## First, Second Graders to Get Second Polio Shots Friday



### Vaccine Shots To Be Given At Schools

Salk polio vaccine shots will be given to Artesia first and second grade school students Friday between the hours of 1 and 2 p.m., it was decided at a meeting of the vaccine planning committee at the home of Mrs. John Heaton last night.

Members of the committee are Mrs. Heaton, George White, Mrs. Wallace Beck, and Burr Stout. The committee met in a called meeting here Tuesday after the federal government cleared enough fresh vaccine for about a million more doses.

Students of Park, Central, Hermosa, and Roselawn elementary schools will receive shots at their respective schools.

Mrs. Naomi Buckhout, county school nurse, will administer shots in the outlying rural areas. She will be at the Atoka School Monday at 10 a.m., Loco Hills Tuesday at 10 a.m., Altman's Grocery at Hope at 10 a.m. Wednesday, and Cottonwood Thursday at 10 a.m.

Students who fail to receive shots will have to contact Mrs. Buckhout at the North Eddy County Health Office in Artesia.

The children will receive one shot.

## Recreation Board to Submit \$20,000 First Year Budget

Artesia recreation board will submit a proposed budget and program to city council at the council's regular meeting at City Hall at 7:30 p.m., tonight, Vernon Mills, spokesman for the board, said Wednesday.

Under the proposed program, an income of \$20,043.04 is expected annually. This balances with the amount of expenditures in the budget.

The major expenditures are \$2,400 in salaries through August of 1956, \$5,000 payment to the city for swimming pool filter, \$2,000 for salaries for swimming instructors, \$1,000 for the public library, another \$1,000 for the band, \$1,000 for the softball program, \$2,000 for the Little League, and \$1,650 for the Babe Ruth League.

Included in the income estimate is \$10,000 from the New Mexico state cigarette tax, \$3,720 from school district No. 16, and \$6,063.04 from organizations, clubs and businesses of Artesia.

Sponsors of the proposed programs are the First National Bank, Guy Chevrolet, Williams Furniture, Magnolia Oil Company, Clem Appliance, Russell Appliance, the Elks, and the NuMex Refining Co.

Also, Optimist Club, the American Legion, Alfalfa Growers, D. A. V. Kiwanis, Lions, Rotary, Altrusa, American Legion Auxiliary, B.P.O.E. Does, D. A. V. Auxiliary, Epsilon Sigma Alpha, and the Womens Club.

The recreation board proposes that beginning April, 1956, the City of Artesia secure the services of a well-qualified, full-time director for with a minimum yearly salary of \$6,000, and another \$1,000 be set aside for part-time employment to assist in actual operation of the program.

The board also recommends the program be kept in force and expanded upon wherever possible in order to meet the needs of the community.

The board has outlined a proposed program for each week, including Sundays. Tennis, volleyball and other activities can be made available throughout the week, the board plan says. When lights are secured, tennis will be available at night.

For children, plans call for a story hour, play periods at parks, library reading, vacation Bible schools and swimming lessons. For older children, there could be bicycle hikes, arts and crafts, a story hour, reading, pet parades, fishing derby, soap-box derby, yo-yo contests, kite flying, marble contests, volleyball, softball, Little League, swimming, tennis, track, basketball, football, Bible schools, hobbies and band.

For teenagers, there would be arts and crafts, tennis, softball, Babe Ruth League, junior rodeo.

### Drought Feed Plan Extended

ALBUQUERQUE (AP)—The New Mexico Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office has announced an extension in the drought feed program.

An office spokesman says a new regulation permits farmers and ranchers to order drought feed supplied as late as June 22 and permits them to order a sufficient amount of feed to last 60 days beyond June 30.

Previously, the farmers and ranchers could not apply after June 15 for the emergency feed and only a sufficient amount to last until June 30 could be approved.

The modification of the emergency feed regulation also applies to hay purchases.

