## Water Commissioner E. W. Dimock, 69, Election to Be Held

What promises to be a red hot event in the life of the people of the Penasco Valley is the election which takes place every December, when the water users of the Hoop Water Users Association go to the polls and vote on who is going to run the affairs of the district the next year.

The big event begins next Monday night when the members of the association gather at Altman's Cafe and hear the annual report by the secretary. Next in order comes the nomination of candidates. There are five members to be elected but of course there is no limit to the number of candidates that will be selected. Then the election is held Tuesday, Dec. 12 at the office of the secretary.

The old board is composed of Charley Barley, Joe Clements, Charley Cole, W. B. Durham and Lyle Hunter. There were seven candidates in the field last year. Joe Clements received 24 votes, Charlie Cole 24 votes, Charley Barley 19 votes, Irving Cox 11, W. B. Durham 15 and Lyle Hunter 15.

The Hagerman grade team took the preliminary game from the Hope grade team by a score of 27-17.

The Yellow Jackets will play their third game of the season on Saturday night, Dec. 2, at Hope against Cloudcroft. There will be two games with the "B" team playing the opener at 7 p. m.

But this reminds us how many of our readers have ridden in a one horse open sleigh, with a snow ball from the horses' hooves hitting you in the face once in a while.

The news from the Korean war front is bad, it couldn't be any worse. This dispatches from the front on Tuesday say that the UN forces are in full retreat, with 300,000 Chinese Reds pouring across the Manchurian border. These China Reds are well equipped soldiers. They have winter clothing and their supply lines are short. Our boys are suffering from insufficient clothing and long supply lines. Tuesday noon's broadcast said that two of Gen. MacArthur's top generals are with him in Tokyo having a conference. What are we going to do let the Chinese Reds run over us and chop us to pieces? I say that we should drop an atomic bomb on them or two bombs if necessary and then drop one on the Kremlin. Stalin is not going to ask our permission to use the atomic bomb (if he has one) the first thing we know some centers of population like San Francisco, Chicago or New York will be wiped off the map.

Reports from the radios and newspapers indicate that the East Coast is wrapped up in one of the worst blizzards they have had for nearly 37 years. Heavy snows, cold winds and freezing weather have brought misery to hundreds of people and resulted in thousands of dollars in property damage. On the West Coast—in California, Oregon and Nevada—heavy rains have swelled rivers to flood stage and swept down valleys causing a large number of deaths and an untold amount of property loss. We don't intend to lord it over other parts of the country, we feel just as sorry for them as we can, but while all this is taking place, we are having nice sunshiny weather with hardly freezing weather at night. We have our fingers crossed while we are writing this because before the sun goes down we might have a full fledged northerner right on top of us.

In the recent issue of the "Pathfinder" we read an article by the editor entitled, "It's Time Uncle Said UNCLE." It hit the nail right on the head for us so here it is:

Never in history has any nation proved more willing than the United States to come to the aid of others in distress. When an earthquake or other disaster struck a foreign land, America has always been quick to extend a helping hand. In the first World War, we loaned Europe billions—then forgave practically the entire debt. Since the last war, we have sent more billions abroad to help countries wrecked by the war. And our help goes to our former enemies—Germany, Italy and Japan—as well as to our allies.

How has America's generosity been received? Several years ago Henry J. Taylor, economist and radio commentator, reported that he found evidence of unbelievable waste and carelessness in Greece. He saw six new X-ray machines, costing American taxpayers \$10,000 each, rusting in an open field with a piece of canvas their only protection. Near-by were 400 gasoline booster pumps which had cost \$2,000 each, left in the open for more than two years. He also saw nine large refrigeration machines, valued at \$15,000 each, which the Greeks did not even bother to unpack. He saw 13 fishing boats which had rotted, unused, for more than a year. They cost almost half a million dollars of our taxes. The seas around Greece abound in fish, but we sent 1700 tons of wet salt fish to help the Greek food supply. Taylor reported that even the Greeks were laughing about this.

