Track Meet Records Broken Saturday

This last week was an exciting time for the Watson Junior High tracksters. Almost all of the athelets performed better than they have at any meet this year. "We are happy to be at the point we are at now," said Coach Donaldson. "Our enthusiasm is high and our kids have high expectations of themselves."

Several meet records were broken this past weekend and Watson Junior High boys and girls accounted for four of them.

Roxanne Rayes ran the seventh grade girls 2400 meter run in 9:40.63 to replace the record held by Shane Schuster of Muleshoe in

Sharon Gilliam earned a spot in the seventh grade girls record books by running the 100 meter dash in 13.30, seven 100th of a second under the old mark of 13.37.

Chad Johnson and Lauri Puckett sets marks for the eighth grade. Johnson sailed the discus 138 feet and 5 inches shattering the old record of 127 feet and 5 inches while Puckett ran the 300 meter low hurdles in a time of 54.37. In addition to the record setting performances several other Muleshoe athletes only missed records by tiny margins.

"Most of our Jr. High teams have finished high in both our meets this year" Coach Donaldson continued. "The seventh grade girls are undefeated and have scored a combined 368 points. Our eighth grade girls now claims a second and a tie for third."

Town Meeting Set April 1

The Muleshoe Area Industrial Foundation announced Tuesday morning that the Muleshoe Prison Proposal has made the First Cut in the Prison Selection Process.

Jay Messenger, project chairman, stated "We were notified along with 47 other communities that we are still in the running. State officials have continued to praise Muleshoe's strengths. Our ability to produce high quality vegetables and strong community support have been the most important factors.

The Texas Board of Criminal Justice will make a final selection on April 10. In the mean time they are requiring every community to hold a public hearing on the proposal.

Muleshoe will hold a public hearing April 1 at 7 p.m. at the Muleshoe High School Auditorium. This hearing will be used by the TDCJ to measure the level of community support. As Prison Board Chairman Seldon Hale said, "Public support for a prison will be one of the critical factors considered by the Board. I don't think a board of citizens, like the Prison Board can afford to put a prison in somebody's backyard unless there's a good deal of support for it."

Additional information on Muleshoe's Public Hearing will be announced in the coming week. "The Muleshoe Area Industrial Foundation wishes to thank everyone in our community for

their support of this project," said Jay Messenger.

"As a community, Muleshoe is very strong and can accomplish great things.

Forty-seven communities Monday made the so called "short list" selected by the Texas Board of Criminal Justice that keeps them in the hunt for putting a new prison in their areas

The board began with a list of 63 communities offering 67 sites for some of the 25,300 prison beds to be constructed this year. Representatives of the cities and towns and counties have been lobbying the prison board for months in hopes of winning a bid.

Monday's announcement left 47 communities representing 51 sites. A public hearing at each community will be held between now and April 2. Prison system officials at those meetings will report to a board subcommittee.

Still in the running for a prison unit are: Abilene, Agua Dulce, Amarillo, Anderson County, Beaumont, Big Spring, Borger, Bowie County, Breckenridge, Brownfield, Brownwood, Bryan, College Station, Burnet, Carrizo Springs, Childress, Cucro, Dalhart, Dimmitt, Edinburg, El Paso and Fannin County.

FmHA Speeds Farm Loan Processing

U.S. Representative Larry Combest (R-Texas) has announced that the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has granted his request to speed loan processing. Congressman Combest successfully convinced FmHA to no longer require completion of three new time-consuming credit worksheets before approving a farmer's loan.

"The new worksheets were adding as much as six hours to each of the thousands of loan applications, bringing processing of criticallyneeded farm loans to a virtual standstill," said Combest. Farmers in West Texas have enough to handle without dealing with a bumper crop of unnecessary federal paperwork."

During recent meetings with

West Texas bankers, Combest identified completion of the new three additional credit an financial analysis worksheets as the main culprit that has added significant time delay to approval of FmHA loans. The new worksheet requirements were merely used for the agency's internal tracking purposes and not for deciding loan approval. However, worksheets were completed. After Combest intervened on behalf of farmers, FmHA agreed to waive completion of the worksheets until after the current busy loan application season. The Congressman's attention to removing the unnecessary federal paperwork from the loan review process is another taxpayer victory in Combest's campaign to Fight Against Intrusive Regulations (FAIR).

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
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
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Alma Monk Funeral Services Held Wednesday

With spring quickly approaching, professional home economists, homemakers, and others with an interest in food preservation techniques will want to make plans to attend one of two "Food Preservation Updates," sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.





Also Fort Stockton, Gatesville, Hereford, Hondo, Jasper Karnes County, Liberty, Lubbock, Lufkin, Mitchell County, Muleshoe, Odessa, Overton, Pampa, Plainview, Ranger, Refugio, Rusk, San Diego, Shamrock, Snyder, Starr County, Upshur County, Wichita Falls, Willacy County and Wood County.

