New Crop Disaster Plan To Help Area

Commissioners Revise Manual

Monday afternoon, members of the Bailey County Commissioners Court met in special session in the commissioners meeting room at the courthouse.

During their first hour, the commissioners opened bids for paving a portion of Precinct Three, and discussed the bids.

They also met with Bailey County Tax Assessor Kathleen Hayes and Bailey County Treasurer Dorothy Turner, concerning line items on the proposed 1990 county budget.

Then, Donna Kirk, secretary to Bailey County Judge Jim Watson presented a revised Employee Information Manual.

Mrs. Kirk said the last time the Employee Information Manual was updated was in 1984.

She and the commissioners went section by section through the entire revised manual.

As a result, all department heads will be required to write a job description for each position in their department.

Also added was that the county is an 'Equal Employment Opportunity' employer.

The manual also includes one hour for lunch, and coffee breaks subject to approval of department heads.

No overtime hours will be paid to any employee, but if necessary, one and one-half times compensatory time will be allowed.

Another phrase added to the manual is that "Being on call does not constitute hours worked."

Judge Jim Watson warned that it is very important to keep letters on file written to employees warning them of "insubordination" prior to terminating them. He said he had talked with the Texas Employment Commission who did not specify to what degree a department head and employee should try to work out problems as long as you had the letter on file showing that you tried to work the problems out.

"We are trying to solidify things and bring everything into commissioners court," added the judge. "For instance, department heads will be required to turn in vacation time, etc."

"A department head should have nothing to do with setting a salary, it should be the commissioner's court," added Commissioner R. L. Scott.

Also, Scott asked for, and it was approved that meals during travel be changed from \$7.50 per meal or \$17.50 per day to \$10 per meal, or \$25.00 per day.

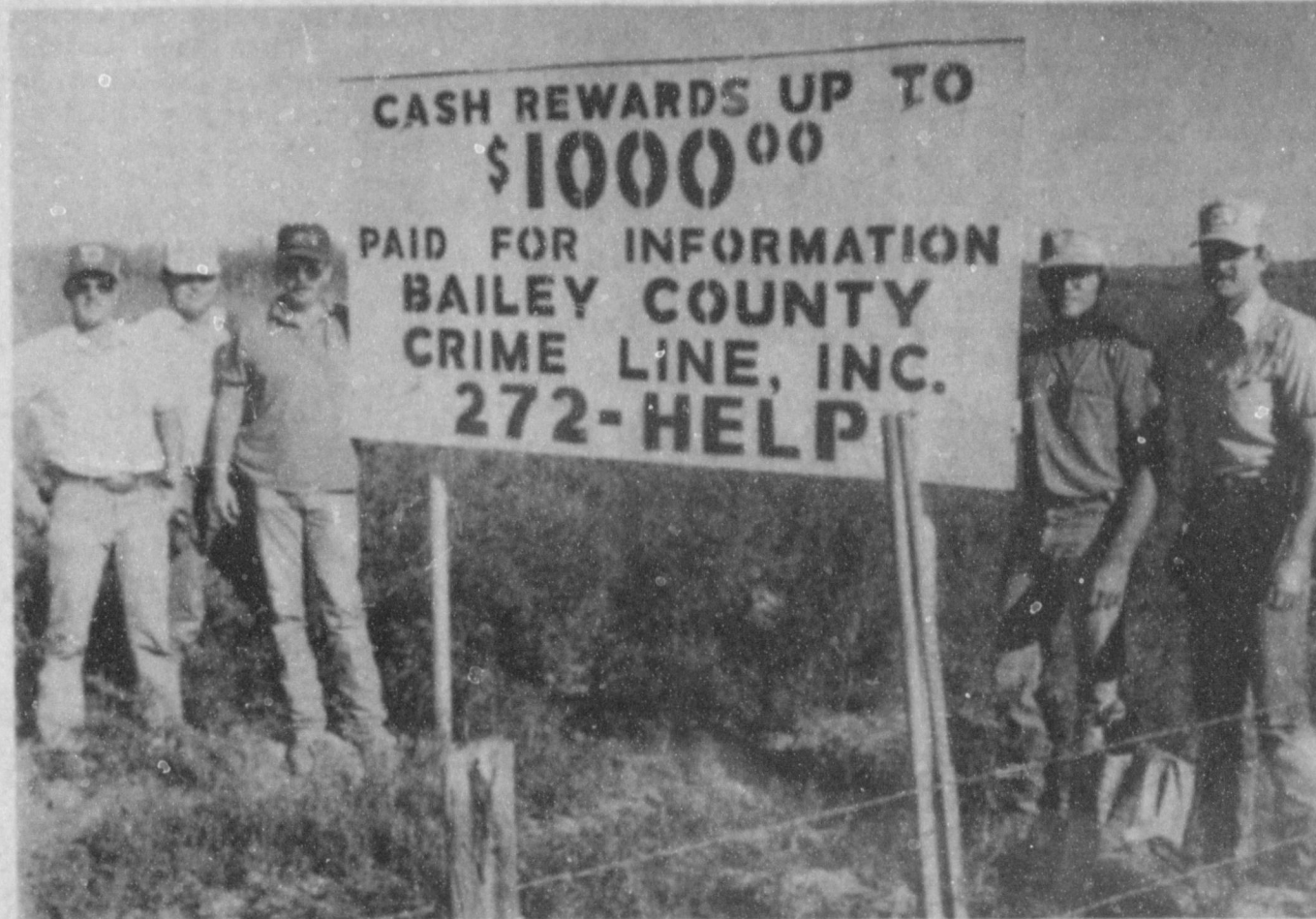
Temporary or part-time employees will not get vacation time; sick leave; holiday pay or insurance.