America never hesitated to give when the need arose. But we can be righteously indignant when, as in Greece, our material aid is wasted or when we help re-arm Belgium's army and the bare told that Belgian munitions makers are shipping arms to China's Reds to be used against our own boys in Korea.

We should not be expected to carry on forever the burdens of the world. Others must do their share, according to their ability. The time has arrived for Uncle Sam to say "uncle."

# Foreign Policy May Be Big Issue When the 82nd Congress Convenes; Slight Advance Made in N. Korea

**G.O.P. VICTORY:**  
The Battle Is Underway

The echo of the G.O.P. victory in the November national election had not subsided before another voice was heard on the national scene. It was a Republican chorus of "fire Acheson" and a hint of congressional reorganization. The battle began for greater G.O.P. power in the coming session of congress.

On the domestic scene, Republican leaders opened fire on what they called the "grave inflationary situation." This was not believed to mean price controls for the benefit of the American housewife, however.

Senator Wiley of Wisconsin, fresh from a re-election victory, said: "It is a national tragedy the way prices of military items have been allowed to leap since the Korean conflict started." Controls were expected to be along this line.

There were indications also that a new investigation of Communist influences in government would be launched by Republicans when the next congress convened.

Notice was also served on the Democrats that Republicans will insist upon advance consultation on foreign policy steps.

And Sen. Robert A. Taft, now the acknowledged "big-wig" of the Republican party, made it clear he would like to hang Acheson's scalp to his belt when he stated: "I haven't the slightest confidence in Acheson's judgment."

To most observers it was clear the Republican party had launched an all-out campaign for control of the U.S. government. The final battle will be fought with the ballot box in 1952.

**KOREA:**

The Battle Continues

While the world speculated about China's ultimate aims in Korea, the battle continued.

Reports from the scene were confused. Military observers estimated as many as 90,000 Chinese Communists fighting in North Korea, but said United Nations forces continued slow advances behind smashing air attacks.

Meanwhile, a Chinese delegation was invited to the United Nations to hear the charge of aggression in North Korea lodged against them by the United States.

Many observers believed they had found the one main reason for China's action in North Korea. It centered around the great North Korean power plants along the Manchurian-Korean Yalu river boundary.

The Chinese Reds apparently were willing to fight to protect them. The reason being that the mighty hydroelectric plants strung across the neck of North Korea produced 2,681,180 of Korea's 3,132,727 kilowatt hours. An undetermined amount of that power going into Manchuria, the great center of China's heavy industry.

With this in mind, Chinese forces plunged into North Korea and forced United Nations troops to withdraw from the area. Since the Chinese have constructed a "Maginot Line" below the vital plants and will put up a determined defense when U.N. forces reach the area again.

Mao Tse-tung does not want that power shut off. Although the Russians looted much Manchurian productive equipment during their post-war occupation, what is left is China's chief hope for industrialization. And the Communist party line says industrialization is the answer to China's historic poverty.

Greatest Upset



Vincent Impellitteri (right) scored the greatest upset of the recent election. He was turned down by the Democrats as a candidate for the mayor of New York. He ran on his own, defeating Democrats, Republicans and Independents.

## Headliners

Sen. Robert A. Taft has held several press conferences since his astonishing election victory. On one occasion he said, "Only an idiot would be an isolationist today." This was in reply to the label so often applied to him. On another occasion he said, "Unquestionably some of this sacrifice is necessary to protect us against the real threat of Soviet aggression. But the facts ought to be clearly brought before the people, and they must be satisfied in their own minds that the sacrifice is essential. If they are convinced by fair arguments, they will make any sacrifice to assure the freedom of America."

The long awaited message from Tibet, appealing to the U. N. to rescue her from Chinese Communist invaders arrived at Lake Success. It said in part: "Tibet will not go down without a fight, though there is little hope of a nation dedicated to peace resisting the brutal efforts of men trained to war." That quotation seems to express the view of world history today.

**CRIME:**

Dwarfs the 20's

To those who remember the "roaring twenties" and such gangs as the Capone boys, Senator Kefauver, chairman of the senate committee investigating crime, made a shocking announcement.

