## Cross Plains Centennial 1911-2011 Celebration Begins

Back on January 12, 1911, at 1:00 in the afternoon under a huge tent set up on a bare hilltop just east of the present main section of the cemetery, Col. Rufus J. Lackland cupped his hand behind his ear, calling out to the thousands of folks milling around, "Hark! Hark!" A pistol fired into the air may have helped silence the crowd, as he continued, "I hear footsteps of approaching thousands who will make Cross Plains their home."

And with that, the much anticipated auction of the lots on the new town-site of Cross Plains began. By day's end, \$55,000 worth of lots had been sold: ten of those to T.E. Powell and Associates for a grand total of \$11,125.

The Callahan County business man purchased ten lots in a row that is now the block with the bank on one end and the library on the other. Other investors bought up sections of lots to be resold later.

Higginbotham's purchased their lots that day and ultimately built the largest general merchandise store between Ft. Worth and El Paso. That business is still in operation on the same location, and if the truth be known, some of the original items are probably

still in there someplace.

Those hardy souls back in 1911 who faced the elements to purchase lots had nothing on the hardy souls who left their warm homes to get their piece of a "once in a lifetime celebration" last Wednesday. The high school auditorium was packed with students, participants in the program and a super nice crowd of community spectators.

Ron Rhodes, Cross Plains graduate and chair of the Centennial Planning Committee, presided over the lively program that featured the Cross Plains High School band under the direction of Matt Sowell, the Centennial Singers directed by Kerry Mann and the Centennial Players directed by Becky Isbell.

Rhodes introduced numerous special guests from the county and city level and Mayor Ray Purvis read the proclamation designating January 12, 2011 as the commencement of the Centennial Year Celebration.

The primary focus of the celebration was to put into perspective the origin of Cross Plains as we know it today. A small community had developed down along Turkey Creek, close to the current rodeo grounds; thus

the one time name of Turkey

During its developing years, it was also known as Schleicher. Numerous businesses and churches were established on this site and the little town was holding its own. In 1877, an official U.S. Post Office was established in the community and the name was changed once again—this time to Cross Plains.

Along came 1910 and the good

news that the Texas Central Railroad was extending their line from De Leon over here and this would be the turn-around point. Bad news was that the terminus would be on the hill east of the little community down on the creek. Good news was that the leading businessmen had a whole lot of common sense and good judgement—they knew that if they didn't move up to the railroad, they would be lost as another town would develop up

They formed the Cross Plains Townsite Company and went to work with Railroad to lay out a plan for the infrastructure of a new site for Cross Plains. The lots were sold on a Thursday and construction started on the following Monday on several of

the new sites.

So much progress was made so rapidly that the railroad scheduled another auction on May 2 of the same year. Folks coming back for the second auction were so impressed with the growth that even more people bought into the newly relocated community.



#### State housing agency making \$45 million available through innovative first time homebuyer program

homebuyers \$2,000 in annual

(AUSTIN)—The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) this week released \$45 million in mortgage credit certificate authority through its Texas Mortgage Credit Program, an innovative homebuyer program that makes homeownership more affordable by providing a dollar for dollar reduction of a borrower's tax liability, not to exceed \$2,000 annually.

The credit authority will allow the Department to provide tax credits on approximately \$150 million worth of mortgage loans, which it estimates will help approximately 1,000 eligible households purchase a home of their own once they complete a certified homebuyer education class.

According to Michael Gerber, TDHCA Executive Director, the program will help the state respond to a remarkably robust demand for affordable homebuver products.

"Despite all the negatives we hear from other states, the fact is that the Texas economy and the demand for homeownership - both remain quite healthy," Gerber said. "Many families want and are ready to take that exciting step toward homeownership, and TDHCA wants to help them achieve their dreams through safe, reliable homebuyer lending products offered through the state, coupled with responsible homebuyer education."

Gerber also pointed out that the Texas Mortgage Credit Program will help create new construction and remodeling jobs, generate an influx of wages and salaries into local economies, and increase the local tax base. "This is a significant and very attractive opportunity we hope that no eligible Texan passes up."

"We've worked with TDHCA since 2004 to promote affordable and sustainable paths to homeownership in

TDHCA program will save Texas," said Dwight Hale, Chairman of the Board, Texas Association of Realtors. "TDHCA's MCC program represents one of those viable paths for Texans, which we wholeheartedly endorse."

