

# AFL-CIO Convention Nears End With Dispute Rumored

NEW YORK (AP)—The AFL-CIO convention today amid a labor peace pact with business.

After Stevenson's talk, the convention was due to take up a resolution outlining AFL-CIO political plans for the 1956 election campaign and wind up convention sessions.

Meany said talks with the NAM looking toward a labor-management non-aggression pact have been arranged to start soon, "on a staff level." He said he would not be in on them at the beginning.

Sligh said that while Meany has been invited to address an NAM luncheon tomorrow, "no authorized representative of the NAM has been in contact with George Meany except to invite and make arrangements for him to speak."

"It should be quite possible," Meany said, "to reach an agreement if they the NAM have any good will in our American system and I am sure they do. Continuing to snipe at each other is a bit archaic."

Two men died in widely separated auto collisions yesterday, raising the state traffic toll for the year to 339, one more than on Dec. 8, 1954. It was the first time this year the grim death record has exceeded last year's.

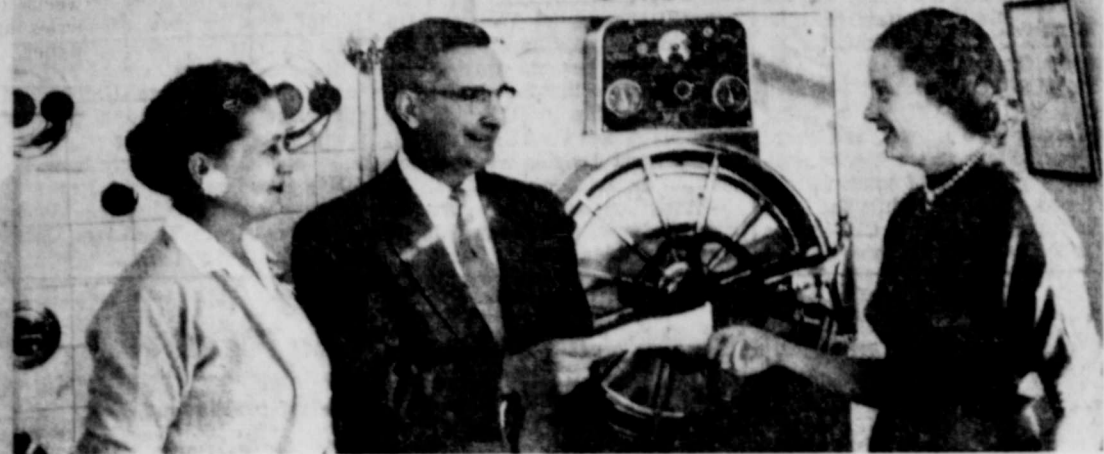
The victims were Clarence W. King, 60, Edgewood, and Jesse Owen, 45, Hobbs. Four persons were injured in the two mishaps. State Police said King died instantly when the car he was driving and one driven by Lawrence Groff, 39, Moriarty mayor and rancher, crashed two miles west of Moriarty on U. S. Highway 66.

# Beef, Pork, Chickens Top Weekend Buys

Shoppers will find attractive buys in beef, pork and chickens in nation's food stores this week.

Pork remains the outstanding meat buy and you'll find loins and chops widely featured. One large chain is cutting pork chop prices by four to six cents a pound and more from a week ago.

Frying chickens will be a popular weekend feature, with some stores trimming prices by four cents a pound. Legs of lamb will cost about the same as a week ago. There will be a few specials on lamb chops.

Food markets seldom feature veal, but this weekend will find sale prices here and there on veal, legs of veal and veal chops. Egg prices will be down in most places this weekend. Stores are planning reductions of two cents or

more a dozen. Butter prices will be about the same as a week ago. The U. S. Department of Agriculture picks sweet potatoes as a feature for this week. Production is 19 per cent larger than last year, so there are generous supplies for holiday and everyday meals.