The senator said that "organized crime in the country today would make kindergarten play out of the operations of the Capone boys" and that the influence of crime on public official is "very sinister and very great."

He went so far as to say that his committee had the facts to prove that well-organized and "tough" groups of criminals are operating throughout the country with "interlocking" ownership between all groups.

He said the racketeers are corrupting public officials and law enforcement officers, and are putting their money into "so-called legitimate businesses" in which they use racketeering methods.

Kefauver's reasons for the continued prosperity of crime agreed with those of most observers: Local public indifference to stopping the rackets.

Kefauver's nation-wide study is aimed at strengthening federal laws to block the way for organized crime. Such laws would include interstate ban on the shipment of gambling devices, more control over the wire services, strengthening of the postal laws, and amendments to the internal revenue laws which would "require real bookkeeping."

Gamblers and racketeers now cheat the United States out of hundreds of millions of dollars a year in taxes.

**CORN BELT:**

Rural Vote Counts

Leaders of both major parties have spent considerable time since the election trying to read the future from the election results. One obvious conclusion was drawn. The major battle ground for the 1952 election will be in the midwest corn belt.

As most voters remember, Truman won the 1948 election because three Midwest states jumped from their traditional G.O.P. column to the Democrat side. They were Ohio, Illinois and Iowa. Had any two of these states voted for Dewey in 1948, he would have been elected.

In the recent election, however, the rural vote returned to the Republican ledger. Two factors may have influenced the switch in the farm voting: a tendency for farmers to return to their traditional Republicanism when times are good and to vote Democratic only when their prices and incomes are declining, and, apparent dissatisfaction with foreign policies of the administration.

For these reasons the farmers of the Midwest will find themselves the target of both Republican and Democratic candidates in 1952. The Republicans will attempt to increase their gains and the Democrats can be expected to launch a full-scale attack to retake command. It might even be said that the farmers of the midwest will elect the next president of the United States.

**FOREIGN AID:**

Extension Proposed

A vast extension of America's foreign aid program was proposed by President Truman and the question will undoubtedly be subject to hot debate in congress.

Urgent recommendations for lengthening the period of Marshall type aid to western Europe stood high on the list. The area was termed as this country's "most critical area" in a security sense.

The declared immediate objectives of the new program are to promote adequate western rearmament, bulwark southern Asia and the Middle East especially against Communist aggression, and expand production of strategic raw materials throughout the non-Communist world. The program would entail an indicated several billion dollars a year.

Just what attitude the new congress will take concerning the problem is still a question in the minds of most observers.

One thing can be sure, the new congress will be one of the most unpredictable in a number of years. The balance of control is so narrow anything might happen. The issue of more money for Europe and Asia will face bitter debate.

**TAFT:**

The Next President?

If the Republican national convention were scheduled for today, there is little doubt but that Robert Taft of Ohio would get the G.O.P.'s nomination for president. The question remains, can he get it in 1952?

A recent nation-wide survey of Republican state chairmen showed Taft an overwhelming choice, with Earl Warren of California and James Duff of Pennsylvania, second and third in that order.

Democrats and labor's political chiefs have tagged him the man to beat. The senator beat them both by 430,000 votes—the biggest plurality of his career.

Taft is reported to have said he was not a candidate for the presidency right now, but he indicated he could be influenced.

"I don't say that I wouldn't take the nomination if it were offered to me," he said, "but I shall make no campaign to get it."

Ray Bliss, Ohio Republican chairman, summed up the opinion of most Republican leaders throughout the country: "If Senator Taft is interested, he would in my opinion be the logical person for the Republican nomination in 1952. He took the issues to the voters in Ohio this year and won. That is the type of aggressive campaigning we need in 1952."

At the present time only one man could beat Taft out of the nomination—Eisenhower, and he is not available.

Career Woman



For the first time in history a woman has been named to a post of authority over the army, navy and air force. She is Mrs. Anna Rosenberg, government career woman, who was named by Defense Secretary George C. Marshall as assistant secretary of defense in charge of manpower and personnel problems in the armed forces.

**BUSINESSMEN:**

To Fight Profit Levy

A group of more than 100 businessmen announced they had formed a committee to fight against an excess profits tax.