The program targets individuals and families buying their first home or who have not owned a home in the previous three years. Credits are available in conjunction with FHA, VA, USDA, or conventional mortgage loans through a statewide network of participating banks and mortgage companies who have agreed to participate with TDHCA in these initiatives.

Homebuyers earning up to 115 percent of the area median family income are eligible to deduct 30 percent of the annual interest paid on their mortgage loan up to the maximum amount of \$2,000 per year. The \$2,000 is then deducted from the borrower's annual tax liability, and the benefit lasts for the entire life of the mortgage loan.

For residents living in specific targeted areas of the state, such as those impacted by natural disaster, households may earn up to 140 percent of the median family income and still be eligible to participate, and the first time homebuyer requirement is waived.

The first time homebuyer status requirement is also waived for qualifying veterans of the nation's armed forces. However, veterans must have received an honorable discharge as evidenced by form DD-214 to be eligible to participate in this homebuyer program. All other program requirements must still be met.

"The Texas Mortgage Credit Program is another helpful yet responsible tool that TDHCA can offer to qualifying Texas families who are prepared to be homeowners," Gerber said. "This is a terrific program, and we are excited to make it available to our fellow Texans. If you are ready to take that step toward homeownership,

the state is ready to help you." As Texas' lead agency for promoting homeownership, TDHCA helps transform the lives of the individuals who participate in its programs. TDHCA's homebuyer programs each year help thousands of low to moderate income Texans achieve their homeownership goals, while educating them about the risks and responsibilities that accompany those rewards.

To further this aspect of TDHCA's mission, the Department also sponsors the Texas Statewide Homebuyer Education Program (TSHEP), a statewide program designed to provide information and counseling to prospective homebuyers about the home buying process from both a pre- and post-purchase perspective. Classes are offered by local governments and nonprofit organizations collectively serving all 254 Texas counties. Dallas Cowboy great Bob Lilly headlines a group of 10 former athletes, coaches, officials and sports writers who have been selected to the Big Country Athletic Hall of Fame.

The 10th annual Big Country Athletic Hall of Fame induction banquet will be held May 9th at 6:30 p.m. at the Abilene Civic Center. Tickets will go on sale in February. For tickets or sponsorship information, call (325) 668-3685 or e-mail carolepickett@sbcglobal.net.

Lilly, who grew up in Throckmorton, is known as "Mr. Cowboy." Considered the greatest defensive lineman of his era, Lilly was the Dallas Cowboys' first-ever draft pick out of TCU in 1960, the franchise's first selection to the Ring of Honor and the Cowboys' first member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Joining Lilly in the Big Country Athletic Hall of Fame's Class of 2011 will be former Abilene High and Abilene Christian University football coach Wally Bullington, former Sweetwater all-state defensive back Mike Welch, former Avoca basketball star Cynthia Shelton Raughton, former Aspermont basketball/track standout John Ray Godfrey, and former Abilene High lineman John Paul Young, who was a long-time assistant coach in the National Football

Mike McClellan, a star running back at Stamford and the University of Oklahoma, will be inducted into the Hall of Fame posthumously.

The winner of the second annual Legacy Award is the Morris Southall family of Brownwood. Southall was Hall of Fame coach Gordon Wood's top assistant for 26 years at Brownwood, where the Lions won seven state championships. Two of Brownwood's championship teams were quarterbacked by Southall's sons Si and Shae. His oldest son Terry was a starting quarterback at Baylor, where he was a teammate of Hall of Fame receiver Lawrence Elkins of Brownwood.

Don Bridges of Abilene will be honored with a Lifetime Achievement Award for officiating. He was a long-time high school and Lone Star Conference official and served as president of the Abilene Chapter of Southwest Football Officials.

Carlton Stowers will become the fifth recipient of the Lifetime Achievement for

Media. Stowers, who was cocaptain of the Abilene High track team that won a state championship in 1960, also ran track at the University of Texas. But he made his mark as a sports writer for the Dallas Morning News, Abilene Reporter-News and Dallas Cowboys Weekly and as an author of more than 30 books, including his most recent book which is the biography of former Dallas Cowboys quarterback Roger Staubach.

