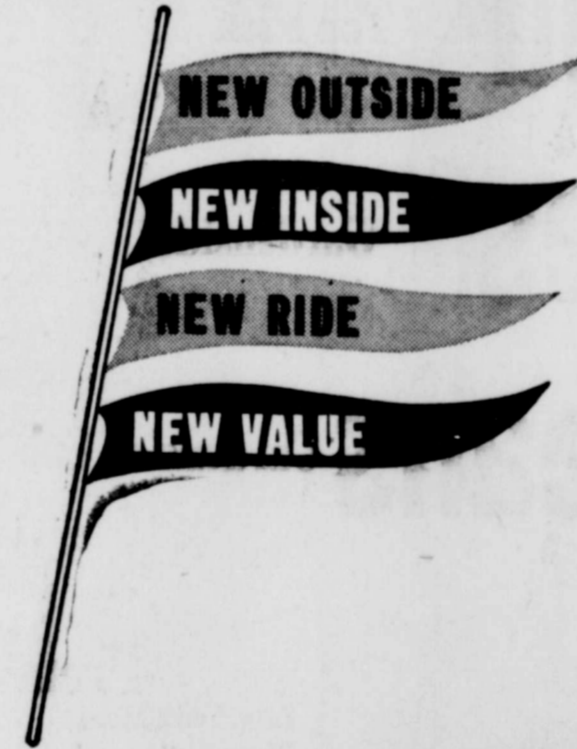

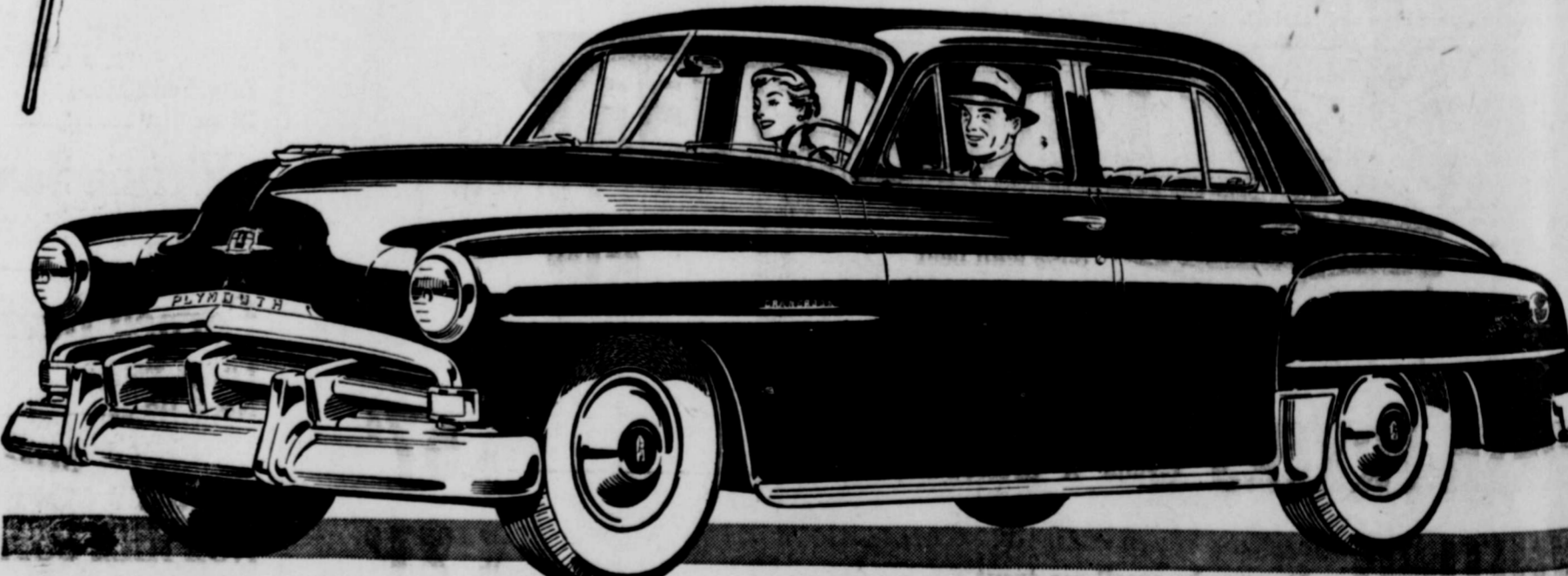
