"Local defense must be reintorced by the further deterrent of massive retaliatory power," he said. "A pottential aggressor must know that he cannot always prescribe the battle conditions that suit him . . . The way to deter aggression is for the free community to be willing and able to respond vigorously at places and with means of its own choosing." Mr. Dulles added a sharp and specific warning that if Communism starts the Korean war anew," . . . the United Nations response would not necessarily be confined to Korea."