They based their campaign on the idea that such a tax is inequitable, inflationary, destructive and dangerous.

The businessmen, however, did not have the gall to stand on that announcement alone. They tempered their campaign with, "Business profits must bear their fair share of increased taxation."

One of the committee members said: "The excess profits tax is a very harmful and dangerous tax, in spite of its superficial plausibility. It is inequitable and inflationary."

The businessmen were worried because congress convened November 27 with consideration of an excess-profits tax the chief item on its agenda. Before it quit in September it instructed the house ways and means and the senate finance committees to have proposals for such a levy ready for consideration.

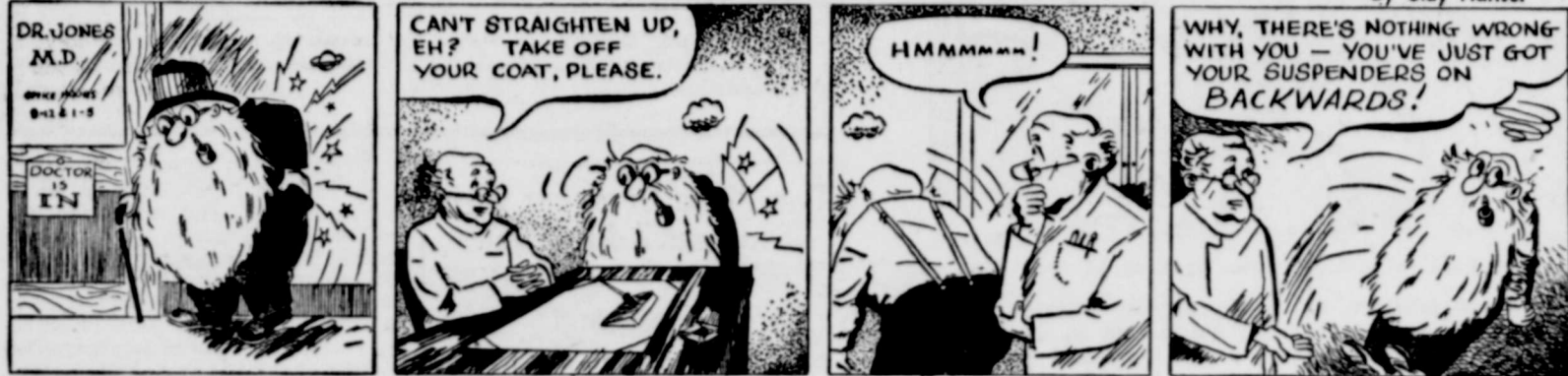

INSPIRATION

Religion—Or What?

AN EDITORIAL

AMERICAN RELIGIOUS LEADERS are insisting more and more that education can never be complete without religion. Religion alone gives man a true outlook on life and a right purpose in living. The only alternative to religion is the philosophy of godless materialism. Without religion man tends to degenerate into a creature without dignity and — worse still — without hope.

Religion teaches that man is a child of God; that he was created to be united one day to God in an eternity of happiness. Religion preserves Man's individuality. It injects romance and high adventure into lives which otherwise might be dull and meaningless. It is the bridge between man and God.

Consider what it would mean to live in a world where materialism had ousted religion. Instead of being a creature with an immortal soul, a man would be just a pair of hands for a factory or farm, or a brain trained to rigid and unquestioning conformity. He would be nothing more than a cog in an industrial machine, and automaton schooled only to obey, a nobody lost in the crowd. He would have no right to speak or act save only as the system under which he lived thought proper and expedient. Without hope, suicide would seem the only way out of his totalitarian enslavement.

Millions of people already live in a materialist society shaped by God-denying and God-hating Communists. Many of these people still cherish the seeds of faith handed down to them by their forebears. But the others — mostly the young and deluded — have embraced the totalitarian way of life without question, never having known anything else. The tragedy is they may never perceive how deeply they have been betrayed and hurt.