From the produce markets comes word that potatoes, onions, turnips, radishes and greens are the outstanding buys in vegetables this week. On the list of good buys are spinach, old and new crop cabbage, beans, peppers, escarole, endive, romaine and iceberg lettuce, sweet potatoes and Western P. Pascal cel-

ery. Bunched carrots are high while topped carrots are considered moderately priced. Also labeled moderately priced are cucumbers, parsley, broccoli and squash. Corn supplies are small.

Crisp apples are abundant and reasonably priced and shoppers will find good value in avocados and grape — particularly the emperor grape. Citrus buys include oranges, grapefruit, tangerines and lemons. Cranberries are selling for about the same as last week. On the other hand, strawberries and raspberries are much higher.

## Donald Reagan Thinks Academy Awards Unfair

HOLLYWOOD — Are the Academy Awards unfair to some? Donald Reagan thinks so, and he has proposed two changes in the voting rules to insure fair play.

Reagan, who has been nominated for Best Actor for his role in "Rebel Without a Cause," said he observed the matter No. 1, he observed that a player like James Cagney would get votes for both "Mister Roberts" and "Love Me or Leave Me." Likewise, Jennifer Jones would be selected for "Love Is a Splendid Thing" and "Morning, Miss Dove," the same day.

Reagan said that in the past, most actors were under contract to the studios, which would get behind one performer and give it a push. Today actors are in a free market. They might do pictures at two or more studios. The campaign might be to vote for the players, depriving them of a nomination.

Reagan added that the awards supporting players have been reduced by studios that reduced the billing of stars to support them in order to snag an Oscar. He observed that Eva Marie Saint was actually Marlon Brando's leading lady in "On the Waterfront," not the supporting actress. Walter Huston starred in "The Treasure of the Sierra Madre," though he won the Oscar for support.

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# Bob Titchenal Fired As Head Lobo Coach

## Way Cleared For Naming New Mentor

ALBUQUERQUE (AP) — University of New Mexico Head Football Coach Bob Titchenal has been released and President Tom Popejoy has eased open the door toward sweeping changes in the coaching staff.

Titchenal's release was announced by Popejoy at a news conference in the president's office yesterday.

"It has been decided that a change in the head football coaching position is needed at this time," his prepared statement said.

Titchenal, who has headed the Lobo football team for three years, declined comment. Chosen "Skyline Coach of the Year" in 1953, he had an overall record of 12-16-1. The Lobos finished with a poor 2-8 record.

No successor has been named for the position, and Popejoy declined comment on who the successor may be.

"We expect in the near future to begin negotiations concerning Mr. Titchenal's replacement," his prepared statement said.

He indicated that some recommendations may be made concerning a successor later in the month when the Board of Regents meets. A definite date for the meeting has not been set. He said recommendations made by the new coach concerning assistants would be seriously considered.

He noted, however, that Freshman Coach George Petrol and Emeritus Coach Willis Barnes have tenure in the college of education and would be retained in some capacity.

Backfield Coach Lou Cullen and Line Coach Marty Feldman, however, do not have such tenure.

Sports Editor Bill Bailey of the Santa Fe New Mexican published a story yesterday that Titch would be fired and said head Football Coach Ralph Bowyer of Carlsbad has been approached as a possible successor.

Bowyer, however, said he has not been offered the job. Popejoy declined comment.

Popejoy's statement:

"After consultation with the Athletic Council and officials of the College of Education, it has been decided that future plans for intercollegiate athletics at the university indicate that a change in the head football coaching position is needed at this time. I have advised Mr. Titchenal that this decision has been reached and I have told him that this recommendation will be made to the Board of Regents.

"We expect in the near future to begin negotiations concerning Mr. Titchenal's replacement. Naturally, we plan to work closely with the new coach in regard to assistants which will be needed for football."

The statement came as a climax to speculation in many quarters that Titchenal would be fired at the end of this year. Titchenal had met with the Athletic Council for about two hours earlier in the day.

