CONTROVERSIAL GAS BILL VETOED

New Magnetic Storm Burst One Of Largest Ever Seen

SACRAMENTO PEAK OBSERVATORY, N. M. (AP)—The sun erupted yesterday in 180 magnetic storms or sun spots, believed to be the largest outbreak ever observed. Howard D'Mastus, Harvard University observer at this Air Force installation, said photographs of the sun showed the 180 storms of ultraviolet much of today but a chance for further observations was hoped later. The storms were accompanied by a flare from the face of the sun which D'Mastus estimated reached up to 80,000 miles from the sun's face. The flare was estimated at an intensity of plus 2 on a scale the top of which is plus 3.

Ex-Artesia Man Freed In Death Of Stepfather

PORTALES (AP)—A murder charge against Jimmy Jones, accused of shooting his stepfather, Barney Smith, Feb. 3, has been dismissed. Dist. Atty. Richard Rowley told the court just before trial was open that evidence showed Jones' plea of self-defense was correct. Jones' mother fainted when the case was dismissed. She said at the time of her son's arrest that her husband had threatened to kill both of them time after time. The slaying took place in a farm house five miles from Portales during a blizzard. Jones walked two miles through darkness and blowing snow to the nearest telephone to report to the sheriff. It took the sheriff four hours to reach the scene in a National Guard truck. The Smiths moved from Artesia to the Portales area only a short time ago.

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Ike Uses Sharp Words In Rejection Of Measure, Alludes To 'Interests'

THOMASVILLE, Ga. (AP)—President Eisenhower today vetoed the controversial natural gas bill, bitter Senate debate on the measure touched off an inquiry into a \$2,500 campaign contribution spurned by Sen. Francis Case (R-SD).

In a sharply worded obvious allusion to the offering of that contribution, Eisenhower said: "Since the passage of this bill, a body of evidence has accumulated indicating that private persons, apparently representing only a very small segment of a great and vital industry, have been seeking to further their own interests by highly questionable activities. These include efforts that I deem to be so arrogant and so much in defiance of acceptable standards of propriety as to risk creating doubt among the American people concerning the integrity of governmental processes."

San Francisco's Dons should push their major college winning record to 46 straight games to night against St. Mary's of California, but if you're looking for the really big basketball action of the night, pal, hustle on the Louisville Cardinals. That's where Dayton's Flyers get another crack at the Louisville Cardinals.

Dayton, ranked second only to the Dons in the Associated Press poll, has won 19 of 20 games this season. The one that got away was filched 64-62 in overtime by Louisville, ranked fourth and currently 20-2.

The return match between the two NIT-bound clubs should be a pip. These two outfits have battled into overtimes in their last three meetings.

Another important game tonight sends UCLA to Oregon State for the first of a two-night pair. UCLA tops the Pacific Coast Conference at 8-0 Oregon State, the defending champ, is only 2-8.

None of the ranked teams were in action last night, but West Virginia's Hot Rod Hundley filled the void with an entertaining exhibition as the Mountaineers defeated St. John's of Brooklyn 82-75 at Madison Square Garden.

Hundley, an accomplished clown who also can score, popped in 40 points—then, standing near midcourt, urged and got applause as it was announced he had bettered the previous one-game high for the season by a collegian in the Garden (Duchesne's St. Green and NYU's Tom DeLuca each hit 39).

The garden record, incidentally is 54 points, by St. John's Harry Boskoff in 1947.

Hundley's 40 points also gave him a two-year, sophomore-junior total of 1,335—bettering the NCAA-recognized record of 1,335 held by Virginia's Buzz Wilkinson and Furman's Darrell Floyd.

In the other half of the Garden twin bill, Niagara unofficially nailed down a return to the NIT by banging Seton Hall, already on an NIT entry, by a surprising 87-56 margin. Seton Hall looked atrocious for a team that had lost only 2 of 19.

In other games, NIT-bound Xavier (Ohio) lost a second time to Western Kentucky, 74-65; and Richmond got a good grip on third place in the Southern Conference by belting Virginia Military 90-68 while Virginia Tech held off Furman's second-half charge, led by Floyd, who wound up with 25, for a 77-75 decision.

Utah regained the Skyline lead by a half-game over idle Brigham Young, walloping New Mexico 101-74.

Same Old Thing Contained In NCAA Offering For National TV Football

KANSAS CITY — The NCAA has come up with the 1956 version of its football television program, and in all essentials it looks just about like last year's offering.

There are to be eight national Game of the Week telecasts and five regional TV showings.

The '56 format was disclosed by Walt Byers, executive director of the National Collegiate Athletic Assn. It represents the plans of the NCAA's Television Committee. Ratification by the membership is expected to be mere formality.

Following closely the outlines of last year's television setup, the 1956 plan specifies four dates—Sept. 22, Oct. 6, Dec. 1, and on Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 22—for national telecasts.

An additional four dates are left open, to be selected by sponsors.

No Middle Road In SW Conference Standings; SMU Has Perfect Score

There just isn't any "middle class" in this season's Southwest Conference basketball race.

With less than two weeks left in conference play, the loop has been divided into two widely separated camps—"the haves" and "the have-nots." And there's not a single team close to the 500 per cent dividing line.

The pluckiest of the pluck teams is Southern Methodist. The Mustangs, now rated 12th in the nation by The Associated Press poll, have a perfect conference record of 8 victories against no defeats.

Right behind them come the Rice Owls and Arkansas Razorbacks with respectable 7-2 records.

Across the line and deep in the lower reals dwell Texas A&M, Texas, Baylor and Texas Christian.

Of the low percentage teams, the Aggies with a 3-5 record have the best conference mark which gives them the dubious honor of being the most prosperous of the poverty-stricken members of the loop.

Crowded at the bottom are Texas with a 2-6 mark, Baylor with a 2-7, and Texas Christian with 1-8.

Proving "them what has, gets," the three top teams have taken 22 of the 30 conference games while the four low teams have had to divide the remaining eight victories.

This Saturday all teams except Rice will see action—SMU meets the Aggies at College Station, Arkansas is host to Texas at Fayetteville, and TCU journeys to Waco to play Baylor.

1. A game played more than 400 miles away from the visiting team's home may be telecast back to the team's home TV area.

2. Sell-out games may be telecast to the home TV area of the home and visiting teams in the TV locale of the game—if it is played off-campus.

3. A team may participate twice in a telecast not released in its home NCAA district and these telecasts will not be counted as appearances.

Small colleges will be exempt from all appearance restrictions.