By request of Commissioner Scott, it was added to the manual that any county employee who is on citizenship leave, jury duty, be paid by the county for the day, but must return the jury check to the county.

It was also noted in the new manual that any time off of any nature, be reported to commissioners court by the department head, in writing.

At 3:55 p.m., County Clerk Barbara McCamish came into commissioners court and read the minutes of the previous meeting, which included a couple of motions for budget amendments which had not been shown on the previous agenda.

Judge Watson told the commissioners that a couple of people had called from Lazbuddie wanting Muleshoe to cover the Lazbuddie football games with an ambulance. Judge Watson also told commissioners he had checked with the county

Precincts Get Largest Portion Of Tax

(Editor's note: During the next several issues of *The Journals*, the proposed 1990 county budget will be broken down by departments, to show how your tax dollars are being spent. This issue, we are starting with the four precincts, who have the largest budgets, and work progressively down to the smallest budgets.)

In Precinct One, Commissioner R. L. Scott is showing a budget request for \$259,968.72 for 1990. Last year, his budgeted amount was \$170,065.46 and his actual budget 'spent' by September 1988, was \$168,019.32.

Starting out with salaries, Commissioner Scott was paid \$11,746.92 in 1988; \$12,334.32 for 1989 and will be paid \$12,704.40 in 1990, subject to

budget approval.

His machine operators are paid a total of \$47,542.70 in 1988; \$63,516.24 in 1989 and expect to be paid \$65,421.72 in 1990.

Also, for the commissioners, there is \$3,600 budgeted for 'in county travel', and that has held the same for the past three years, or \$300 additional each month. Their 'out-of-county' travel pay is budgeted at \$1,200 and that is an additional \$100 per month.

City Checks, Approves New Ordinances

All members of the Muleshoe City Council, along with Mayor Darrell Turner, City Manager Dave Marr and City Secretary Mary Hicks were present for the Tuesday morning meeting of the city council.

Following a lengthy discussion a new ordinance was approved. The Ordinance, No. 296A, concerned rules and regulations concerning the City of Muleshoe Municipal Airport.

This was followed by the adoption of an ordinance repealing all of Chapter Two of the Muleshoe City Code of 1974, regarding the City of Muleshoe Municipal Airport Rules and Regulations at Edward Warren Field.

In other business, the city discussed authorizing the submission of a Texas Community Development Program application to the Texas Department of Commerce for the Community Development Project Fund.

