REA Loans \$588,000 To Penasco Phone Cooperative

The Rural Electrification Administration has recently announced the loan of \$588,000 to the Penasco Valley Telephone Cooperative of Hope to improve and expand telephone service in rural areas of Eddy, Otero, Lincoln and Chaves counties.

As a nucleus, the recently-organized cooperative proposes to acquire the Hope Telephone Co. facilities, consisting of 46 miles of toll and exchange line serving 27 subscribers.

The loan funds will be used to build 585 miles of new line and install new automatic dial central offices at Hondo, Hollywood, West Capitan, Mayhill, Lakewood, Cottonwood and Hope. As a result of the new construction, modern service will be afforded the present subscribers and extended to 553 now without telephones. In addition, the cooperative will have as regular subscribers 27 families now receiving switching service only.

There will be no toll charge for calls between the Hondo, Hollywood, and West Capitan offices.

The completed system will consist of 585 miles of line furnishing modern telephone service to 607 rural subscribers. It is being designed to meet the needs of all potential subscribers in the operating areas.
