Scout Leaders Complete Advance Training Program

Scout leaders, assistants and troop members have completed an advanced training program this week under the direction of Miss Marjorie Milam, Scout director. This second series of training sessions has taken advantage of the fall and more women have taken advantage of the instruction.

On Wednesday's session at the Presbyterian hall emphasized program for girls' interests through special emphasis on their own decision making and songs and stories to the group and district committee work with the film, "Getting Along Together."

Miss Milam has never worked with a cooperative group of leaders before. The course is the first of Miss Milam's professional training. In addition, however, she gives individual training to those who miss the regular sessions. She covers the whole area, and organizes new troops.

Organized in the last six weeks are Bulldozer, Alamogordo, Hagerman, and Dexter. The greatest number of girls in the entire state, yet the lowest number of leaders in proportion to the number of girls in the country. In this area there are only two, Miss

Milam and Miss Elizabeth Kitchell of Carlsbad.

Miss Milam feels that the key-note of accomplishment is the partnership of volunteer and professional workers. The Southeastern New Mexico Girl Scout office has just recently been moved to room 204 of the Ward building, where Miss Milam and her secretary, Mrs. G. L. Boone, transact all Girl Scout business, and put out a monthly bulletin with information concerning all Girl Scout activities in the entire area.

The Girl Scout organization is a member of the Community Chest. Red Feather contributions make it possible to maintain the office here and pay the two professional workers.

Over 250 Scouts—
At present there are over 250 Girl Scouts in Artesia. Twenty troops are completely organized and meet weekly. Six troops are in the process of being organized but cannot meet for lack of meeting places and leaders. An appeal is being made by organization chairman, Mrs. John Smith for anyone who likes to work with girls to call her at 1031-J.

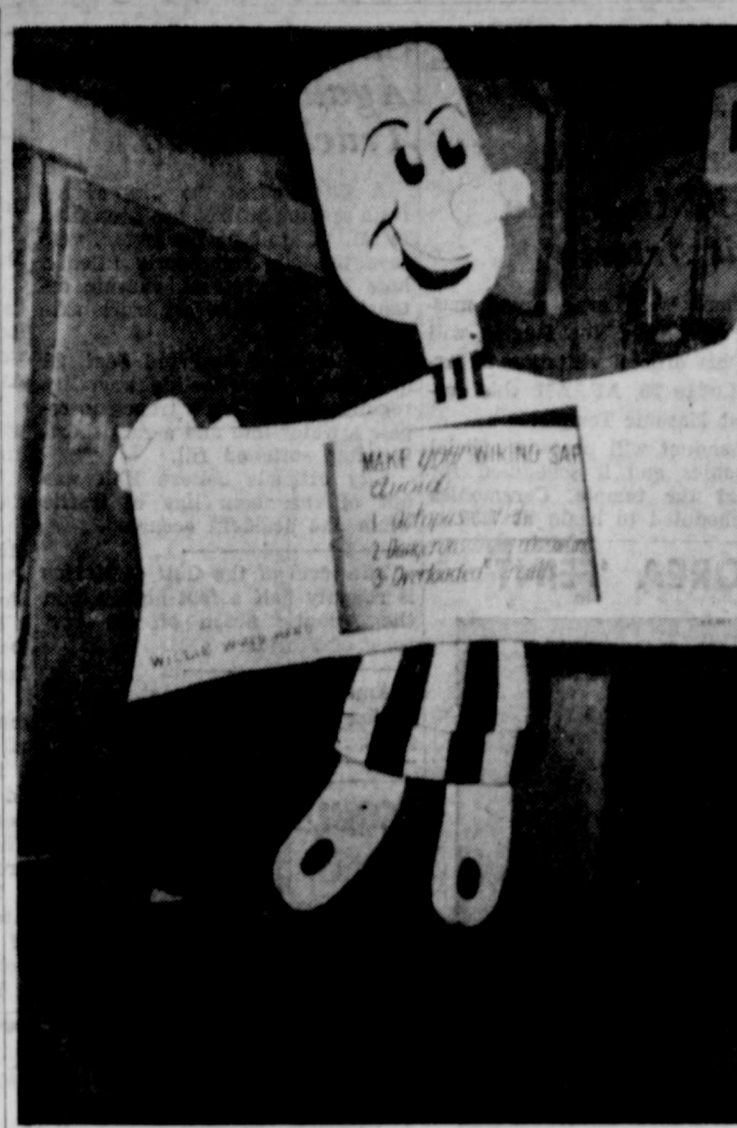
Delegates received the expense paid trip through the Santa Fe railroad.