Abilene, Amarillo, Carrizo Springs and Lubbock each have two sites under consideration.

The winners will be announced at a special board meeting April 10, prison system spokesman David Nunnelee said.

The corrections system estimates it will spend nearly \$642 million over the next four to five years to build the prisons. Each unit will take between 18 months and two years to complete.

The new prisons will include three 2,250 bed maximum-security facilities, six 1,000 bed minimumor medium-security beds, and an undetermined number of units to house and treat 12,000 substance abusers.

Prison board Chairman Selden Hale has said he was leaning toward breaking up a maximum-security unit into four separate smaller "pods" to be scattered around the state but would defer to the recommendation of the department staff. He also said drug abuser units could house as many as 1,000 inmates, as few as 500 or have some mixture.

The communities are offering various financial, educational and social incentives to the corrections system and view a prison as an economic stabilizer.

A new prison could provide a community with 800 jobs and an annual \$16 million payroll for a 2,250-bed unit and a \$6 million annual payroll and 317 jobs for a smaller 1,000-bed unit.



Study Shows Feedlots Can Protect Groundwater

Feedlot operators and crop producers are teaming up to solve some problems before they become problems. And in the process, they're helping protect the water supplies for urban and rural residents alike.

Information from a research project conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Cattle Feeders Association and Texas Agricultural Extension Service is helping farmers and cattle feeders put the nutrients in feedlot manure back into cropland in ways that don's endanger water supplies.

The manure from cattle in feedlots contains many nutrients cropland can use. But the questions researchers are trying to answer concern how much manure can be used, and how to apply it to avoid problems such as rainfall runoff contaminating water supplies.

The research at Etter, north of Amarillo, is investigating the impacts of applying over 20 tons of feedlot waste per acre every three years, compared to equally high rates of inorganic nitrogen and phosphorous fertilizers. The initial application of manure was made in late November 1990.

"In the past, we've primarily looked at manure from a fertilization standpoint" said Thomas Marek, agricultural engineer with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Amarillo. "This study is looking at water quality effects and cropping procedures" that show how to match manure quantities and application methods to the amount of nutrients used by the crop.

"Good management is the key" Marek said. "It would appear that 20 tons an acre every three years is an acceptable level of manure application in an irrigated crop, if proper management plan, he stressed. "An even distribution of the manure is critical."

Preliminary results indicate, among other findings, that the low-nitrate nitrogen concentrations in the manure runoff from furrow irrigations meet the drinking water standards of the Environmental Protection Agency.

The study appears to show favorable promise of adequate nutrient use by the crop and to be environmentally safe, protecting area water resources while using surplus feedlot organic waste, the researchers said.

The study points out ways farmers and feeders can benefit while protecting the environment, said Dr. John Sweeten, agricultural engineer and waste management specialist with the Extension Service. Feedyards are a major market for feedgrain producers. Cropland can use feedlot manure for fertilizer to replenish and often improve the soil, while meeting environmental safeguards.

"It takes about 4,500 acres of

dryland or 2,250 acres of irrigated cropland for the manure from every 10,000 head of cattle," Sweeten said. Texas feedyards annually feed some 5 million head. Feedyards in Swisher and four adjoining counties feed about 1.3 million head a year, said Tom McDonald of TCFA.

'There's not an oversupply of manure," Sweeten said. Only about 135,000 irrigated acres, or 270,000 dryland acres, would handle the manure produced in those five counties, he said.

Since the 1950s, cattle feeding has been a major agricultural industry on the High Plains. In the Texas Panhandle, growers produce grain on 4 million irrigated acres.

Feedlots operate under state permits and must meet strict regulations on manure handling and land application, Sweeten noted. The Extension Service and TCFA are holding meetings with growers and feedlot operators to explain the economics and management of manure as a fertilizer.

When discussing investments, stocks and bonds are generally mentioned in the same breath. But the fact of the matter is stocks and bonds are two very different kinds of investments.

Bonds are, in effect, loans that individuals make to a corporation or a government. You profit from the bond much like your creditors profit from a loan or credit card; through interest payments. A bond certificate will have the mount of interest paid usually over a period of a year. For example, if you bought a \$1,000 bend at 10 percent interest, each year you would be paid \$100.

Bonds are issued by municipal,

federal and foreign governments, federal government agencies, and domestic and foreign corporations. Money raised through bonds are used for a variety of things ranging from new schools and highways through municipal bonds to expansion and modernization of a corporation through corporate. bonds.

Bonds are usually sold in varying denominations. Among the most common type of bonds are U.S. savings bonds. Increasing in popularity are zero-coupon bonds. In the world of bonds, "coupon". means interest. A zero-coupon bond therefore, is a bond that pays no interest while the loan is outstanding. Instead, interest builds up or accrues and is paid when the bond matures.

If you are interested in buying bonds or learning more about them, I suggest you contact a broker. If you're interested solely in U.S. savings bonds, you should contact your local financial institution.

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
