Is Analyzed by Expert
Automobile owners drive more
slowly than individuals driving bor
rowed cars, and drivers on shor
trips go slower than those on :ong
trips, according to a study of the
speed of motorists, recently complet-
ed under the direction of Dr. Harry
R. De Silva of Yale university. This
speed study was carried on in con-
junction with Dr. De Silva's study
of the human element in automobile
accidents.
The analysis proved rather con
clusively that new cars travel at
higher speeds than old cars. The
