list of possible careers were. "A list of possible careers were: "A
public office sometimes lasts only
as as long as your party is in power and I want a permanent job." "If
more money was offered for politi-
cal jobs, more brainy people would cal jobs, more brainy people would
train for them as they do for other
professions," Those who favored a politic
career gave as their reasons: "I want to do more in government than
vote. I'd like to be a politician in order to help make changes that are
needed." "Politicians are doing an essential job efficiently and workMany students would like to se politicians trained for their careers
and offered the following suggestions as to how this should be done: "I think passing an examination should
be a pre-requisite for holding pub-
lic school for congressmen. People should prepare for this sort of job
just as they would for any profes-
sion."