Earlier he had made public statements that he had attempted to follow the athletic policies laid down by the university and that he had done the best job of which he was capable with the material furnished him.

Popejoy declined comment other than that contained in his prepared statement on Titchenal.

## Ed Price To Remain Coach At Texas For At Least Two Years

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) — The University of Texas Athletic Department was back to normalcy today, the head coaching situation settled for the next two years — Edwin B. Price will continue as head man of the Longhorns.

Price announced he would fulfill his contract that has two years to run at \$12,500 per year, thus settling rumors that he planned to resign and ask for another job in the athletic department. Price has been under fire from the alumni for the past two years when his teams had poor seasons.

Price made the statement yesterday after a four-hour conference with Tom Sealy, chairman of the Board of Regents, at Midland. Sealy said he had discussed the situation with the other regents and President Logan Wilson of the university and "we are all in accord in saying that we have complete confidence in his ability and integrity. We feel that the athletic situation at the University of Texas is wholesome and that the morale among the students, players and coaches is high."

Price declared that he was "most grateful for this expression of confidence on the part of the regents and the administration, and my staff and I will make every effort to merit their support."

## Sugar Ray, Olson Marking Time For Title Bout

CHICAGO (AP) — Apparently satisfied there will be no battle of the scales, middleweight champion Bobo Olson and challenger Sugar Ray Robinson today marked time for their 15-round title scrap mutually confident of victory at their peak of conditioning.

Olson's fourth defense of his crown tomorrow night at Chicago stadium will be televised and also broadcast nationally.

The 27-year-old Olson, who was kayoed by Robinson in the 12th in 1950 and lost a 15-round decision to him two years later, will receive a cut of 35 per cent of the gate expected to total \$150,000 and the \$75,000 TV-radio package. Robinson's share is 25 per cent.

So confident is Olson's manager Sid Flaherty of winning that he has made plans for Bobo's next defense. It would be against Charles Humez, European 160-pound king, in Paris "any time after the Robinson fight if the price is right."

Another possibility, depending on the price, is Joe Giambra, who spent an Army furlough giving Bobo plenty of trouble before losing a decision in San Francisco Aug. 25.

Both Robinson and Olson have been impressive in drills and each claims to have worked harder and longer for this scrap than for any other.

Olson appears to be solemn and edgy. Robinson has been in direct contrast, laughing and joking.

Robinson reportedly has worked up to 160 pounds from 156. Olson, who packed 170 when he lost to Archie Moore last June, has had to come down. Bobo now is willing to bet observers he weighs in at 159½. There have been no takers.

Olson is a 3-1 favorite.

"I do not wish to become embroiled in a public argument with Mr. Titchenal," he said.

## Gonzales Named to Class A All State Team Third Time

Fullback Sal Gonzales of Gadsden, the first player in the history of New Mexico to make the top all star team three times, heads the powerful Class A high school all state football team this year.

Gonzales was the top vote-getter on the team chosen for The Associated Press by the votes of coaches, sports writers and radio sports announcers. His selection makes him the first player in the state to have made the dream team for three straight years.

Gadsden, Portales and Tucumcari each placed two men on the squad. Gallup, Belen, Western of Silver City, St. Mike's, Las Vegas and Alamogordo each had one.

A tie resulted in the heavy battling between backs Paul Sorenson of Las Vegas and Ernest Coefield of Alamogordo, with 12 players being selected to the squad. Raton, Dist. 2A champion, did not place a man.

Gonzales, who was the prime mover in pacing Gadsden to its third straight Class A title, and safety Lupe Sanchez, St. Mike's quarterback, are the only two repeaters on the squad. All the players on the squad this year are seniors.

The ends are George Buchanan of Gallup and Joe Carlson of Tucumcari, both weighing in at 175.

Buchanan was one of the top vote-getters on the team, and generally considered one of the finer ends in the state.

