She has seen many changes over the years from black and white plates, some with the expiration embossed on the plates and most registrations coming due in March, to the multi-colored plates and the implementation of the Registration Title and Registration System that has automated the paper processing and now prints the stickers.

Ms. Lewis provided the best service possible, treating all with integrity, fairness and respect. She not only worked tirelessly for the community in her professional life, but also as an active civic

leader. Always one to step up and lend a helping hand, over the years, Betty has provided a helping hand in many capacities, such as with the ambulance service and civic organizations like Project Pride and Chamber of Commerce and serving as City councilman. Deadline to submit applications for family land heritage program is May 1st **Texas Department of Agriculture seeks** Texans who have kept family farms & ranches in operation for 100 years or more

AUSTIN - In continuing a tradition of honoring hardworking generations of Texas farmers and ranchers, Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples is encouraging families to apply for the Texas Department of Agriculture's Family Land Heritage Program. The program recognizes family farms and ranches that have been in continuous agricultural production by the same family for at least 100 years. Applications are due May 1, 2011.

"These families, who have operated their farms and ranches for 100 years or more, are strengthening Texas agriculture through their commitment to hard work and their love of the land," Commissioner Staples said. "This land stewardship is the foundation on which Texas agriculture is built, and thanks to their perseverance, the Lone Star State is today a powerhouse of productivity

This year's Family Land Heritage ceremony will be held in the fall at the Texas Capitol in Austin and will recognize farms and ranches established

food and fiber in the world."

in 1911 or earlier.

Eligible farms and ranches must still be owned and operated by the descendants of the founder, either through blood, marriage or adoption. At least 10 acres of the land must have remained in agricultural production for 100 years. There is no cost to apply for the recognition.

Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples on eminent domain reform & private property rights

Commissioner Todd Staples today released the following statement in response to the Senate passage of SB 18, which redefines the legal parameters of eminent domain and private property rights.

"The Senate passage of SB 18 is a great first step and a victory for our state," Commissioner Staples said. "Don't mess with Texas, and don't mess with Texas land. That's what this bill says. Few issues have brought Texans together like this one.

Not only does SB 18 correct the injustice of loopholes that

previously allowed for land to be taken from private property without owners compensation, it also sends a message that here in Texas we hold dear to our heritage of land ownership."

The bill, authored by Senators Craig Estes of Wichita Falls and Robert Duncan of Lubbock, prohibits a government agency or private entity from taking property through eminent domain, "if the taking is not for a public use."

The bill also gives property owners more rights concerning easements through their land and allows them a buy-back option if an intended project is not started in 10 years. Furthermore, the passage of SB 18 requires a bona fide offer to landowners to ensure fair compensation for their property, and also requires entities that have eminent domain authority to register with the state.

Last month, Gov. Rick Perry declared property owners rights an emergency agenda, which allowed lawmakers to make SB 18 a top priority for early approval in the legislative session that ends in May.



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

Commissioners approve request to change law enforcement personnel work schedule

Callahan County Commissioners voted to change the work week for all Callahan County law enforcement personnel to a 171 hour, 28 day work period.

The commissioners' court took the action Monday, February 14th during the commissioners' court regular meeting held at the County Courthouse in Baird.

On a motion by Commissioner Harold Hicks and a second by Commissioner Cliff Kirkham, the commissioners' court voted 5-0 that the Callahan County law enforcement personnel be al-28 day work period beginning March 3, 2011.

According to Callahan County Chief Deputy Keith Collom, under the old work schedule, the and four sheriff's deputies worked a seven day cycle of 40 hours. He time pay was based upon a slid-

ing scale. The chief deputy said that now under a 28 day work cycle, the four deputies will be working up to 160 hours during the cycle. He said that under state regulations, deputies can work up to 171 hours during a 28 day work cycle. Collom said the 28 day work cycle will allow his deputies to receive up to 11 more hours without having to pay overtime. He said the new 28 day work cycle will allow Callahan County to better manage

the deputies work cycle. Other agenda items brought before the commissioners' court included:

-Callahan County Judge Roger Corn called the commissioners' court meeting to order at 9:34 a.m. with Precinct #1 Commissioner Harold Hicks, Precinct #2 Commissioner Bryan Farmer, Precinct #3 Commissioner Tom Windham, and Precinct #4 Commissioner Cliff Kirkham present. Also present at the meeting were Donna Bell, County Clerk, and County Treasurer Dianne Gunter. Also present at the commissioners' court meeting were: County Attorney Shane Deel, County Tax Assessor Tammy Walker, and

Tax Attorney John O'Connell. -Commissioner Kirkham made a motion to sign a resolution to impose additional penalties for collection costs and to allow early collection for property taxes. Commissioner Windham seconded the motion and the motion carried with a 5-

0 vote. The resolution follows:

RESOLUTION TO IMPOSE ADDITIONAL PENALTY FOR COLLECTION COSTS

WHEREAS, the Texas Property Tax Code, §33.07 provides that a taxing unit may impose an additional penalty to defray the costs of collection of delinquent property taxes that remain delinquent after July 1;

WHEREAS, the Texas Property Tax Code, §33.08, provides that a taxing unit may provide that taxes that become delinquent on or after June 1, under \$1,675.00 for the 2 axle back-

County Sheriff's Department, 31.032, 31.04, incur an additional penalty to defray the costs of collection; and,