Artesia Bulldogs Primed for Hobbs Contest Saturday; Only Injury, Reserves Cast Shadow

Artesia's Bulldogs are primed for tomorrow night's clash which again places the local eleven back in the spotlight as a contestant in a game-of-the-week contest.

Following Hobbs 28-13 shellacking of Albuquerque Highlands, the eastern squad has risen to the fore as a top state contender in the now-confused championship race.

Artesia is still counted as very much in the race across the state, and Saturday's game should have something to say about clearly establishing the rights of one of the two teams.

If Artesia can pull out a decisive victory over the Hobbs eleven, its team will receive a final shot in the arm that will be significant in final weeks of the campaign, and Saturday's game may thus prove to be the key contest if Artesia does establish state championship rights.

Coach Cal Hall has reported his charges to be in "excellent spirits" and physical condition of the squad is generally improved after a two-week layoff.

Extensive injuries sustained in the Glovis campaign are fairly well healed, Coach Hall stated Thursday. The Bulldogs will still be lacking reserve strength, however, Hall stated. Should tomorrow night's contest at Hobbs prove to be rough, the reserve factor may be decisive.

Coach John Daugherty, who scouted Hobbs in its contest with Highlands, reported the Hobbs contenders have "plenty of reserves, especially in the backfield."

He added "The Hobbs team features plenty of speed and surprising deception." Outstanding on defense is John Spoonemore, wingback who specializes in a reversed play that penetrated stout Highland defenses.

Daugherty recalled that Hobbs dropped two touchdown passes, but scored one and completed four of 12 attempted. Hobbs scored its other three touchdowns on ground plays.

The scout reported Hobbs' defense stopped Highlands cold in the second half of that now-classic contest. Hobbs began the second half on the small end of a 13-0 score, held Highlands scoreless, and rolled across three TDs.

Yumpy Barker, Larry Beadie, Bobby Loyd, and Doug Whitefield will be together again in the backfield, Coach Hall said. Loyd has sustained a severely bruised hip and a hand injury, which are on the road to mending.

Whitefield has struggled with bruised ribs and an arm which puts a question mark on how much action he'll see tomorrow night at Hobbs.

There is also a question over Jimmy Dew's knee, Hall said; whether it will carry the aggressive ball player through the game is still an unknown factor.

Howard Price, whose elbow injury places him out of action for the rest of the season, will probably be replaced tomorrow night by Ray Gressett, Coach Hall said Thursday.

Jay Mitchell has been given lots of rest to recover from a crippling

charley horse, and Louis Campanella has been given extensive treatments for an injured knee.

Roy Johnson's foot has been removed from a cast, but his return to action will probably be deferred for at least another week.

Hall revealed Artesia will reveal something new on the field tomorrow night, but would not disclose nature of "the thing" for publication.

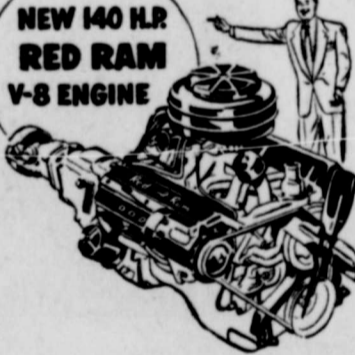

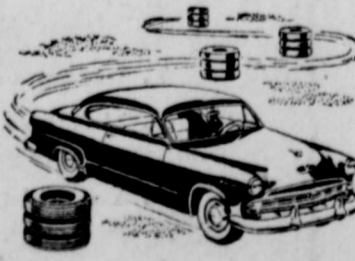

The 30-gallon drums must have fly tight covers.

