## Cause of Eisenhower Victory

After the Eisenhower victory, all the political commentators speculated at length on what had caused it. With near-unanimity, it was decided that his attitude toward the Korean war was the number 1 factor—that the American people were 100 per cent fed up with a policy which promised neither victory nor any other kind of an end to that sorry conflict. One of President Eisenhower's first steps on taking office was to start putting into effect a new and very different policy, the most far-reaching and dramatic change being his order withdrawing the 7th Fleet from the job of isolating Formosa from the Chinese mainland, and thus opening the way for Nationalist Chinese attacks on Red China.

Number 2 factor, most of the analysts decided, was Eisenhower's pledge to eliminate government corruption and waste, to cut costs, to balance the budget, and to bring about tax reductions at the earliest possible time. Most of the other successful Republican candidates used a similar plank in their campaigns. And now tangible steps in that direction are being taken. President Eisenhower had been in office but a little more than three weeks when he issued a sweeping order to all federal bureaus and agencies to eliminate unnecessary programs, to hire no new workers except when absolutely essential, and to start cutting the government payroll. The aid, said Budget Director Dodge, is a "progressive reduction of personnel." Only necessary construction projects are to be continued, and these projects must be managed with the strictest standards of economy. He added, "This requires that the necessity for all work be questioned and action be taken to eliminate unnecessary programs and hold the remainder to minimum levels."

At the same time, the Senate investigations subcommittee received testimony indicating that ineligible people may be getting up to \$100,000,000 a year from the federal-state public assistance program. The Federal Security Agency was severely criticized. Mrs. Hobby, the new head of the federal agencies involved in these and related activities, was asked to suggest corrective measures.

These two occurrences are indicative of the way the fiscal wind is blowing in Washington now. As columnist Doris Fleeson put it, "President Eisenhower has embarked upon a courageous test of the country's fidelity to the old-fashioned principles of economy, thrift, economic freedom, and small government."

Most people will agree that this, as a general principle, is all to the good. But, as Miss Fleeson also pointed out, the test will come in the attitude of Congress and the public at large when economy begins to be felt. To quote her once more, "When government personnel is reduced, the first places to feel the pressure are the Senate and House office buildings.

When individual projects and programs are cut, the complaints burgeon quickly in the grass roots and arrive at the same destination." And Congress, not the executive, has the whip hand when it comes to making the budget.

What it all amounts to is that economy and efficiency in government cannot be successfully imposed from the top. They must be supported in Congress and among the electorate. If we are to have them, there must be an end to the "economy is just for the other fellow" philosophy. That is the problem that the Eisenhower fiscal program must deal with.

## Cattle Growers 39th Convention

Invitations are being mailed this week to 6500 members of the New Mexico Cattle Growers' Association advising them of the 39th annual convention to be held in Albuquerque March 29, 30 and 31. "Records of past conventions and surveys of hotel and tourist court reservations already made for the meeting this year indicates that more than 3000 ranchers and their families will attend the convention this year," according to Ed Heringa, Clayton, president. This will be the 10th consecutive year the organization has met in annual convention in Albuquerque.

Lawrence W. Lee, Washington, D. C., president of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States will be a featured speaker during the convention. Lee will also address the Albuquerque Chamber of Commerce.

Other speakers who have already agreed to appear include Gov. Edwin L. Mechem and D. D. Monroe, Clayton, a member of the State Tax Commission and nationally prominent public speaker.

Three fed steers from State College, N. M., will play a prominent part in the convention this year according to Heringa. "The steers are of different grade and type and will be exhibited in the lobby of the Hilton Hotel all day March 29. The animals will be slaughtered and carcasses exhibited for a beef grading demonstration during the convention program March 31. Stockmen who best judge the steers from the hoof to the carcass will receive special prizes," Heringa said.

Objective of this educational feature of the program will be to give stockmen a better idea of the type of animals they should raise to create the greatest demand on part of feeders and packers. Under supervision of Professor J. H. Knox, head of the Animal Husbandry department, New Mexico A&M college, and in cooperation with the association beef cattle improvement committee this part of the program is expected to attract wide interest among ranchers, packers and meat dealers.

George F. Ellis, Bell Ranch, N. M., a vice president of the association has been named to serve as chairman of the important general resolutions committee which normally sets policy and program for the organization to follow during the ensuing year.

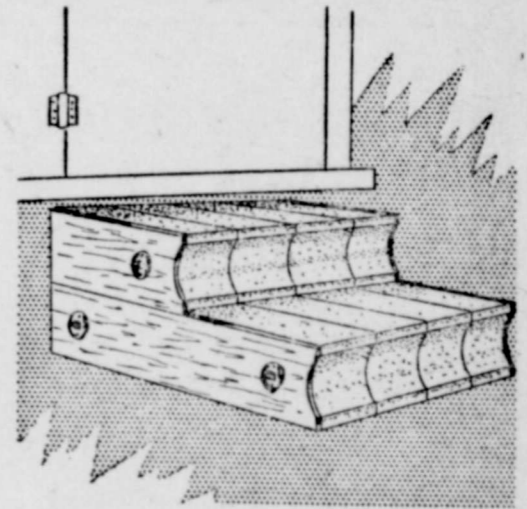
## Medicine Saddle Lets Sick Animals Move

A new type of "medication saddle" for sick animals, which enables horses and cows to walk around and graze while they are receiving intravenous infusion treatments, has just been developed by the veterinary medical profession.

Much as a regular saddle is buckled to a horse, a plastic bag containing the desired medication is strapped on the sick animal's back. A tube extends from the bag to the animal's jugular vein, or to the mammary vein.

This permits a slow, continuous infusion of medicine into the animal's system; a necessity in treating certain diseases. It also eliminates the need for restraining horses and cattle during treatment. They may walk around freely, and the infusion will continue without interruption.

## Concrete Block Steps



If you want to make your own concrete steps but don't want to tackle the job of mixing cement, try these made of concrete blocks. They have the added advantages that they are not as likely to be affected by frost and if one does crack the entire structure is not affected. Hardwood end pieces, held together by pieces of pipe stuck through the hollow centers, hold the steps together.
