'March' Climax To MOD Effort Here Tonight

Still less than halfway to their 1955 record, Artesia March of Dimes workers today were placing their hopes on tonight's Mothers' March Against Polio to boost collections.

The city fire department's siren will signal the opening of the Mothers' March at 7 p. m. and it will continue for one hour. Under the general chairmanship of Mrs. June Waters, the March will climax the month-long MOD effort here.

Approximately 200 mothers are to visit every home in the city—particularly those with porch-lights burning, or with a lamp or candle in a front window. The Mothers' March gathered approximately \$1,800 last year—when the entire campaign raised more than \$10,000.

Mothers participating in the March will be identified by tags bearing the slogan of this year's campaign: Polio Isn't Licked Yet. Mothers in the Atoka district were to complete their March this afternoon. Long distances between homes and other factors make it impossible for the mothers to make their rounds in that area after dark.

Following completion of tonight's March, workers will report to the First National Bank where collections will be turned over to Fred Cole, MOD treasurer.

The DAV Auxiliary will serve coffee to the workers at the bank while the Davis Cake Box Bakery and Honey's Doughnut Shop will supply pastries.

Government Sets Up New Price Yardsticks Today

WASHINGTON — The government sets up new and somewhat shorter yardsticks late today for measuring prices of cotton, wheat, corn and peanuts—four major sources of farm income.

Like Approves Revised Road Finance Plan

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower today approved a plan to finance his highway construction program through pay-as-you-go taxation. He abandoned his earlier plan for financing it with bonds.

House Republican leader Martin (Mass.) announced the President's decision. He said it was made in recognition of a practical situation in Congress—refusal of the Democratic leadership to accept the bond program.

Martin said after the GOP congressional leaders' weekly conference with Eisenhower that the President decided to yield on the issue because he wants the highway construction program to get underway.

In response to a question Martin told a news conference at the White House that he believes the new program has a "good chance" of winning approval in Congress.

Eisenhower's choice, Martin said was either to "give up the roads" or go along with the Democrats' program.

The Republican leader said House Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex.) and other Democratic members of the House made their position clear at a conference at the capitol last week.

Replying to questions, Martin made it clear that the new program means higher taxes to finance road building. He added it would be up to the House Ways and Means Committee to decide just how to raise the money.

California supporters sent a chartered airliner to fly the 1952 Democratic standard bearer to Sacramento for the start of an eight-day whistle-stop tour of the 1,600-mile state.

His itinerary, liberal on bean dinners, box-lunch socials and informal handshaking affairs, suggests emphasis on the folksy approach successfully applied by Kefauver in California and other primaries four years ago.

Kefauver himself plans to spend four days on the California circuit after both contenders deliver their only scheduled formal speeches before the California Democratic Council in Fresno Saturday.

The Democratic rivals will battle it out in California June 5 for the largest single bloc of national convention votes—63—of any of the three primaries they have signified they will enter to actively seek delegates. The other two states in which they will meet head are Florida and Minnesota.

Kefauver entered 16 primaries in 1952; Stevenson sat them all out.

The Tennessee senator easily captured the California delegation, defeating a favorite-son slate headed by State Atty. Gen. Edmund G. Brown.

Most of the state's top Democrats are backing Stevenson this time.

That account varied from the one contained in Martin's statement. Martin said Gress and Mrs. Gress had been admitted to the club by Skipworth for more than a week. Critical Far Eastern Problems Up For First High-Level Review

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State Dulles resumed western strategy talks today with British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd as the top-level Anglo-American conference moved into its second day.

Critical Far Eastern questions seemed likely to come up for the first time at the high-level review. One of Britain's top Asiatic experts Sir Hubert Graves, accompanied Lloyd into the conference room.

Relations with Communist China including Britain's reported desire to cast existing Western trade controls, figured prominently among the key topics to be tackled in a review of policy in the Far East.

Middle East problems, twice discussed at yesterday's opening session, promised to serve as another discussion base during the day, either at the department or at the White House.

Winthrop Aldridge, U. S. Ambassador to Britain, joined in the talks as did Livingston Merchant, asst. secretary of state for Europe, and Douglas MacArthur II, department counselor.

This conference was a preliminary to another meeting of president Eisenhower and Prime Minister Eden over the White House luncheon table.

Eisenhower and Eden got off to a seemingly good start yesterday on three days of talks on how to deal with the Russians in the Middle East and elsewhere.

They agreed in assessing recent Soviet maneuvering on the diplomatic, economic and political front. And Eden pledged Britain's full support to Eisenhower's insistence on "deeds, not words," as evidence of Russian willingness to ease tensions.

But the first day also turned up a divergence of views on the Middle East. Some diplomatic officials said, however, that these differences are minor and should be narrowed even further at today's session.

Eisenhower took part in two of the three U. S.-British conferences yesterday. On doctor's orders he is passing up the night gatherings.

Eisenhower and Eden are expected to switch attention to the Far East once they go as far as they can in fashioning a common policy toward the Middle East.

The British are said to be more reluctant than they have been about backing unyielding U. S. opposition to seating Red China in the United Nations. Eisenhower will try to nail down British support on that issue.

For their part, the British would like to ease the West embargo against shipping nonwar goods to Red China. They argue, in the face of strong opposition from the U. S., that the embargo is not working.

A 1956 support price for wheat has been set at \$1.81 a bushel. No announcement has yet been made of this year's support prices for cotton, corn or peanuts.

The old parity price for corn was \$1.82 a bushel. The new effective one to be announced today will be about \$1.73—down 5 per cent from the old formula. But if the new formula went fully into effect now, the parity price would be about \$1.60.

The old parity price for peanuts was 13.6 cents a pound, but the new effective or transitional parity will be about 12.92 cents a pound. If the new formula went into effect now, the parity price would be about 11 cents a pound.

San Francisco Dons Take Wide Lead In Cage Poll-Dayton Holds Second Place Despite Loss

The San Francisco Dons, who remained undefeated through last Saturday's battle of the Deep Freeze against California and set a new record for college basketball winning streaks, seem to be just as thoroughly installed at the top of the basketball rankings.
After winning their 40th straight game—and their 14th this season

by the unusual score of 33-24, the Dons scored 1,337 points in the Associated Press poll of sports writers and broadcasters to tighten their hold on the No. 1 ranking.

San Francisco received 90 first-place votes out of 148 ballots and 34 for second place. Fewer than a dozen unbelievers dared put the Dons lower than fourth. Points were scored on the usual basis of 10 for first, 9 for second, etc.
Dayton Flyers, who suffered their first defeat after winning 14 straight, held onto second place ahead of upsurging Vanderbilt.
While Dayton was losing to Louisville, 66-64 in overtime, Vanderbilt's Commodores turned in a decisive 81-73 decision over Kentucky and St. Louis University's beat Cincinnati by an impressive 104-86 score.

As a result of these three games, Vanderbilt leaped from seventh place to third in the rankings. Louisville vaulted from ninth to fifth and Kentucky dropped from third to eighth.
Although running their winning streak to 13 for the season, unbeaten Temple pushed down one place to seventh, just behind Big Ten leader Illinois, which also lost ground.