# German Postal Chief Predicts Mail By Rockets

BONN, Germany (AP)—Mail-carrying rockets may one day span the world's oceans, says West German Postal Minister Siegfried Balke.

Scientists are now studying the problem of achieving absolute accuracy in the firing of such rockets. Balke said in an interview.

"The mail rockets is a definite possibility," he added, though "the problem of this rocket has not yet left the state of scientific planning."

A leading industrialist and publisher before joining the Cabinet, Balke said West Germany's modern postal system is planning telegrams by dialing anywhere in the world, transmission of telegrams by television, complete mechanization of the handling of mail and no more postage stamps.

"In a few months, West Germany will inaugurate the world's first dial telephone service with a foreign country," Balke said.

This service will start with Switzerland during the summer. Other countries will be added to this network. Over 40 per cent of all long distance calls in West Germany are now dialed directly.

# Babies and Beds Look Alike in Newest Plan

Associated Press Women's Editor Newest idea for the teething ring set is nursery coordinates, with the baby neatly matched to the bedding.

Rosebud-printed percale makes a nursery symphony consisting of crib sheets, lace-edged saque and panties. If you have trouble telling which is the baby and which is the crib, pick up the one that moves.

It's easy to make contour crib sheets, say local sewing center experts, who suggest cutting out a couple at a time. The top sheet is contoured at the bottom edges, the bottom sheet is fitted at both top and bottom. Mothers who have used them say contour sheets are wonderful time-savers. If you use a separate mattress pad, the tightness of the sheet will keep it firmly in place.

You can make the entire outfit from a standard pattern, which also includes patterns for a wrapper, short robe and receiving blanket. Although flannelette is available in dainty prints, it's better to make everything in percale if you are going in for the coordinated look. The flannelette is fine for the saque, but not so good for the sheets.

Perforations on the pattern guide you in sewing construction, including the hammer-on snap fasteners on the plastic lined panties. The entire 7-piece layette requires only 7 1/2 yards of 36-inch fabric, plus 3/4 yard for the saque lining and 3/4 yard of plastic for lining the panties. When fitting the plastic to the panties, use paper clips instead of pins, and use a very fine machine needle when stitching.

# FBI Informers Valuable Aid, Hoover Writes

By JACK ADAMS WASHINGTON (AP)—FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover today described confidential informants in law enforcement work as "helpful citizens" and "potent weapons" in the war against crime and subversion.

"There can be no doubt that the use of informants in law enforcement is justified," he said. "The public interest and the personal safety of these helpful citizens demand the zealous protection of their confidence."

"Unlike the totalitarian practice, the informant in America serves of his own free will, fulfilling one of the citizenship obligations of our democratic form of government."

He asserted that to abandon use of such informants would be "to invite destruction."

Hoover expressed his views in a signed editorial in the monthly FBI's law enforcement bulletin.

He made no direct reference to some renewed criticism of the confidential informant system which followed the recent action of former communist Harvey Matusow and other ex-Reds who have appeared as government witnesses in recanting testimony given under oath.

"The federal government is currently defending in the Supreme Court its asserted right to protect sources of confidential information in reviewing employe security."

"The criminal and subversive underworld has long sought to destroy our effective informant system," Hoover wrote. "Nothing could possibly render more aid to the enemy than the premature and unwarranted disclosure of these vital sources of information."

