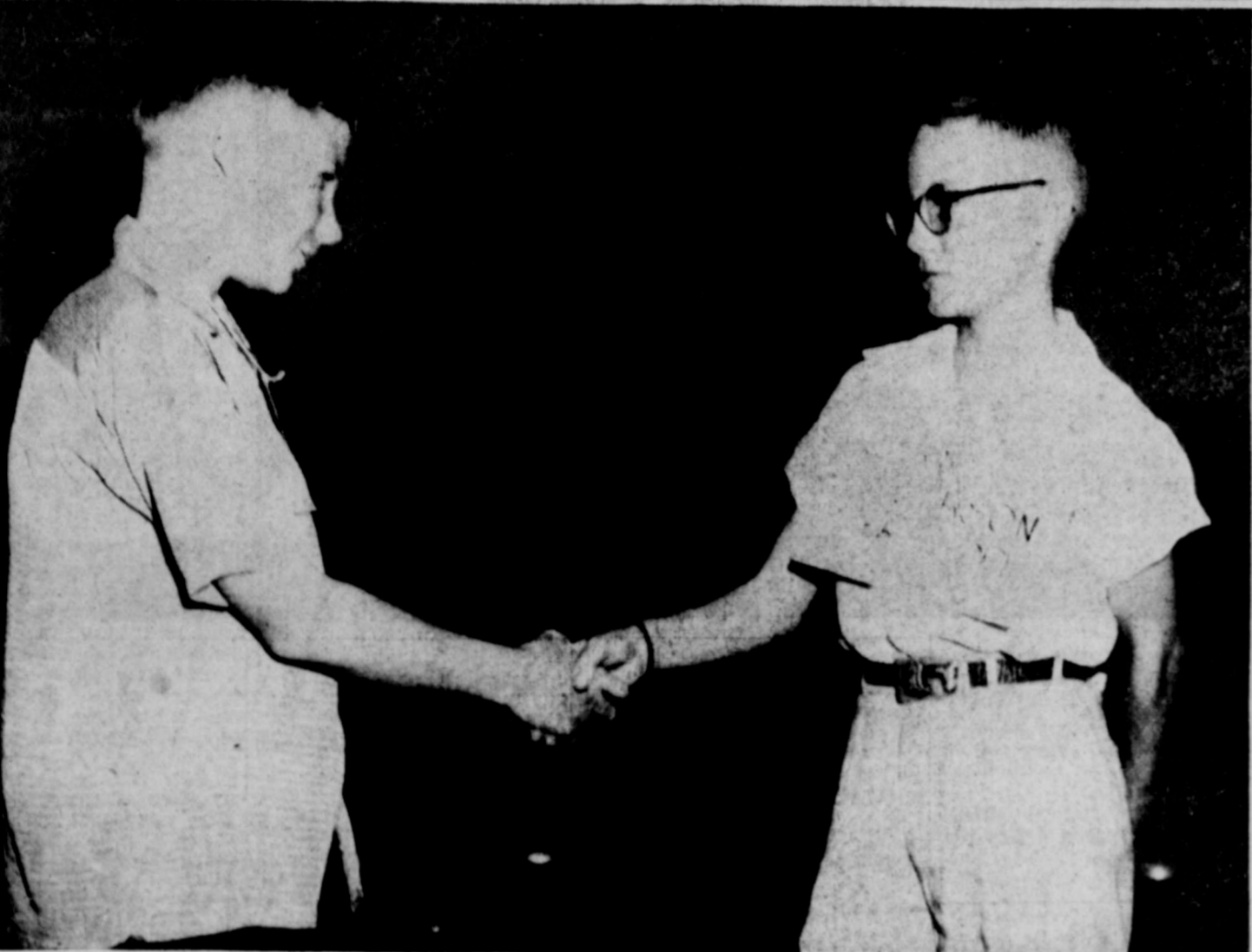

'Embarrassed' Army Probes Missile Firing

FT. MEADE, Md. (AP)—Admittedly "embarrassed," the Army had a board of inquiry working today to find out what caused a Nike guided missile to run away.

Sgt. 1/C Stanley C. Kozek of Allentown, Pa., was slightly burned yesterday when the missile, armed with a warhead, suddenly took off during a routine practice alert.

It exploded, apparently while in flight, over the intersection of the Baltimore-Washington Expressway and Maryland 602, about one mile from the military reservation.

College Frowning On Use of BHC

Use of benzene hexachloride to spray alfalfa against the yellow clover aphid is not approved, Dr. Bob Fye of the New Mexico A&M college experiment station says.

Flying sprayers have been claiming—and getting—high kill of the aphids over the past few weeks using the chemical, commonly called BHC.

However, Dr. Fye said, the experiment station has been discouraging its use "at every opportunity."

