Continental Brief Intimates Artesia Is One-Horse Town

Support for commercial airline service from all interested Artesia persons and firms is now a "must," Artesia Chamber of Commerce officials said today in losing a blast against Continental Airlines for its "unfair opposition tactics."

"Powerful and unexpected opposition to an Amarillo-Clovis-Roswell-Artesia-El Paso flight proposed by Pioneer Airlines has come to light," according to C of C Manager Bob Koonce.

Early in the case Continental requested and was granted leave to intervene," Koonce said.

Surprise, Anger— "Therefore," Koonce continued, "the Artesia brief was filed on the assumption that we had clear sailing, without opposition from Continental or other airlines."
