W. T. Haldeman Candidate For

Commissioner

W. T. (Doc) Haldeman has authorized The Advocate to announce him as a candidate for Eddy County commissioner from the second district, subject to the Democratic primary June 8.

He has lived in this community since 1921 and is a successful farmer. Today he is farming 640 acres and lives southeast of Artesia on one of his farms.

Haldeman is married and has three sons, two of whom also are married and farmers. The third son is still in school.

The candidate said that if nominated and elected, he will strive for the improvement and oiling of country roads in Eddy County and in their beautification with the cooperation of members of the women's extension clubs.

As a successful businessmanfarmer, he naturally is interested in the general promotion and improvement of Eddy County and feels himself qualified to help handle the county's affairs and finances in a businesslike and conservative manner.

Being a land owner, Haldeman knows the needs of the farmers and ranchers and would have their interests in mind in filling the office.

Haldeman, who is a litelong Democrat, is a member of the Eddy County Farm Bureau and he served two terms as Democratic precinct chairman in 1942-46.

The candidate said he will strive to see as many of the voters as possible, but pointed out that it is impossible to make personal contact with all, so asked that his announcement be construed as a personal appeal to all Democratic voters to consider his candidacy in June and, if nominated then, to all voters in November.

County Delegate GOP Convention To Be Held Here

A Republican delegate convention will be held in the basement of the Masonic Temple at 7:30 o'clock Friday evening, it was announced by the Eddy County Republican Central Committee.

The convention will be held to elect 10 delegates from Eddy County to attend the state Republican convention, which is scheduled to be held in Albuquerque at the Hilton Hotel, beginning at the afternoon of Wednesday, April 28.

The state convention will select eight delegates and eight alternates to attend the Republican national convention in Philadelphia, and to elect a national committeewoman and national committeeman for Republicans in New Mexico.

All Republicans and anti-administration Democrats were invited to attend the county convention and participate in it.

Jack McGarry, Republican candidate for district attorney, who is now assistant district attorney at Carlsbad, will keynote the county convention, it was announced.

Truman Calls for Draft, Training To Bolster Resistance to Russia; **U.S. Reverses Stand on Partition**

FORCES AT WORK . . . Increasing Communist pressure in Europe has been instrumental in dividing the continent into three component power blocs, all of which are influenced by a fourth force-U.S. policy, symbolized by the presence of American troops in Germany, Austria and Italy. Map shows western bloc (1) of anti-Communist Britain, France, Belgium, Luxembourg and the Netherlands; northern bloe (2) of the Scandinavian countries, daily growing more apprehensive of Soviet tactics and eastern bloc (3) of Russia and its satellites. Present approximate American troop strength is indicated for Germany (120,000), Austria (10,000) and Italy (5,000).

THE PRICE

Peace and War

"We must be prepared to pay the price of peace or assuredly we shall pay the price of war."

Those words, spoken by President Harry Truman to the U.S. congress, could be the seeds of the first genuine, effective foreign policy this nation has had for half a cen-

Disregarding any political overtones there might have been in the President's speech, his address to the joint session of congress reflected the realization at the top level of government that any successful foreign policy must be based on the fundamental concept of striking a balance between commitments abroad and the national security or strength at home available to back up those commitments.

By definition, the term "foreign policy" implies that any nation expressing such a policy possesses the strength-in military forces and alliances-to follow it consistently at all times and to defend it just as consistently in case of war.

In that connection Mr. Truman specifically asked congress for power to draft men to build armed strength against the ruthless aggression of Soviet communism.

He asked also for "prompt enactment of universal training legislation," indicating that the draft should be only temporary until universal military training is giving the country the trained men it needs.

Finally, he sought swift passage of the 5.3-billion-dollar European recovery program - the Marshall plan for economic recovery of western European nations which is setting the Kremlin's teeth on edge.

Bluntly the President upbraided Russia for making a travesty of

"One nation has not only refused to cooperate in the establishment of a just and honorable peace, buteven worse-has actively sought to prevent it."

Western Pact

Lending force to Mr. Truman's scattering of the seeds of foreign policy was the fact that, an hour before he delivered his pronouncement, the just-completed five-nation western European pact for common defense against attack had been announced officially.