There is horror in the thought of millions going through the motions of empty living. They marry, they breed, they work, they die. Even before the clay covers their remains they are forgotten, their places taken by others whose lives will run along the same drab, meaningless pattern. That is materialism at its full potentiality in the totalitarian order.

## KEEPING HEALTHY General M.D. Treats Alcoholics

By Dr. James W. Barton

WE ARE ALL HOPING for the day when alcoholism will be treated everywhere as a disease and care and treatment given by a physician and not by police officers.

Alcoholism is a mental and emotional disease and "the physician in general practice is the one who is most likely to see the earliest manifestations of what may eventually develop into the most serious psychiatric disturbances and he will have the best opportunity of preventing them if he is properly prepared for the recognition of the early danger signals," according to Dr. Joseph Hirsch, executive secretary, committee on problems of alcohol, National Research Council, Washington, D.C., in Post-Graduate Medicine.

Dr. Hirsch states further: "First, alcoholism is a medical problem, usually of the total personality, and the alcoholic is a sick person. Second, because of the traditional leadership of the general practi-

tioner in the area of total personality and its needs as well as his position in the vanguard against disease, his continuous and sympathetic attention is needed to provide effective care for the many tens of thousands of patients now abandoned to the ministrations of courts, jails, and public shelters and to prevent their serious deterioration."

Dr. Hirsch writes that he fully realizes what a problem the alcoholic is to the average physician—just a nuisance and an "unredeemably hopeless patient." Nevertheless the alcoholic's problems, and needs, are almost entirely medical and a constant challenge to the all-round ability of the physician. He must be cared for and treated by the physician, not by others, however sympathetic. Happily, in recent years medicine has begun to face the alcoholic's problems squarely with the result that many thousands of patients, once abandoned as hopeless, are now useful and productive citizens.

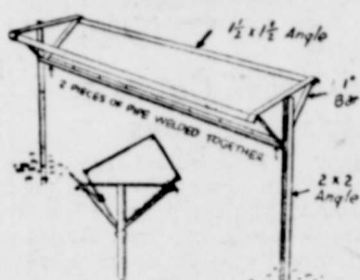

**Trucks Now Hauling Majority of Stock**

**Chicago Yard Conducts Truck Safety Program**

The livestock truck is Number One around the Chicago stock yards these days.

Frank Flynn, general superintendent, says trucks now haul around 70 per cent of livestock received at the world's largest livestock market. Twenty years ago it was only 3 per cent.

The livestock trucker will play the major part in a new phase of the Chicago safety program begun at

the yards last year to reduce livestock losses through bruising.

The yards will keep seven-month records on every livestock trucker bringing livestock to the yards. They will check arriving loads for dead, cripples or obvious bruising.

At the end of the program, drivers with the best records will be rewarded at a truckers' jamboree which contest officials will hold April 6 in the international amphitheatre, home of the International Livestock Exposition.

Livestock farmers will benefit most from the campaign since they share a large part of the cost of this annual loss.

**'Aim' Pullets for Top Fall Egg Production**

Will your pullets be in top production this fall when egg prices are best? They should if you "aim them" by practicing good management, using careful sanitation measures and feeding sufficient amounts of a balanced ration, poultry experts report.

Too many good poultrymen are still inclined to allow their growing pullets to coast along on range or a poor growing ration. Since growing pullets are not producing income, some producers are willing to grow them at the lowest immediate out-of-the-pocket cost. What they should realize is that they are building the production machines that will pay off during the fall and winter months.

It must be remembered that pullets must consume sufficient feed for body growth and sexual maturity before laying any eggs. It is just a question of whether to grow out pullets during the growing period or at the time they should be producing eggs.

To get pullets in production early, poultry experts recommend getting them on clean range, feed them ample quantities of the best ration.

### Stewardship of Life

Lesson for December 3, 1950

"WHAT'S the death rate here?" asked the stranger. "Same as everywhere," retorted the native son,—"one to a person." Only one to a person, because there is only one life to a person. If you had nine lives or even two, you might afford to waste one (though it's doubtful). But with only one life you simply cannot afford to waste it. Of course you do waste it, in thousands of little ways; and some of these cannot be helped. But if a faucet leaks, that's no excuse for turning the water on full blast.

