## Released By Committee

Tabulation of questionnaires returned by parents of elementary school children have been released by the board of education curriculum committee under Mrs. C. P. Bunch.

It is the first of five questionnaires to be released. Releases of results on Junior and Senior high questionnaires are scheduled for next Tuesday and Friday.

Mirs. Bunch said the committee has not yet evaluated or interpreted questionnaire answers.

The questionnaires are one phase of a year-long, systemwide evaluation of the curriculum in Artesia Public Schools, Mrs. Bunch pointed out.

Results of questionnaire information will be correlated with the committee's study of curriculum in other schools, results of the city school's testing program, and studies by a faculty committee, Mrs. Bunch pointed out.

Democracy or Republic?
A great deal of confusion has been built around the term "democracy." Although the form of government in the United States is that of a "republic," it is frequently called a "democracy" Yet the Socialist party of Great Britain and the Cummunisi party in Russia each claim "democracy" as the proper description of their government. It is importarit that we get a clear understanding of pelitical and cconomic words and phrases, for we are in the midst of a conflict in which words play a vital role.

There are some sharp and vastly important differences between "democracy" and "republic." Let's first examine "democracy."

Democracy: The Greeks gave us the word, meaning the people rule. The basic element in political democracy is legal and political equality for all. Democracy doesn't set up any certain form of government except the "Town Meeting" form in which all citizens come together and make their laws on the basis of majority rule. Minority is overruled and may be overrun or even destroyed in this form of government.

## Welfare State

Actually, in its widest usage today the term "democracy" is almost aitogether economic in its meaning The Russian Communists call them selves "democrats" and declare that democracy means public ownership of factories and farms-with every citizen allotted an equal share of the goods and services produced. The British Socialists have what they themselves call democratic Socialism or Socialism by vote of the majority but they claim that democracy means the Welfare State idea or equal shares for all.
Such economic aspects of democ racy were not respected by the fram ers of the Declaration of Independ-
ence and the United States Constitution. The purpose of these pioneers in human freedom was to set up a government that would give mankind the fullest opportunity for liberty, spiritual growth and the pursuit or spiritual growth and the pursuit or
happiness. This was the great liberal philosophy which characterized the creation of the USA. Genuine political liberalism means political and economic freedom-that's all

## The Liberal Tenets

The respect of minorities, freedom of speech, the limitations imposed pon the rule of majorities, the careful dividing up of the powers of government into three branches-ail these blessings of the American form of government have nothing whatever to do with democracy as such They are liberal tenets and they may or may not be present in a democracy.
Thomas efferson, who wrote the Declaration and who was one of the truly great political liberals of history, called himself a republican federalist in a letter addressed to George Washington on May 17, 1792. In his first inaugural address President Jefferson carefully described himself as a federalist and a republican. Republican in this sense was not meant to be partisan, but to represent Jefferson's liberal governmental philos ophy. We find that philosophy inter woven in the framework of our Re public.

Rur Republic
Republic: In the form in which we have it, a republic means representa tive government with political and legal equality for all. It is founded on a Constitution, with divisions of authority vested in the legislative, the judiciary and the executive branches and with states and individual rights clearly defined. The framers of the U.S. Constitution, in creating our Republic, were aware that the states were creating the federal government, not vice versa, and hat the people were sovereign in those states.
No Republic like it has even exist ed. It has permitted the flourishing of a democratic way of life-but not a democracy; a way of life with man's God-given rights protected by consti tutional law and wit hequality of op
portunity and of franchise extended to al, majority and minority alike. to al, majority and mind the oppor-
it has given individuals tunity to dream, to produce, to create to save and invest and to worship God in their own way. Nowhere else on earth have all these blessings in combination, been given a people to any such degree. But we must understand and protece the fundamentais of our Republic if we are to continue to enjoy its blessings.

## News and Views From Washington <br> \section*{(By John J. Dempsey)}

Washington, Maich 4 - New Mexico will receive more than $\$ 10,000$, 000 a year in federal aid highway funds in the next biennium, accord ing to the provisions of the bill just approved by the House Public Works committee. This is about $\$ 2,500,000$ a year more than the state is now receiving.
The increase is due largely to the $\$ 200,000,000$ annual authorization for the Interstate Highway System of which New Mexico has 1012 miles The present law authorizes only $\$ 25$,000,000 . The committee majority sought to have the interstate funds apporioned on a population basis instead of on the long-established regular federal aid formula, based on area population and postroad mileage.
As the only committee member from a Rocky Mountain state I objected to such discrimination and was able to have one-half of the $\$ 200$, 000,000 placed under the regular formula. The other half, however still remains on the urban or popu lation basis. Thus members from the populous eastern and northern states are seeking' to fatten their highway funds at the expense of states like

New Mexico. I intend to continue my light to have the entire $\$ 200,000$, 000 apportioned on the regular iederal aid basis. That will give New Mexico an additional $\$ 900,000$.

I intend also to press for passage of HR 14 , my bili introduced a year 2.go, which will make $\$ 230,000,000$ ago, which will make $\$ 20,000,000$ July. The money authorized in the regular federal aid bill will not be available untii July 1, 1955. Unless my bill is passed this very necessary work will be set back another year. We have already lost one year during which 38,300 more American lives have been lost on highways full of suc hhazards as narrow bridges and sharp, blind curves.
