



Class Legislation

There has been many a law adopted by the states and by the federal government declared unconstitutional because it provided for class legislation

In other words according to these rulings we can not have class legislation under our constitution.

Yet for years we have had exactly that. We have had the wage and hour law which is definitely class legislation. It applied to one group of employers and employes and did not apply to other. In some instances those to whom it did not apply needed it worse than those who had for a few days visit with their

But the high court has ruled that this law is legal. They have held it constitutional and all business firms and employers who do business outside their own state have had to comply this with this.

We have had national legislation in our social security laws that applied to some and failed to cover others. Slowly but surely we have and are changing this because seemingly we have begun to realize that all employes . . . even those self employed . . . should have the protection this provides.

But even today it does not cover everyone. It definitely is class legislation and yet it has been ruled legal.

Recently our own legislature adopted a minimum wage law. It applied to certain businesses and to certain institutions but it did not apply to all employing workers. There were workers protected and guaranteed a minimum wage and yet there were other workers entitled to this protection but they were not given coverage under the law. This is

A district court has already held the law unconstitutional. It will now go before the state supreme court. Whether they will uphold the district court remains to be seen.

But it does appear that despite the fact that class legislation is supposed to be outlawed and unconstitutional in our nation we still have it.

We believe legislation adopted to protect the employees and the employers should cover all of them without exception. Otherwise it is unfair not only to certain employers but it definitely is unfair to employees.

We should cover all workers or forget such laws.