At tackle are Jerry Kull of Gadsden and Mack Hennington of Belen. Though playing on a losing team, Hennington has been rated by many coaches as the outstanding lineman in the state.

Guards are Joe Brow of Western and Gerald Moore of Tucumcari. Roy Whittington of Portales was pushed for the center spot by Skip Taylor of Los Alamos.

Gonzales, Sanchez, Sorenson and Coefield are joined in the talented backfield by Portales' great Everett Frazier. Frazier was ever only to Gonzales in voting popularity. He was the big gun in Portales' surprisingly powerful showing late in the season that saw the Peanut City team upset Tucumcari for the 4A title and make it into the playoffs.

Sanchez, a clever, talented quarterback, made the squad with ease after piloting St. Mike's into the playoff finals against Gadsden.

Gonzales, of course, has been called one of the finest running backs to come out of New Mexico in the past few years. He scored at least once in every Gadsden game and was the star of the team

## Duffy Daugherty Named Top Coach In College Ranks

NEW YORK (AP) — Hugh Duffy Daugherty of Michigan State's Rose Bowl-bound Spartans won football Coach of the Year honors by the biggest margin in the 21-year history of the competition conducted by the New York World-Telegram & Sun and Scripps-Howard newspapers.

Daugherty received 199 first-place ballots of the 492 cast by members of the American Football Coaches Assn. according to the compilation announced today.

The 40-year-old Michigan State coach succeeds Henry "Red" Sanders as the country's No. 1 coach. Sanders coaches UCLA, the Spartans' opponent in the Rose Bowl Jan. 2.

Daugherty's nearest rival was Bud Wilkinson of Oklahoma, the 1949 winner who received 54 first place votes. Woody Hayes of Ohio State was next with 42. Then followed Bear Bryant, Texas Aggies, 29; Abe Martin, TCU, 26.

## Rocky Can Load Up On Turkey, No Challengers Are In Sight

CLEVELAND (AP)—Merry Christmas, Rocky Marciano. Slop up on turkey and dressing. Don't spare the mashed potatoes and gravy. Nobody's coming to spoil your fun as heavyweight champion of the world.

The much-heralded meeting of Bob Baker, No. 2 challenger, and Nino Valdes, the No. 3 threat, last night at the Cleveland Arena served only to bolster the position of Archie Moore, the No. 1 contender. As Rocky knocked out Archie Moore in September, the future looks clear.

Pudge Baker, a 12-5 favorite, plodded to a unanimous decision over the Cuban Valdes in a dreary

match that probably eliminated both from consideration as Marciano opponents.

"Maybe I'll have to fight Archie Moore now before I get the Marciano shot," said Baker in his dressing room after the dull 10 rounder, fought to the tune of "Jingle Bells" and "Let Me Call You Sweetheart" and a steady chorus of boos from the 8,380 fans who paid \$63,392 to see the Cleveland News' annual Christmas fund show.

"What do we want fighting any Baker?" asked Archie Moore's manager Charlie Johnston, whose middleweight Eduardo Lausse of Argentina stole the show. "Archie

knocked out Baker in Miami March 9, 1954 and beat Valdes in Las Vegas in May. The only fight for Marciano is a return match with Moore."

The 31-year-old Valdes seemed unable to untrack himself against Baker, who failed to take advantage of the situation by stepping back every time he landed a punch or two. The best punch of the fight was a right by Baker in the fourth that drove Valdes to the ropes. It was the closest thing to a knockdown in a knockdown-free bout.

Judge Herb Williams scored it 99-91, Judge Charlie Bill 98-92 and

Referee Tony La Branche spent a night prying apart the 213½-pound Baker and the 207-pound Valdes. He warned the big boys repeatedly to "shake it up." It was a repeat of a 1953 match at Huntington, W. Va., also won by Baker, the winner was supposed to attack next Marciano bout.

Lausse, a ferocious-looking Argentine middleweight, stole England's John L. Sullivan technical knockout in 1.00 of the fifth round of the 10-round feature.

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