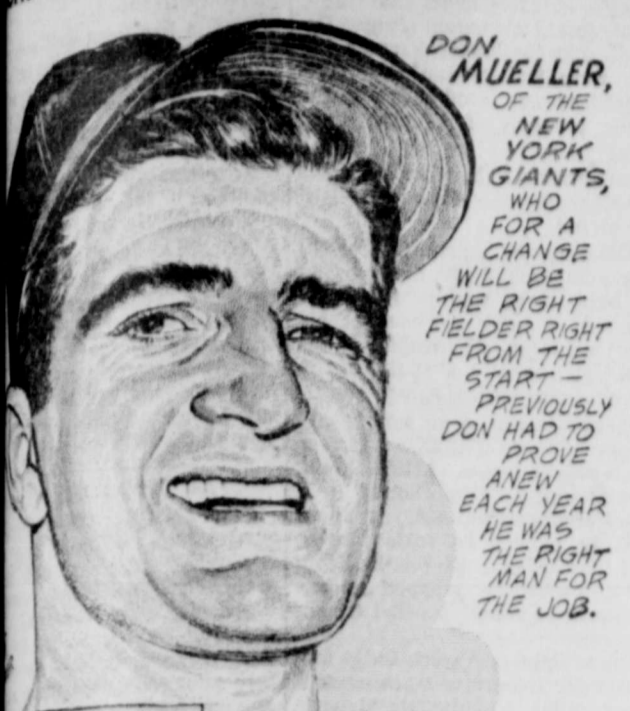

They are always ready and willing when their car is needed to take the youngsters to school or perhaps to take members of some school organization to some particular place.

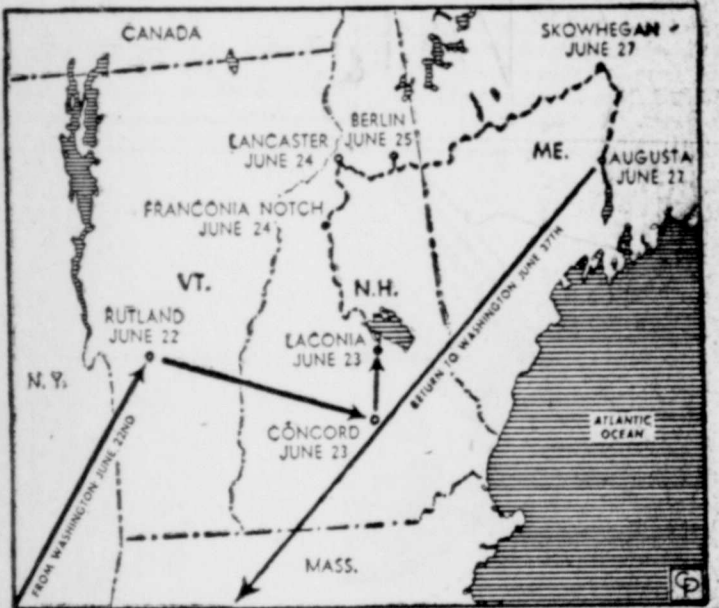

## New English Commercial TV Not Dull

NEW YORK (AP)—Great Britain's new commercial television service may not be as lively as the American version but it won't be dull, says Harry Towers, who will boss much of the programming.

In fact, the short, dynamic young British TV-radio magnate says the new service, to start this fall, will include some American programs.

"I think the American viewer would find it very good," Towers said while here on one of his frequent ocean-hopping business trips.

He has just closed a deal with Evangelist Billy Graham for 26 filmed programs. He's dickering for I Love Lucy. The Roy Rogers show and others, and hopes to have frequent American guest stars such as Bop Hope and Johnny Ray.

"We may put Liberace on," he adds. Meanwhile, London programs will include a big Sunday evening variety hour from the London Palladium with such stars as Gracie Fields.

Also on the Sunday evening schedule will be an anthology show featuring dramatic stars such as Sir Ralph Richardson. The Sunday afternoon lineup will include a 90-minute program along the lines of Omnibus.

A major Saturday evening attraction will be a one-hour dramatic show telecast from high quality film recording. Closing out the Saturday schedule will be a 45-minute program presided over by Jack Jackson, popular British entertainment personality.

"It will be a sort of Steve Allen show," Towers explained. There also will be sports telecasts, kiddie shows, quizzes, newsreels, and other features of types familiar to American viewers.

"Good morning," comes a lilting, musical voice. "How are you today?"