The key criticism of BHC is its residual action—its effect lasts too long. The federal pure food and drug administration frowns on that, Dr. Fye points out.

BHC is a chlorinated hydrocarbon, the A&M scientist says, and the use of this family of insecticides is discouraged where forage crops are involved.

Don Jensen, who formerly managed Pecos Valley Flying Service here, said BHC was used in 1954 in the valley. Jensen says "The aphids were back again in a week, coming in from other fields."

State, Justice Department Funds Axed

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House passed by voice vote and sent to the Senate yesterday a bill carrying 7 per cent less money than President Eisenhower asked to finance the state and justice departments and the Voice of America.

Only mild debate preceded passage, with some members criticizing the Voice of America and others praising it. The House approved its appropriations committee's recommendation that the U.S. information agency (USIA) which runs the Voice and other programs, be given 80½ million dollars in the year starting July 1. This is 8 millions under the president's request.

The bill carries more than 450 million dollars, broken down this way: \$126,769,977 for the state department, \$197,525,000 for the justice department, 80½ millions for the USIA and 16 millions for the refugee relief program.

The Senate, meanwhile, passed and sent to conference with the House a bill to appropriate an extra 945 million dollars for use of a number of agencies in the book-keeping year which ends June 30.

Sen. Douglas (D-Ill.) accused the Eisenhower administration during the debate of making "false and ill-founded" economy claims. He said it submits low spending estimates and then comes to Congress for more billions when the agencies run short of money.

Released from the hospital there Easter Sunday Mr. Sears said the physicians told him they do not expect a recurrence of the condition.

He returned here Wednesday.

Godfrey Fires More Performers —In Private

NEW YORK (AP)—Arthur Godfrey today fired six more performers from his television and radio shows but this time did not do it on the air.

In his biggest reshuffling of talent since he publicly dismissed Julius La Rosa in October 1953, CBS announced that Godfrey has "discontinued the services" of the Mariners quartet, Marion Marlowe and Halekio, all singers.

They are being dropped from all of the Godfrey shows they worked, the daily radio-TV program, the Wednesday night TV show and the Friday night radio show.

The dismissals were made effective today. Godfrey made no mention of the action on his morning show. Also terminated were the service staff three writers—Charles Horner, Preston H. Miles and Charles Slocum.

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NEW MEXICANS IN WASHINGTON— State's Bataan Vets Draw Nearly \$3 Million in Claims

WASHINGTON (AP)—Thirteen years ago some 2,000 New Mexico National Guardsmen, members of the 200th Coast Artillery Regiment, became captives of the Japanese on Bataan in the Philippines.

Today, nearly all of them have been compensated to some degree for the privations they endured as prisoners of war.

Congress several years ago enacted two laws—strongly backed by the New Mexico delegation—to accomplish this. One measure authorized payment of \$1 a day to prisoners of war for the time in which they received insufficient food rations from the enemy.

The second authorization payment of \$1.50 for each day they were forced to do labor for which they were not paid under terms of the Geneva peace agreement. The war claims commission was set up to handle payments under the two laws, with former New Mexico Rep. Georgia Lusk as one of its members.

The termination date for settling these claims was March 31. Final figures are not available, but the commission said that as of Dec. 31, 1954 these were the figures for New Mexico:

Under the law relating to inadequate food, 1,938 claims were submitted and the total paid them was \$1,189,522.95.

Under the law relating to enforced labor, 1,894 claims were filed, with payments totaling \$1,737,068.05.

Total of the two figures is \$2,926,591.

Officials of the commission said that although they had no immediate breakdown, most of the claims presumably were made by former members of the Armed Forces, although certain civilians were eligible for payments. They said, also, that the figures given here just about represent the New Mexico total, since few claims remained to be processed between Dec. 31 and March 31.

The defense department reports that from July, 1950, through December, 1954, prime military pro-

This is the vaccine which will be delivered, starting Monday, to New Mexico first and second grade pupils whose parents have signed the required consent forms.

Health department officials and employees will take the shipment to the state public health laboratory at Albuquerque and prepare it for shipment to the various district headquarters.

Spokesmen said New Mexico will go along with a recommendation from the National Polio Foundation to follow the delayed method of administering the new vaccine.

Vaccine Generally Available in Year, Doctor Tells Club

The Salk vaccine will be available for general distribution within a year, Dr. William Toney told the 20-30 club last night at Cliff's Cafeteria.

The local physician said the many new findings made by Dr. Thomas Francis, Jr., will be made available to doctors all over the country.

Dr. Toney is one of several Artesia doctors who will donate their time April 19-20 in administering the vaccine to about 1,000 first and second graders here.

Dr. Toney said the "80 to 90 per cent effectiveness of the treatment is considered almost a perfect achievement, insofar as the success of vaccines are concerned."