This program will be for another paving project -- this time in the part of Muleshoe known as "The Flats."

Basically, the paving grant would pave several blocks of the major traveled streets in the now sparsely populated part of the city.

The grant would also cover approximately 1,300 feet of sewer line for the same area.

City council members also set hangar rates, and rates for tiedowns. Persons who lease hangars will receive a copy of the new city ordinance at the time of their lease.

After some additional discussion, the meeting was dismissed.

Bailey County Extension Agent Spencer has provided the following information on the "Disaster Assistance Act of 1989:"

The Disaster Assistance Act of 1989 will provide economic aid to agricultural producers of program or nonprogram crops who suffered losses due to damaging weather or related conditions. Included as damaging weather is drought, hail, excessive moisture, freeze, tornado, hurricane, excessive wind, or any combination of these.

Related conditions are damages resulting because of or exacerbated by the damaging weather. Examples include plant diseases, insect damage, or crop deterioration including aflatoxin if the economic loss was worsened by damaging weather.

CROP ASSISTANCE

Payments to producers are provided for four levels of losses, depending on type of crop, level of commodity farm program participation, and enrollment in federal crop insurance. These four levels are:

- 65 percent of the 1989 target price on losses exceeding 35 percent of normal production to producers of program crops who participated in the commodity programs and purchased federal crop insurance on the 1989 crop.

- 65 percent of the 1989 target prices on losses exceeding 40 percent of the normal production to producers of program crops who participated in the commodity programs but did not purchase federal crop insurance on the 1989 crop.

- 65 percent of the 5-year average producer market price to soybean and sunflower producers for losses exceeding 45 percent of normal yield.

- 65 percent of the applicable payment rate stated above on losses exceeding 50 percent of normal to producers who either did not participate in the commodity programs or produced other nonprogram crops.

The act has further provisions which allow producers to exclude 70 percent of the production of a commodity which could not be sold in normal channels due to damaging weather before determining the amount of loss experienced, and forgives certain advanced deficiency payments on losses up to the thresholds listed in the first two items above. Several other provisions pertaining to the use of 50/92 or 0/92, determination of yields, planting of alternative crops, and crop quality reductions are also included.

As with the 1988 disaster act, combined crop insurance and disaster benefits cannot exceed what the producer would have received from normal yields. Further, no producer can receive

more than \$100,000 in benefits, and any person having gross revenue in excess of \$2 million is ineligible for any disaster benefits.

It also requires any producer receiving disaster benefits or forgiveness of advanced deficiency payments to purchase at least the minimum level of crop insurance, if available, in 1990 unless the premium exceeds 25 percent of the disaster benefits, has increased more than 25 percent between 1989 and 1990, or creates undue financial hardship.

LIVESTOCK ASSISTANCE

Several provisions for livestock producers were also included in the Disaster Act. On-farm stored feed grain under CCC loan can be used as part of the Emergency Livestock Feed Assistance program. Funding, too, is provided for constructing or maintaining livestock drinking water facilities and for transporting cattle to grazing locations. Participants in the conservation reserve program who are authorized to hay or graze those CRP acres will continue to receive the full rental payments provided they incur the costs of carrying out approved conservation practices.

As with any government farm program, producers are advised to consult with their local ASCS Cont. Page 6, Col. 5

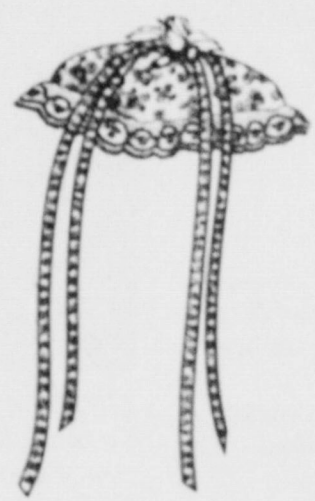

material, \$5,000.00.

The Precinct Two budget also carries a line item of fire protection at \$2,500.00 a first time budget item.

In 1988, Precinct Two had a budget of \$134,325.31; it was \$195,388.40 in 1989, and for 1990, Commissioner Seales is asking for \$254,143.72.