Much of the ordinance is designed to facilitate use of a new Pak-Mor unit now being installed on a city truck. The unit is a very large cylinder mounted on the bed of the truck, with a hopper at the front in which to dump trash.

A large cylindrical ram in the front of the truck pushed refuse dumped in the hopper into the back of the truck, compressing it and enabling the truck to haul larger loads. When the load is to be dumped, rear doors of the unit are opened and the ram shoves the trash on the ground at the city dump.

Delivery Expected—

The unit may be delivered within the next week.

Special receptacles, most frequently used by large business firms, must have the approval of the city engineer, according to the new ordinance.

In passing the measure, councilmen anticipated criticism from residents, but believe once the ordinance is made to work, the resulting speed-up in service will benefit the city.

Fine for disobeying the ordinance is a maximum \$25 fine or five days in jail, or both.

City Sanitarian Abe Connor pointed out he has repeatedly tagged residents using trash cans larger than 30 gallons for the last three years.

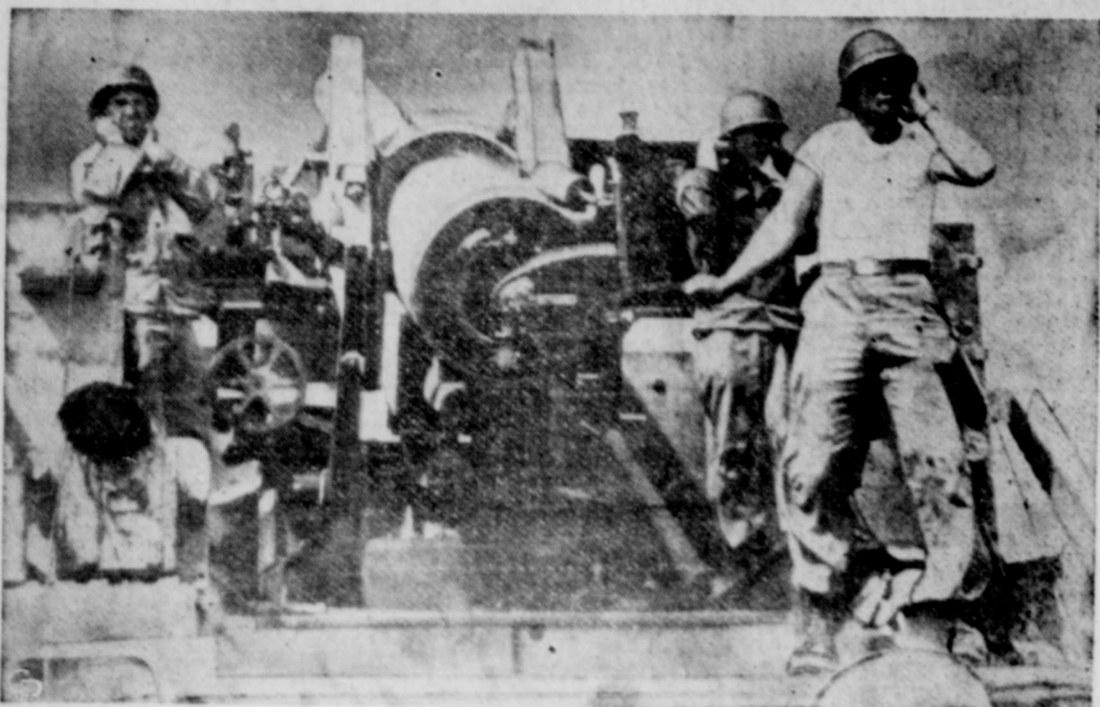
