Water System to be the contract to build the pump Alta Ruth Young house, 30,000-gal. steel storage tank Completed by April 1

We believe that everyone in New Mexico knows by this time that Hope has a water well that pumps 700 gal. of water per minute. The news has been over the radio and television and everyone is rejoicing with the Petticoats and people of Hope.

To go back a few weeks will state that the contract for drilling the well was let to Leonard George of Hagerman. His crew started to drill Jan. 20. Two 12-hour shifts were operated with Lloyd Harshey Jr. and Lex Hodges operating one shift and Ned Hedges and LeRoy Roades the second.

An 18-inch hoie was drilled at first later on it was reduced to 16 inches. At about 540 feet, water was encountered in considerable quantities. The drill stem was now reduced to 13 inches and drilling continued to 600 feet. A 14-inch casinig was run own to the 560 foot level. The testing crew from Smith Machinery Co. ot Roswell was notified and Saturday morning, Feb. 6 they were on the job. They completed installing the test pump Saturday afternoon at 4 p. m., when the pump was primed and started. It pumped the rest of the afternoon, Saturday night and all day Sunday. At about 4 o'clock Sunday, an official test was made which showed 705 gallons per minute was being pumped at a water level of 518 feet. J. W. Stone, engineer for the Smith Machinery Co. was in charge of tests. Four other tests were made at intervals of one hour.