#### God Wants You

With all due respect to the arrangers of these lessons, the lesson for last week and this one seem to be in the reverse order from what is logical. It is very doubtful whether any one ever understood stewardship of money who did not understand stewardship of life first. Now in almost any church you may hear people singing,

"Were the whole realm of nature mine,  
That were a present far too small;  
Love so amazing, so divine,  
Demands my soul, my life, my all."

Very good; wonderful. Surely these are a devoted brotherhood! But wait, what is this coming down the aisle? A man with a collection plate! Now we shall see... There's a man putting in a quarter, and there's a prosperous-looking lady laying out a five dollar bill. (She bought a \$50 cat last week.) But who is putting in his soul, his life, his all?

The whole realm of nature is not yours to give; but you do have a life; and God wants it.

#### Not for Preachers Only

A COMMON mistake is to think that a Christian has a choice between being a preacher and not being one. If he decides to give his life to God then he will be a preacher; otherwise he keeps his life for himself.

This is absurd, when you think about it. God has the first claim on every man's life. To be a Christian is to recognize this claim. He has not a bit more claim on the preacher or the missionary than he has on the grocer or the farmer's wife.

"Who sweeps a room as to Thy laws  
Makes that and the action fine,"

sang a poet long ago. God certainly does not want all his children to be preachers. But he does want his children to live AS his children; and that means stewardship of life.

#### Stewardship of Time

PICKING up again a thought from last week: Time is the raw material of life. Stewardship of life means stewardship of time. It means spending each day as if God had personally said to you: "Here are 24 fresh, new, unused hours. I shall want them back. You cannot keep them. I shall look at them to see what you have done with them."

What do you do with your time? Does it count for God or against him? And yet—how many Christians there are who if asked to do some kind thing,—how many will say, "Sorry, I'm busy, haven't the time!"

#### Gift Without the Giver is Bare

JUST put together four sentences from the four sections of the Scripture for this week, and you have the whole business of stewardship of life in a nutshell: "Having gifts, let us use them." "First they gave themselves to the Lord." "Honor such men." "My God will supply every need of yours." No one ever used for God in the service of man any gift which God did not more than repay. The gift without the giver is bare — and so is the giver. But giver and gift, devoted in love to God and man, are rich indeed.

THE MAN MY DAUGHTER is engaged to marry is not making enough money to support a home and a wife," writes Pauline Grace, from Austin, Texas. "We are New Yorkers, who came here because Maureen's lungs were affected by the eastern winters. Here she met her Ronny, whose pay is \$45 a week. Now you know and I know, Mrs. Norris, that a young couple can't live on little more than two thousand a year. If there were children, privations and underprivileges would ruin their lives. Unfortunately Fred, my husband, and I, cannot be of any regular financial help, as with prices what they are today it takes every cent we have to keep going at all, and Maureen's wedding will set us back for some time. Will you put into one of your articles," the letter concludes, "what you think a fair income on which a young couple today, living in a southern city, may reasonably start?"

Well, I'll tell you, Pauline. I think a young couple can begin on anything from \$12,000 down to \$1,200 a year. I expect a ream of angry letters about this, but I will hold my ground. Two persons can live on \$100 a month, if they want to. "But live how!" the letters will scream. "Live like pigs, live on garbage, never have new clothes or amusements or a car telephone, radio; never know what is comfort or peace of mind!"

#### The \$1,200 Income

But that's just where you're wrong. The persons who have financial peace of mind are by no means the richest among us. Anyone who lives 'way over his income lives worried, and when you read

of a pugilist who lets himself and his fame get smashed in a ring, or a movie star who has borrowed a hundred thousand to pay her income tax, you realize that that is true. One movie star who talked poor had an income of over three hundred thousand a year.

But back to that \$1,200 income. Could Maureen and her Ronny live as Mother and Dad do? Of course not. Could she live like her matron of honor, who has married the son of a rich family? Certainly not.