Under the treaty, Britain, France, Belgium, Luxembourg and the Netherlands pledged one another military aid in the event that any one of them should be attacked.

doctrine," the United States would be the principal guarantor of this five-power union. Without such a guarantee of U.S. backing, the western European treaty would be meaningless.

By his declaration in support of the western European pact Mr. Truman seemed to be guiding the U.S. to a point of departure from its historic adherence to the diplomatic enormity of refusing to engage in "entangling alliances" even at the price of its own welfare.

REACTION: Divided

What are the true facts? Just how potentially lethal is the situation with regard to Russia?

Senators and representatives were asking those questions after President Truman's "let's get strong" message. Many of them were demanding answers before they would consent to go ahead with any-legislation endorsing a military draft or UMT.

Congress was divided, but the split was not along party lines. It reflected isolationism, discontent with the Truman foreign policy and in some cases an almost unhealthy respect for Russia's power in Europe.

CONVINCING

Closeted for 50 minutes with Secretary of State Marshall, Secretary of Defense Forrestal and Secretary of the Army Royall, the senate armed services committee emerged from the conference to throw its weight behind President Truman's plea for quick action to build up America's military forces.

Sen. Chan Gurney (Rep., S.D.), chairman of the committee, reported that 10 of the group's 13 members were convinced that both a limited draft and universal military training have become an "absolute necessity."

Driven by this feeling of urgency, the Soviets may not be able to avert an incident which would lead to a shooting war.

ABOUT FACE: Expedience

To many persons it looked as though the United States, in aban-According to the new "Truman doning its support of the Palestine partition plan, had pulled a "Pontius Pilate" on the same scene where the procurator of Judea had washed his hands not quite 2,000 years ago to sanction the Crucifixion.

In reversing its role in the partition struggle, the U.S. proposed that the Holy Land be made a United Nations' trusteeship, giving Jews and Arabs a chance to reach agreement on their own concerning the future of their country's government.

TRIESTE:

Surprise

In a move that surprised everyone from the Russians to American congressmen, the U.S. proposed jointly with France and Britain that the free territory of Trieste be returned to Italy.

Trieste, long a storm center coveted by both Italians and Yugoslavs, had been made a free state under United Nations guidance in the sixmonths-old Italian peace treaty.

The proposal was, apparently, a shrewd and calculated move to try to help the anti-Communist forces in Italy win the April 18 election.

It literally put the Russians on the spot, leaving them with little choice of reaction. If they support the western powers' proposal to return Trieste to Italy they will be, in effect, turning their backs on their previous arguments for a Yugoslav Trieste, thereby kicking their Yugeslav cohorts in the face.

On the other hand, if Russia were to side with Yugoslavia it would amount to a rebuff for the Italian Communists. Possession of Trieste is a great political issue in Italy. and it well may turn out now to be a deciding factor in the elections coming up there.

Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito, however, lost little time in answering the proposal of the U.S., Britain and France. He simply rejected the demand and proposed instead that a plebiscite be held in the free state of Trieste to decide whether it should be Italian or Yugoslav.

Moscow diplomats were calling the action "another move toward war." Said one: "The beginnings of international order which emerged after the war are being destroyed."

But to those who were working tooth and nail against the spread of communism it looked like a master stroke, one which might keep Italy and all of western Europe out of reach of the Kremlin.

FOOD WASTE: Rats, Insects

Although the world is crying for food, hundreds of thousands of tons of American foodstuffs are spoiled each year by the depredations of rats, mice and insects-and often by the carelessness of some producers. Food and drug administration officials say the amount of so-called

"filthy food" they destroy every year is enough to contribute "very substantially" to the hungry areas of the world.

"Filthy food" is the legal term Greatest fear seemed to be that for food spoiled by "contamination conditions in Europe, as precipi- of rats, mice, insects or other repulsive foreign bodies." It is the job of the food and drug administration to find and condemn filthy food in the channels of interstate commerce and to prosecute those responsible.

Since FDA's power to condemn filthy foods at their destination was taken away a year ago, officials estimate that, as a result, 20 tons of such food appears in retail outlets every day.

RABBITS:

Meat Supply

There is one vast source of meat -maybe an inexhaustible one-that the U.S. public might have to consider seriously if beef and pork become as scarce and expensive as it is predicted they will:

Rabbits. That is a department of agriculture idea. The department suggested that the American people take up the raising of rabbits as a supplementary source of meat to eke out the usual protein fare, destined to become more scarce and costly.