Joey Kindle, Commissioner of Precinct Three also shows identical salary and benefit schedules as Precincts One and Two; and again, there is a slight change in operating expenses.

For telephone, he shows a line item of \$800.00; electricity, \$800.00; gas for heat, \$600.00; equipment repair, \$25,000.00; motor vehicle insurance, \$5,000.00; miscellaneous, \$1,500.00; capital expenditures of \$20,000.00 and road surfacing material at \$10,000.00.

His budgeted figure for 1988 was \$169,022.34; for 1989, it was \$183,279.92; and for 1990, it is shown to be \$192,293.72.

From a budget of \$123,649.24 in 1988; to \$222,837.19 in 1989 Commissioner Rudolph Moraw's budget shows a decrease in 1990 to \$210,543.72.

Again, the Precinct Four salaries, benefits and most operating expense is identical as the other three precincts. His changes are in fuel at \$17,500.00; telephone, \$600.00; electricity, \$1,500.00; gas for heat at \$1,350.00; motor vehicle insurance at \$4,000.00; miscellaneous at \$2,000.00; capital expenditures at \$50,000.00 and nothing for road surfacing material. However, there has been nothing shown for 1988 or 1989 for road surfacing materials in 1988 or 1989.

Now, those are the largest budget items shown for the 1990 county budget.

Note: The next breakdown in the Sunday *Bailey County Journal* will show the sheriff's office, jail, ambulance service and non-departmental, as they are the next 'biggest' budget items for the county.

Montgomery told Rotarians that the CofC is 'very close' to obtaining a new manager for the Chamber and the new manager should be named shortly.

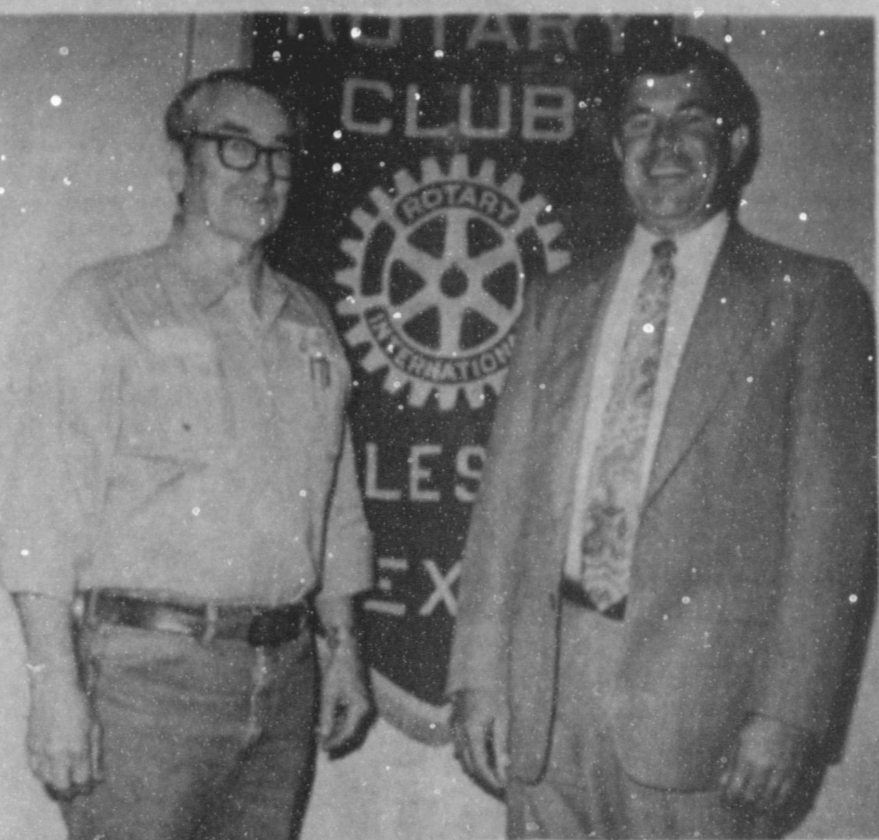
He explained some of the ways the CofC helps the community, and said the secretary stays busy fielding telephone calls, and sending out a lot of literature about Muleshoe.

not liable." "If we sell it, we would have to advertise it and the Hospital District may not get it," added the judge.