The Big Country Athletic Hall of Fame, working through the Abilene Community Foundation, has also established two scholarship endowments to be available for the first awards this year. The first endowment, The Nancy and Ted Paup Big Country Athletic Hall of Fame Scholarship, was established with a gift from these former Abilenians. This inspired the Board of Directors for the Big Country Athletic Hall of Fame to match the Paup endowment with their own, enlarging the number of recipients to be chosen each spring. At least two scholarships will be presented at this year's banquet to graduating seniors from one of the high schools in the 19-county Big Country

Here is a brief biography of the other inductees in addition to Lilly and the Southall family, as well as the lifetime award recipients, Bridges and Stowers.

Wally Bullington was a fouryear letterman in football at ACU. He was an assistant coach to Chuck Moser at Abilene High when the Eagles won three consecutive state championships in 1954-56 and then replaced Moser as the Abilene High head coach, compiling a 40-19-1 record in six seasons. He then spent nine years as head coach at ACU, posting a 62-32-2 record and winning an NAIA national championship in 1973. ACU won 17 national titles in various sports during his tenure as the

John Ray Godfrey of Aspermont was a first team all-American at ACU in basketball in 1968, averaging 23.8 points per game. He holds the singlegame scoring record for Moody Coliseum with 41 points. He played on three Southland Conference championship teams at ACU and scored 1,467 points in his collegiate career

school's athletic director.

Cindy Shelton Raughton, who now lives in Roscoe, was a

terrific basketball player at tiny Avoca, which also produced Hall of Famer Max Williams. She played three years for the Wayland Baptist College Hutcherson Flying Queens that won an AAU national championship in 1960. She was also on an all-American team that went to Russia to play in the early 1960s. Shelton Raughton becomes the second former player from the legendary Flying Queens to be selected to the Big Country Hall of Fame, joining Rose Mary Jones Delane of Trent.

Mike Welch was a two-time all-stater at Sweetwater, starting at running back and defensive back and helping lead the Mustangs to a state championship in 1985. He then became a four-year starter at defensive back at Baylor. Last year, Welch was named a second-team defensive back on Dave Campbell's Texas Football Magazine's 50th anniversary high school football team. He was the only Big Country athlete named to the 50th anniversary team honoring the state's top high school football players from 1960-2010.

John Paul Young was a starting offensive lineman at Abilene High in 1957 and then played collegiate football at Texas Western. He made his mark as a long-time assistant coach, first at SMU and Texas A&M and then in the NFL with the Houston Oilers, New Orleans Saints, Kansas City Chiefs, Denver Broncos and Chicago Bears. He also coached in the Arena League and NFL Europe and was the head coach of the divisional championship Dallas Texans team in the Arena League. He is also co-founder of the Angelo Football Clinic in San

Mike McClellan played on Stamford's state championship football teams of 1955 and 1956 and was a member of the Bulldogs' state championship track team in 1957. He was a two-time allstate halfback and a state champion in the 100, 220 and long jump. He was an academic all-American at Oklahoma where he played for Bud Wilkinson's Sooners from 1959-61. He was the hero of OU's 1961 football victory over Army at Yankee Stadium when he scored on a 74-yard run in the Sooners' 14-8 upset of Army. He played two seasons in the NFL with the Philadelphia Eagles.

## Cross Plains' retail sales start new year 9% higher

The City of Cross Plains' one percent city sales tax payments began 2011 up by over nine percent, according to the Texas State Comptroller's office.

Texas State Comptroller Susan Combs reported the city's sales tax payment on Wednesday, January 12th.

Cross Plains' 2011 sales tax payments for the year totalled \$15,851.61, which is 9.91 percent higher than the \$14,421.32 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2010.

The payment to the city for January 2011 was the same amount as the yearly total.

Comptroller Susan Combs announced today, Wednesday, January 12th, that the state sales tax revenue in December was \$1.81 billion, up 9.4 percent compared to December 2009.

"This marks the ninth consecutive month of year-over-year improvement in sales tax revenues, with increases posted across the board," Combs said. "There were increases in the oil and natural gas and manufacturing sectors reflecting recovering business spending. Sales tax in the retail trade and restaurant sectors were also up. As I outlined in this week's Biennial Revenue Estimate, we forecast growth in sales tax revenue for \$7,984.39. the current fiscal year as well as the next two fiscal years."