But on \$1,200 a year she may have all the richness of what I call the American adventure. She may prove, to her own and Ronny's enormous satisfaction, that the days of pioneering are not over. She may take that low income as a challenge, and presently find herself writing articles or talking on the radio or instructing college groups of younger women in what she has learned from that experience.

She must shed, to begin with, a great many of the artificial fine feathers that are cramping her contemporaries in their flight from realistic living. All pretence of having more money than she has, all struggle to keep up with richer folk, must be abandoned at once.

But when that is done, Ronny and Maureen may find, if they are of the right stuff, that pretty much everything worth while in life is theirs to command. Austin, like all our other important cities, will offer them free lectures, free lessons in languages, or in any science, free galleries, free concerts. The cocktail parties they must give up wouldn't be of any benefit to them, not in a thousand years. But the language of the trade they might perfect in three or four of those years might push them on to success.

#### Lasting Friendship

They'll find contacts and friendships that are lasting. They'll find out how heartfilling it is to launch forth alone into this unknown sea of poverty that is never want, and of simplicity that is never need. They'll get the finest medical care in the city, free, in clinics. Their two-room home on an obscure street may well become the place to which two rich and prominent middle-agers look back someday with a nostalgic ache in their hearts.

This venture takes two things that not even the richest marriage can buy. One is love, an element conspicuously lacking in most very prominent weddings.

## Former War Plane Turned into Luxury Cruiser

SANTA MONICA, CALIF.—Rockets, jets and atom bombers not withstanding, the most unusual flying machine in Southern California is a wartime PB5-A Catalina.

But former "Cat" pilots would have a tough time recognizing this baby. The big, high-winged amphibian, originally built as a long-range Navy patrol bomber, is dolled up as fancy as millady's boudoir.

Ever hear of a plane with a shower bath? Or French phones in every compartment? Or one that carries sailing skiffs with outboard motors and walkie-talkies? This ship has 'em all—and more.

It's the dream of two men—Glen Odekirk, assistant to Howard Hughes aircraft and Dave Swedlow, a plastics manufacturer.

"It seemed to us," Mr. Odekirk explains, "that no one has been getting real utility out of a private airplane. Normally it's just something in which you ride from here to there, with varying degrees of comfort.

"So we decided to build a cruiser—privately, on our own—an aerial luxury yacht, in which we can fly and land and live almost anywhere with all the comfort of home."

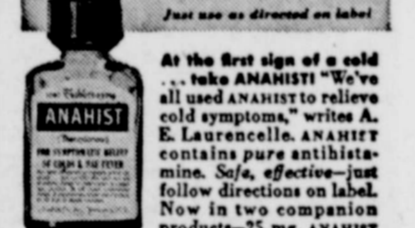

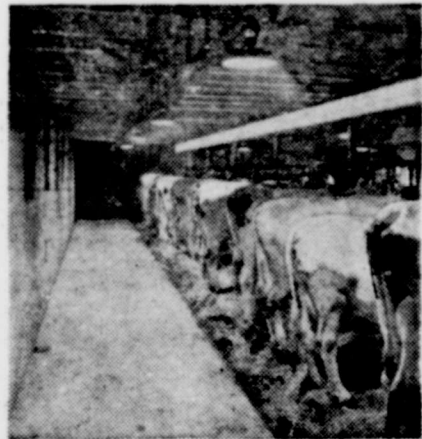


### Good Dairy Barn Lighting Essential

Speeds Up Work, Aids Sanitation Problems

Good lighting in the dairy barn is not only convenient, but necessary. For it speeds up work and helps the dairyman with his sanitation problems.

Farmers, therefore, are cautioned by agricultural engineers to wire their barns so that they have plenty of illumination on the job, around the job and going to and from the job. For these purposes, it is recommended that lighting outlets be located every 12 feet on the center line of the litter alley and every 20

feet on the center line of the feed alley. If more illumination is desired than can be obtained from the above plan, a second line of lights can be placed in the litter alley over the hind quarters of each row of cows. Flood lights on the outside corner of the barn, or conveniently placed yard lights, will help prevent accidents by illuminating the farmer's path from the barn to the house. If a milk house loading platform is used, it also should be well lighted.