A brief discussion was held about calling a helicopter from Lubbock in the case of extreme injury to a football player.

After the discussion, on a motion by Don Seales, and second by Rudolph Moraw, it was agreed to temporarily authorize the use of a Bailey County EMS ambulance at Friday night football games at Lazbuddie at \$100 per game, until a director can be hired for the Bailey County EMS.

has announced the provisions of the 1990 farm program which apply to all commodities. Those provisions are similar to 1989 provisions and include:

- Limited cross compliance except for oats and extra long staple cotton. This means that in order to receive deficiency payments, CCC loans, and any optional diversions which are subsequently announced for any given crop, acreage planted to any other program crop on a farm cannot exceed that crop's acreage base.
- Offsetting compliance is not in effect.
- Nonprogram compliance cannot be on ACR or CUA acreage.
- Grazing of ACR and CUA is permitted except during the five primary growing months.
- Haying of ACR and CUA is not permitted unless the state ASCS committee can show that doing so would not have any adverse economic impact in the state.
- Exchange of crop acreages will not be permitted except as required to meet the provisions of conservation compliance.
- Advanced deficiency payments will be made at 40 percent of the projected deficiency payment rate.
- Farm program yields are based on the average of the 1981-85 program yields, dropping the high and low from the average.
- Farm program sign up will run from January 16 through April 13, 1990.
- Other 1990 farm program provisions for feed grains, cotton and rice will be announced later this fall and winter. As listed in the June 2 issue of the *MrketGram*, 1990 wheat provisions have already been announced. Those include a five percent acreage reduction, a \$4.00/bu. target price, and a \$1.95/bu. effective loan rate. This sets the maximum potential deficiency payment rate at \$2.05/bu.

