Anderson Young went to Spur, Texas Wednesday on business.


Madicine Saddle Lets Sick Animals Move

A new type of "medication saddle" for sick animals, which enables horses and cows to walk around and graze while they are receiving intravenous infusion treatments, has just been developed by the veterinary medical profession.

Much as a regular saddle is buckled to a horse, a plastic bag containing the desired medication is strapped on the sick animal's back. A tube extends from the bag to the animal's jugular vein, or to the mammary vein.

This permits a slow, continuous infusion of medicine into the animal's system; a necessity in treating certain diseases. It also eliminates the need for restraining horses and cattle during treatment. They may walk around freely, and the infusion will continue without interruption.

If you want to make your own concrete steps but don't want to tackle the job of mixing cement, try these made of concrete blocks. They have the added advantages that they are not as likely to be affected by frost and if one does crack the entire structure is not affected.