National rabbit week, which was observed during the week following Easter, would be "a good time" for families to plan to produce a "year round supply of this white, delicately flavored, nutritious meat, comparable to breast of chicken,' the department hinted.

What does one need to begin raising rabbits? Just rabbits.


New Device Controls 'Cancer' of Buildings Pipes Enable Chemical To Reach Termites

Termites, the "cancer" of buildings, now can be controlled. Through all the ages the tiny insect that feasts on wood in homes, farm buildings and other structures has been a constant destroyer. Annual property losses run far into the millions.

Ordinary control measures could not get at the intricate tunnels hidden away in difficult and impossible to reach places.

A new device, hailed as an effective means of combatting the destructive pest, was demonstrated at the annual convention of the National Association of Home Builders in Chicago by W. B. Hill of Memphis, Tenn., nationally known as a termite expert.

His method consists of installing a series of slotted pipes at the time of construction in all inaccessible areas, including dirt-filled porches, sun parlors, stoops, steps and fire-places. Annually a perforated pipe is slipped into the allotted pipes and all hidden areas are treated with a powerful chemical toxic blown

through openings in the pipes. Hill, who has spent 20 years figur-

ing ways of waging war on the termite, also has devised a display showing live termites at work. Enclosed in glass, his small scale model home has an army of hungry termites actually at work constructing their intricate network of mud tunnels or shelter tubes. It shows the worker, the soldier on guard and the immature, young potential queen who swarms in the spring.

Beware the 'New Look,' Crop Specialist Advises

By Arthur Pointer

DON'T WORRY-HE'LL SHOW UP - HE'S NEVER YET MISSED A MEAL! Beware the "new look," especially in crop varieties. That is the advice of Joe Robinson, Iowa State college agronomist.

"New varieties seem to hold some sort of magic charm over many farmers," stated Robinson. "I am happy to see the farmer change to new varieties whenever they can increase his yield but just because a variety carries a new name is no indication of its value."

Robinson pointed out that performance records are more important than newness.

Selection of suitable hybrid corn varieties creates another problem. Unlike other crops, some hybird corn varieties are produced by only one concern. Eligibility of both the private hybrid lines and the experiment station lines for certification depends on the performance records in a corn yield test.



grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge. As I live, saith the Lord God, ye shall not have occasion any more to use this proverb in Isreal. Behold, all souls are mine." And then God adds, "The soul that sinneth, it shall die."

GOD'S LOVE AND CARE

A LL through these chapters in Sunday's lesson, two solemn truths appear-God's love for his people, manifest in unwearied care; and the responsibility of each soul for the sin which such commits against God.

This truth, or these truths, I should say, are equally applicable for us today, As Ezekiel was sent to remind the people of God's love and care, so must we, early in our youth, accept the responsibility of accepting his love or rejecting his love.

We cannot claim his care if we despise his will. That is the message of Ezekiel for us.

WHAT GOD IS LIKE

NOWHERE in the Old Testament is the love of God more manifest and compelling than in Ezekiel 34:11-27. I hope that you will open your Bible to this passage. Here the Bible speaks in words that burn with the compassionate love of God for sinful souls.

"I will both search my sheep, and seek them out. As a shepherd seeketh out his flock in the day that he is among his sheep that are scattered; so will I seek out my sheep, and I will deliver them out of all places where they have been scattered in the cloudy and dark day . . . And I will bring them to their own land, and feed them upon the mountains of Israel by the rivers."

One is reminded here of Jesus, when he said, "For the Son of man is come to seek and to save that which was lost."

A NEW HEART

"A new heart also will I give you, and a new spirit will I put within you," Ezekiel 36:26.

Here we have, perhaps, the sublimest sentence in the prophecy of Ezekiel. God is speaking. Ezekiel is merely the messenger - the voice, as John the Baptist delighted to describe himself.

Ezekiel has faithfully declared that each individual is responsible unto God, and just as faithfully he has proclaimed God's love and care, and now he adds the third great truth, namely, that God waits to bestow the new heart and the new spirit to every repentant soul.