WHEREAS, the Texas Property Tax Code, §33.11, provides that a taxing unit may provide that taxes assessed against tangible Personal Property incur an additional penalty to defray the costs of collection if not paid within sixty days after the date that the taxes become delinquent; and,

WHEREAS, §§ 33.07, 33.08 and 33.11, provide that the amount of such additional penalty may not exceed the amount lowed to convert to a 171 hour, of compensation specified in the applicable contract with an attorney under §6.30 to be paid in connection with the collection of delinquent property taxes;

WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court of the County of Calsaid that after 40 hours, over- lahan, Texas has determined that it is in the public interest to insure the prompt collection of delinquent property taxes,

Funding available for Texas Grassland

TEMPLE, TEXAS, January 19, 2011 - The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is accepting applications to participate in USDA's Grassland Reserve Program (GRP), a \$4.6 million conservation program in

'While GRP is open to anyone who owns grassland, we are giving priority consideration to grassland areas of Texas that are threatened with conversion to other uses so ranchers can protect their land resources through rental agreements or perpetual easements," said Salvador Salinas, acting state conservationist for the USDA-

GRP is a continuous sign-up program, but landowners are encouraged to apply as soon as possible to be eligible for the initial funding cycle, which begins March 1, 2011.

The NRCS and Farm Service Agency (FSA) administer GRP, a voluntary program reauthorized in the 2008 Farm Bill to protect grazing uses and other related conservation values by restoring and conserving eligible grasslands and certain other lands through rental agreements and easements.

The enrollment options for GRP include:

Rental agreements - 10, 15, or 20-year duration, USDA pays 75 percent of the grazing value in annual payments for

the length of the agreement. Permanent easements -USDA makes payment based on the fair market value of the property less the grazing value.

Land that is privately owned is eligible for GRP. The land must be grassland for which the predominant use is grazing. Land that has been historically dominated by grassland and provides habitat for animal or plant populations of significant ecological value, or land that contains historical or archeological resources is eligible. Land previously enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) is eligible for GRP. Publicly owned land is not eligible or land already under protection from conversion to nongrazing uses is also not eligible.

Texas Department of Agriculture announces funds to promote fruit & vegetable crops

- The Texas Department of Agriculture is seeking proposals for projects designed to enhance food safety and raise awareness and consumption of such specialty crops as fruits, vegetables, dried fruit, tree nuts and nursery plants.

A total of \$1.7 million in federal funds is available through the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Specialty Crop Block Grant Program (SCBGP). The deadline for submitting proposals is March 18, 2011.

TDA will accept proposals for grants from organizations that demonstrate a vested interest in specialty crops and enhancing the competitiveness of Texas-grown products.

Proposed projects should place emphasis on one of the

following areas: Food Safety - Possible projects may assist in developing good agricultural practices, good handling and good practices manufacturing practices, or new methods of research to improve food safety.

Marketing - These projects may include marketing strategies geared toward increasing sales or consumption of specialty crops through media and advertising campaigns, indemonstrations, promotional events or development of educational

opportunities and literature. Nutrition - Possible projects may be aimed at increasing child and adult nutrition knowledge and consumption

of specialty crops. Plant Health - These projects may focus on investing in the prevention, control or eradication of pests and diseases harmful to specialty

Value-Added Projects and Industry Development -Projects may support the development of value-added processing facilities. establishment of certification programs and improvement of distribution methods.

Free Tax filing available to qualified Texans

AUŚTIN - April 18, the 2010 federal income tax filing deadline, is just around the corner. For Texans trying to wade through their federal income tax return, it can often be challenging. Fortunately, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) and the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) stand ready to assist taxpayers with information on preparation

A new service offered this year is Free File, a free, federal income tax preparation and electronic filing program for eligible taxpayers. Taxpayers with a 2010 Adjusted Gross Income of \$58,000 or less who meet additional requirements can qualify for Free File. For more information on the program visit IRS.gov.

TWC also is encouraging qualifying taxpayers to take advantage of the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), which allows lower-income individuals and families to pay less or no federal income tax. or receive cash payments. Local Workforce Solutions Offices offer tax preparation help, including how to file for EITC. For more information on specific services provided by Local Workforce Boards in your area, please visit www.texasworkforce.org.

2009 more than 2.6 million Texans claimed more than \$6.5 billion in EITC credits. with an average refund of \$2,492. In recent years, Texas has ranked first in the nation in the number of EITC dollars claimed by taxpayers. Despite the credit's availability, however, the IRS estimates that as many as 20 to 25 percent of Americans who qualify for the credit do not claim it on their tax returns.

Under certain limitations for 2010, individuals may qualify if their adjusted gross income is less than:

* \$43,352 (\$48,362 married filing jointly) with three or more qualifying children.

* \$40,363 (\$45,373 married filing jointly) with two qualifying children.

* \$35,535 (\$40,545 married filing jointly) with one qualifying child.

* \$13,460 (\$18,470 married

* \$3,050 with one qualifying

Investment income must be less than \$3,100 for the year to qualify for EITC.

EITC does not affect an individual's eligibility to receive certain public assistance benefits. In most cases, the credit payments will not be used to determine eligibility for Medicaid, Supplemental Security Income (SSI), food stamps, low-income housing or most Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) payments.

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


