NOTICE INVITING BIDS

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that sealed proposals will be received at the Office of the Superintendent of Schools in Artesia, New Mexico, until August 21, 1953, at 7:30 P. M., said bids to be opened at the last mentioned date, for the transportation by bus of school children in the area of Hope, New Mexico, as follows:

1. Starting from Hope, New Mexico, and traveling North approximately three (3) miles; thence West two and one-half (2½) miles; thence North two and one-half (2½) miles; thence South three and one-half (3½) miles to the Highway; thence West three (3) miles, and back to Hope, approximately six (6) miles, a total of approximately twenty (20) miles.
 2. The bus must be of the "suburban" type with a capacity of at least twelve (12) passengers.
 3. If a second-hand bus is involved, a two (2) year contract will be awarded the successful bidder; if a new bus is involved, a four (4) year contract will be awarded the successful bidder.
 4. The school bus must meet all the school bus standards as determined by the School Transportation Director of the State of New Mexico.
 5. The contract between the Artesia Municipal School District and the successful bidder will be subject to the approval of the School Transportation Director.
- Plans, specifications and bid forms may be secured from the Office of the Superintendent of Schools in Artesia, New Mexico.