A new heart and a new spirit. That is what the Jews needed. That is what the world needs today-a new heart and a new spirit. Only God could give a new heart then, and only God can make such gift today.

EZEKIEL'S MESSAGE FOR US

WOULD we listen to Ezekiel today? He has the message we need above all other words that may be spoken. He called the Jews to repentance of sin. That is what America needs today. Boys and girls need it. Men and women need it. And just as God waited patiently to bestow the new heart and spirit to Israel in the long ago, so does he wait to grant us today a new heart and a new spirit.

"Our God, our help, in ages past, Our Hope for years to come; Our shelter from the stormy blast, And our eternal hame."



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


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Outposts in Australia

Australia's four "flying doctor" services carried 603 patients and flew 289,239 miles in the last year. In addition to this, many patients were treated at "outback" homesteads and nursing homes, while others received medical advice by radio while the doctors were flying to the patients.

By far the biggest organization is the Flying Doctor service of Australia, which flew more miles than all the other services together. The service operates from bases at Cloncurry, Charleville, Broken Hill, Alice Springs, Kalgoorlie, Port Hedland and Wyndham. During the year, 506 flights were made, 197,163 miles were flown and 356 passengers carried.

The Australian Commonwealth department of health conducts the Northern Territory Aerial Medical service, which operates from Darwin over an area of 360,000 square miles, most of it sparsely populated and extremely rough country. Since its first flight on August 28, 1946, this service has covered 35,216 miles and has carried 58 patients.

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First Air Transportation

Outstanding characteristic of air transportation is speed. First commercial use of airplanes was for transportation of mail, which began in 1918. These operations at first were limited to daytime flights, night service being inaugurated in 1925. Passenger service began in the late twenties, but in 1932 mail revenues still represented 80 per cent of the total revenues of air carriers. As airlines were extended, airports and other aids provided at public expense, and progress made in speed and frequency of operation, passenger transportation gained as a source of revenue of air carriers, and in 1946 the relative proportion of total revenue received was 87 per

Honey Almond Cream Cake (Makes two 8-inch layers)

2 cups sifted cake flour

2 teaspoons baking powder

1/4 teaspoon soda

3/4 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup shortening

1/3 cun milk 3/4 cup light corn syrup

1 teaspoon vanilla

1/2 teaspoon almond extract 2 eggs

1/2 cup honey 11/2 cups oven-popped rice

cereal 1 tablespoon melted butter.

Sift flour, baking powder, soda and salt into mixing bowl. Add shortening, milk, corn syrup, vanilla and almond extract. Beat until smooth, about 150 strokes. Scrape bowl and spoon often during baking. Add eggs and beat 250 strokes; scrape bowl. Add honey and beat 150 strokes. Pour batter into two 8-inch greased pans. 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
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
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

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Significant Changes Noted In Nation's Money Market

Recent trends in the loan and investment portfolios of member banks and the current weakness in the market for medium and longterm government securities reflect a number of significant changes in the forces which have influenced the money market during the past five years, according to officials of the Federal Reserve system.

These changes may be grouped into two categories: (1) basic economic forces - particularly the increased demand for credit and capital by business generally, and (2) a series of official policy measures designed to curb additional credit expansion under current inflationary conditions.

Perhaps the most significant development resulting from these factors is the change in the interest rate pattern. Although short-term rates have firmed noticeably, this development has occurred within the framework of a controlled market, and the federal reserve system still is committed to maintenance of an orderly security market. The extent to which official action by the treasury and the reserve system has been able to influence credit expansion is conditioned by requirements of managing the public debt as well as by the government's current fiscal position.

Rope Around the World

American rope makers reach to the far corners of the earth for the fibers they need to meet the universal demands of 141 million Americans for rope. Whether it is for the 5,300,000 farmers or 107,-000 fishermen in this country, or for a mechanic or a housewife, there's a steady flow of cordage fibers to American factories to make up the estimated 300 million pounds of rope and twine that will be produced in this country this year. With a negligible supply of raw materials available in the United States, large and small cordage makers alike look to the Philippines and Africa, the East Indies, India and Middle America for their basic fibers. The Philippine islands, with their world famous manila hemp, are the largest single source of abaca fibers. Manila fiber, the correct name for which is abaca, is still the No. 1 hard fiber used in rope making.

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