He said ill effects of the vaccine may include a slight but persistent fever and that "allergies to the vaccine are very uncommon."

The doctor suggested that vaccine for children with throat ailments be postponed.

Soviets Demand Speedy Treaty For Austria

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet government called today for the speedy conclusion of an Austrian independence treaty and withdrawal of all occupation troops not later than next Dec. 31.

A joint Soviet-Austrian communiqué issued this afternoon said Austrian Chancellor Julius Raab had assured Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov that Austria will not join any military alliances or permit the establishment of any foreign military bases in its territory.

The Soviet government also pledged: (1) to settle its reparations bill against Austria for the equivalent of 150 million dollars in Austrian goods; (2) to return to Austria all former German property in the Soviet zone including the Danube Shipping Co., and (3) to return the Austrian oil fields and refineries which the Russians have been operating during their 10-year occupation.

The joint communique summed up the results of negotiations between Molotov, Raab and their aides which began here Tuesday. It was issued two hours after the Austrian government chief, Deputy Chancellor Adolf Schiefel and their party left in a Soviet military plane for Vienna.

"We leave here happy people," said Raab as he boarded the plane.

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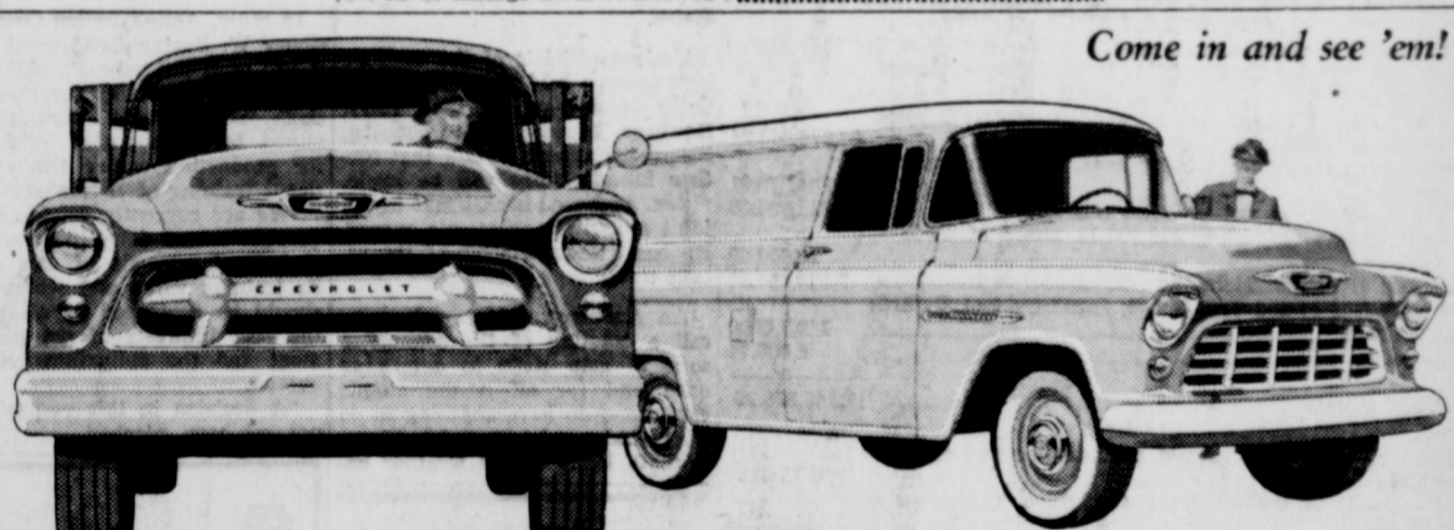

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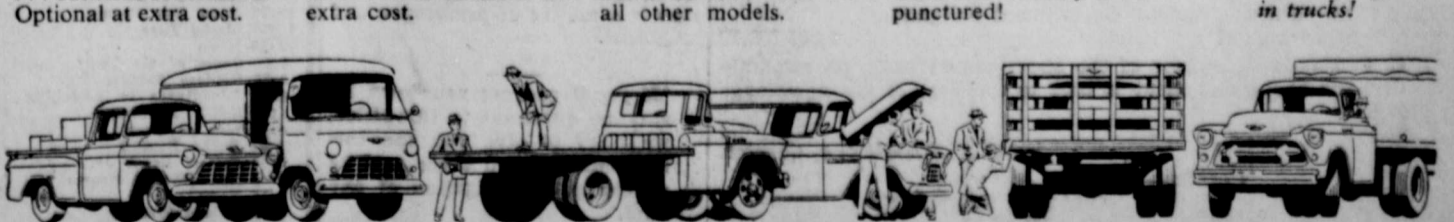