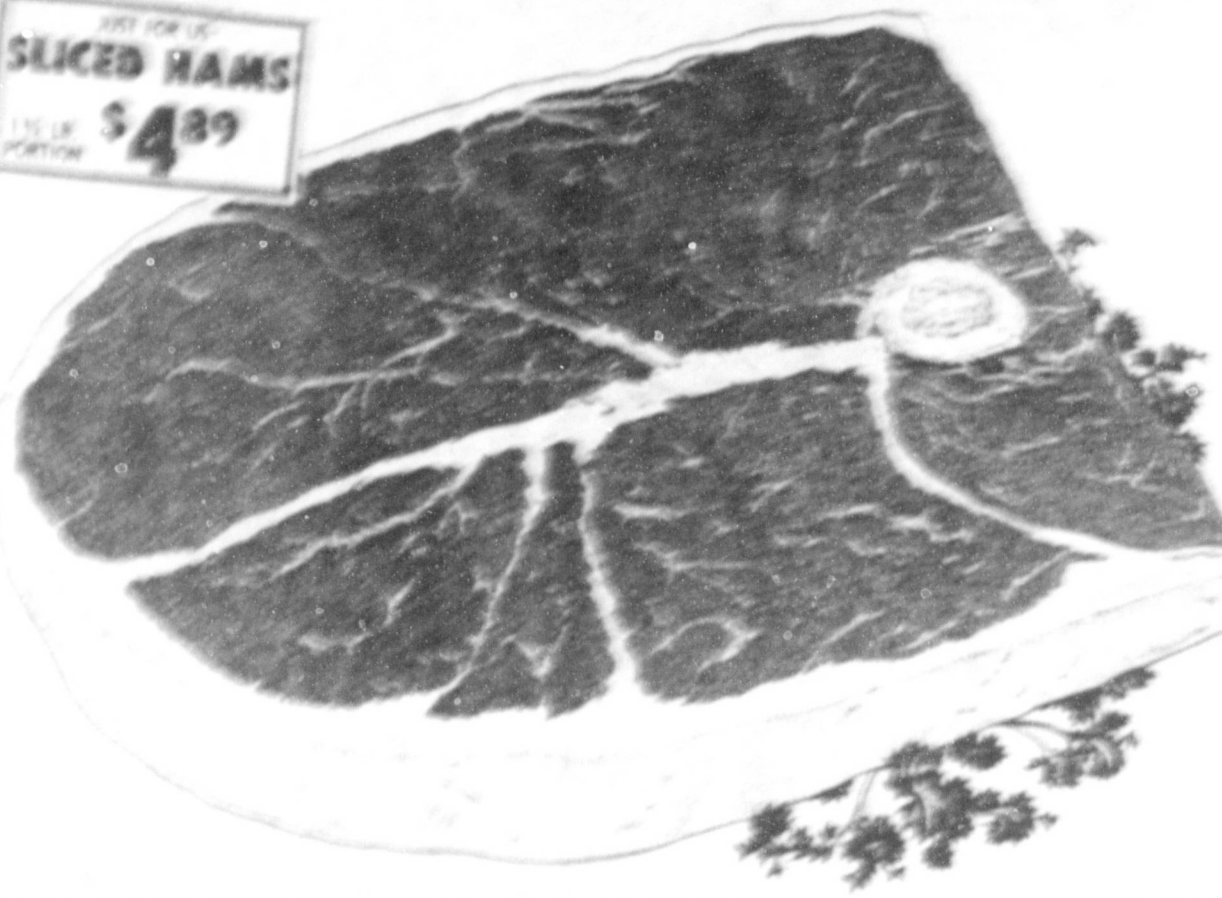

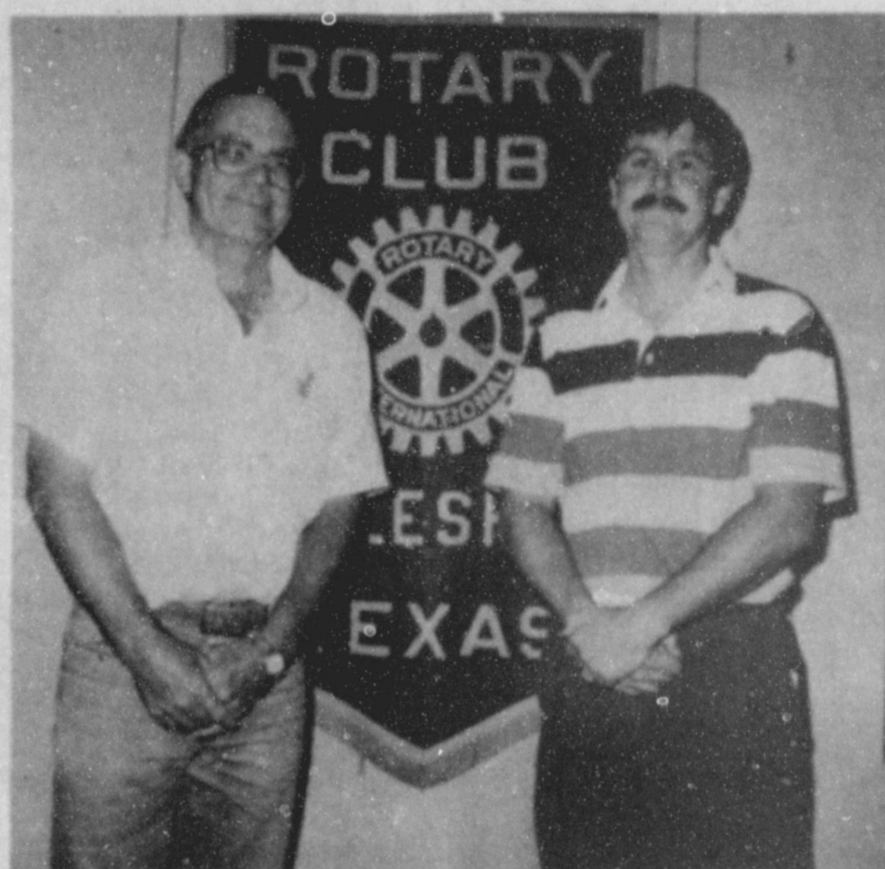
